TO THE VOTERS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY, OREGON:

It is now approaching election day, and I should state my position on some of the matters of interest to the voters of Washington County, Oregon.

I have lived in Washington County for approximately 35 years. I have lots of friends among the Democrats of the County, and I appreciate most sincerely the vote of confidence that I received from the Democrats who wrote my name on their ballot, and I thank each and every one for their consideration. We have a two party system of government, and one must register in one or the other party. Since I have been in Washington County and prior, I have been a registered Republican, and to check on that if you wish, I request that you call Mr. Tupper, the Washington County Clerk at the Courthouse in Hillsboro, and whose phone number is Hillsboro 2762. I have never changed my registration.

I am now the duly elected mayor of the City of Hillsboro and have been in office approaching two years. The mayor and the Council during all of that time, have co-operated and worked together. If I am elected County Judge of Washington County, Oregon, I will co-operate with the planning board which has been set up, and I will request the engineer for the planning board to co-operate in an advisory capacity with the small cities and towns in the County, in trying to work out their problems. I will inaugurate a permanent road program both construction and repair for all parts of Washington County to be done by competent engineering.

I will recommend that all purchases for County use above \$100.00, be advertised for bids in Washington County.

I will insist upon all business matters of the County being handled entirely by a three-man Court at all times, and in this connection, I pledge my full co-operation with the entire Court and courteous and businesslike treatment to all citizens coming before the Court with matters which they believe require the consideration of the Court.

I will work for a uniform system of wages for all County employees.
