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State Provision Betters School's Financial Basis

RALEIGH SCHOOL — Increase of state support to the schools would tend to equalize school costs throughout the state, leading toward a uniformly good school system despite the disparity in county wealth.

This was the message of Mr. Cecil W. Posey, Executive Secretary of the Oregon Education Association, speaking on the Basic School Support Fund before the Raleigh School PTA Monday, October 16th. Posey's remarks were brought home to the audience by the need for space to house the 100 attending members.

Oregon has already the finest program for handicapped children in the country, according to Mr. Posey, and has now given its attention to the urgent need for more space and teaching staffs in the public schools, resulting in the Basic School Support Fund, ballot number 306, which the legislature has presented to the people for decision in the November election.

Need for the addition to school income from the state is felt by the rapid growth in population already evident in Oregon, which in the next ten years is predicted to increase 80% to 100%, compared with a 30% national increase.

This of course means school enrollment with which district tax programs cannot keep pace. The basic school support fund would give every child an equal chance of study groups.

She lamented the fact they had no burglary insurance but I questioned whether they would have been paid when there was no evidence of burglary. Can you tell me?

ANSWER: Under the Mysteri. ous Disappearance clause in most theft policies the loss would have been paid. There would be no other explanation than theft to account for the lost silver.

Demo States County Gov't. Needs Re-Do

CANDIDATE FAVORS
CHANGED APPROACH
FOR OREGON STATE



James R. Shick

A complete and thorough re-investigation of county government problems, to eliminate overlapping, duplication and waste, is strongly endorsed by James R. Shick, Democratic candidate for State Representative from Washington county. In a prepared statement, Shick declares the state of Oregon needs a change in thinking and in approach, for greater development.

The Democratic candidate is a native of Washington county, having been born in Forest Grove, October, 1918. A graduate of Pacific University, in 1940, he earned his degree from the George Washington University Law School in February, 1946. He is a member of the bar in Oregon and in the District of Columbia.

Shick was employed by the United States Treasury Department as an administrative assistant, in Washington D. C., for a period of six and one-half years. Subsequently, he served as law clerk for the Honorable Bennett Champ Clark, associate justice of the U. S. Court of Appeals, District of Columbia.

The youngest of candidates on the November ballot for the position of Representative, Shick favors a non-partisan study of the Oregon tax structure, to find means of broadening the tax base for a more equitable distribution of the tax load.

In behalf of the public schools, he favors continuing interest by the state legislature with expanded assistance from the state in financing local school districts. For Oregon's basic lumbering industry, he supports a speeding up in the program of reforestation.

Because 30% of the water power of the United States is in the Northwest, the young candidate favors adequate and complete development of the Columbia River resources under an integrated authority, now proposed as a CVA. He contends that this power potential is the one greatest asset of the area which requires a change in the thinking and approach of the government of the state of Oregon.

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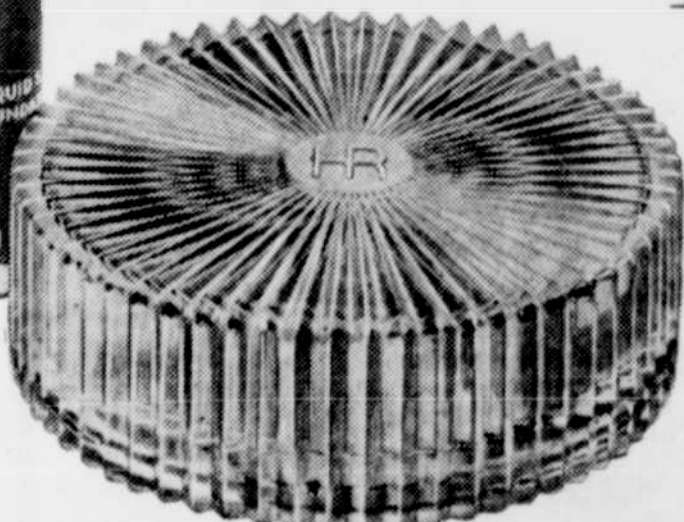
