Mrs. Ruth Charroin who has been visiting her sister, Mrs. Lowry also returned to her home in Seattle.



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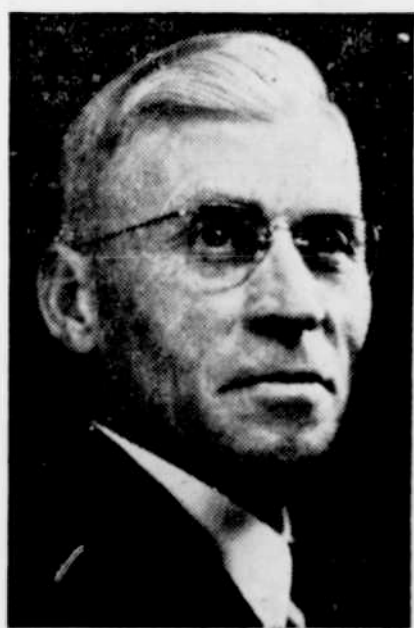
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
