Mrs. Abel passed away suddenly on the morning of the 16th of November at the Northwestern Christian Home. She was born on April 1, 1873 in Minnesota.

She joined the Christian Church, April 12, 1931 and she entered the Northwestern Christian Home on March 5, 1948 from Roseburg, Oregon. Prior to coming to Oregon she had lived in Montana for twenty years, and out of those years three were spent homesteading near Glendive, Montana. She came to Oregon in 1930. For many years she was a rural school teacher. She was a Deaconess in her Church and also taught Sunday School. Her husband died in 1936.

She is survived by one brother, Henry C. Parslow of Roseburg, Oregon and a number of nieces, living in Oregon, Washington, California and Montana.

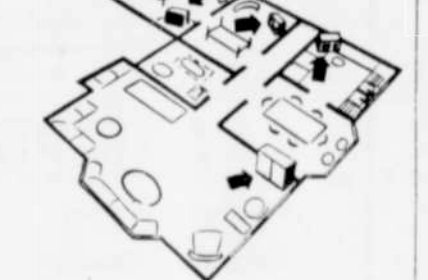
