Board Approves Bible Class But Not For School

CEDAR MILL—Religious education in the school was under serious discussion at the school boards regular meeting Friday, Nov. 3 at the school house.

Following examination on the feasibility of conducting Bible School after school hours the board decided to abide by the rule of forbidding religious education on school premises.

The law provides for recess from school up to 120 minutes per week. Children may, with parents consent, attend Bible School sessions each week at the Cedar Mill Community Church.

Transportation to and from the school building will be handled by use of the church bus. Time for the classes will be decided by Mrs. Wilfred Fraser and Mrs. Elsie Underwood, school principal to coincide with the school program.

Dairy Breeders Of County Date Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Washington County Dairy Breeders Association will be held November 22, at the quonset hut at the county fair grounds in Hillsboro, announces Palmer S. Torvold, county extension agent.

The meeting will begin about 10:30 a. m. with a noon lunch and an afternoon continuation. The county association is a member of the state breeders association, farmer owned and farmer-managed.

Business volume in terms of first services, up 46 percent from the year previously, totalled 18,028 for the past year, Ben Simonson, manager, reported during the fifth annual meeting of the Oregon Dairy Breeders association at Corvallis.

The statewide artificial dairy breeders association, which will celebrate its fifth anniversary in February, 1951, has an enrollment of 20,000 cows. Breeding service is now available in 20 of the state's 36 counties.

Five new local associations joined the state association this past year, bringing the total to 16. New member associations are Columbia-Sauvies, Jefferson, Tillamook, Wal-lowa and Clatsop. Three older, established units now have expanded to the point where two technicians are employed.

Assets including bulls and the association-owned 89 acre farm near Corvallis now total approximately \$100,000.

Among program speakers was Oscar Hugg, Oregon State college extension dairy marketing specialist. He said the industry must develop new uses for dairy products. While milk is the most controversial agricultural product, there is still no substitute for it. Famine, he said, exists in only those countries where people depend primarily on cereal diets.

Officers who will lead the association during the coming year include Henry Hagg, Reedville, re-elected president; Vernon DeLong, La Grande, vice-president and A. H. Abts, Hillsboro, re-elected secretary-treasurer.
