Dear Mary Grace: Is sauerkraut as good a vegetable as cabbage? Does it have much food value, and can you tell me if the quick-method sauerkraut keeps well? N. W.

Dear N. W.: Sauerkraut does not have the high vitamin C content of fresh cabbage, but it is a good vegetable used in moderation. The quick-method kraut you speak of should not be stored too long—it is best to use it as soon as possible. This recipe makes use of sauerkraut in a novel manner. Try it for a high vitamin C vitamin A and protein dish. STUFF PEPPERS:

Ingredients for 6:
6 large green peppers
1 medium onion minced
2 fresh onions chopped
1½ cups sauerkraut
1 tbs. oil—pinch pepper
½ pound ground beef
1 cup cooked rice
1½ cups boiling water
1 large apple, peeled, diced
1 tsp. salt—pinch marjoram

Beaverton News Class Sends 22, H.S. Press Confab

Five delegates and 17 observers from Beaverton union high school's journalism class will attend the 24th annual Oregon high school press conference, to be held on the University of Oregon campus, October 28.

How the Korean crisis affects ordinary people will be analyzed by Dr. Paul C. Dull, far eastern expert. An associate of professor of political science and history in the university, Dr. Dull will discuss the impact of foreign aggression in his speech.

He will speak at the final general assembly of the one-day conference of high school journalists and their faculty advisers. Several sessions will be held throughout the day. All meetings are scheduled in the Erb Memorial Union.

Dr. Dull knows conditions in the far east from first-hand experiences. He has traveled in Korea and Manchuria and lived in Japan. During World War II he served with the Marines in the Pacific theatre.

The educator, who joined the Oregon faculty in 1946, received his doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Washington.

Five student delegates from each high school in the state will be allowed for the conference this year. Last year four were invited. Take up for discussions will be problems of school publications.

The conference is the first large scale meeting scheduled in the new student union.

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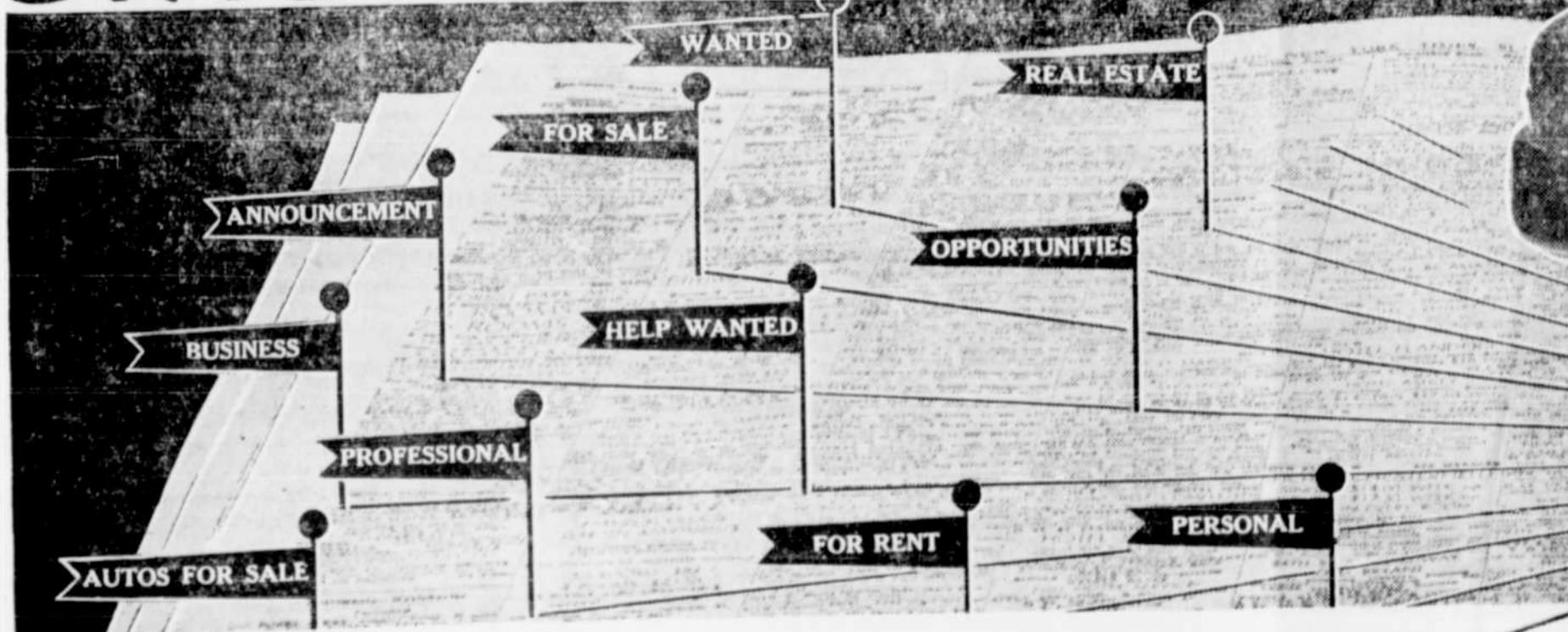
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
