

Noted In File Of County Sheriff

LARCENY IN AUTO COURT

Living became a little tougher in one of the cabins of the Tigard Auto Court, around October 31, according to Claude Leonard, 210 S. W. Main street, Tigard, proprietor of the Tigard Auto Court, who makes the report.

Unit was occupied by Robert Snails, employed at Air King company, and he left for a period of six or seven days to find, upon his return that someone had ransacked the place.

Gone were 2 pillows, 2 sheets, 1 blanket, 1 bed spread, 1 Westinghouse toaster, 1 old army blanket and various towels and dishes. Also taken were a portable radio and a certain amount of canned goods. A suspect is listed.

UNSUPPORTED CHECKS

Mrs. Ray Cox, of the Golden West grocery, Aloha, and C. F. Evansen, Hank's Market, of Cornelius, were both victimized during the latter part of last month by a girl described as about 17 years of age, 5' 5", 120 pounds and dark hair.

The young girl cashed some checks which proved to have no recognizable means of support.

In each instance, she entered stores, purchased small amounts of merchandise, presented small checks (\$7.38 to \$9.32) and received the balance in cash.

A complaint has been signed.

MAGIC IN REVERSE

The tricks of a magician, as he pulls rabbits from a tall silk hat, seems to be a matter of pulling a bunny out of this air. But Stanley Muetz, Route 3, Box 129, Sherwood, reports a case of magic in reverse, when about \$125 worth of real live rabbits seemed to disappear in thin air.

The situation came to a head on November 20, when Muetz told his sorry tale. The animals were taken at night from a hutch behind the garage, apparently during the owner's absence. His wife frequently heard noises out back but in her peering out could not see anyone.

On November 9, someone also attempted to steal his truck.

NOT TRAFFIC CASUALTY

On November 21, about 12:45 a. m., the deputy sheriff was alerted to what might well have been a traffic casualty but investigation showed no such development.

Reported was a man lying in the north lane of Canyon road, about 200 yards east of West Slope. When rescued from the highway, however, the man was unable to talk coherently and could hardly walk without generous assistance. His breath had the "prominent" odor of stale alcohol.

Identified as with a Salem address, the man was lodged in the county jail, awaiting further disposition by the mills of Fate and Justice.

ADVICE PROVES HOODOO

Thomas Barclay, 8715 S. W. Canyon Road, owner of the Canyon Lodge tavern in West Slope, had reportedly advised his fellow merchants at a previous Lions club meeting, against patronizing a merchant patrol of the area.

His hunch held a hoodoo, however. On the morning of November 19, some time between 2:30 and 8:30, his place was the victim of a real going-over. A total of \$100 in various coins was taken from the Shuffle Bowl game, pin ball game, cigarette and music machines.

Entrance was through the east window, by use of what appeared to be a 1/4 inch screwdriver with round shaft. Hinged window was pried open, as were all the machines. No suspect is definitely listed.

A paper sack containing a garage receipt, beer order, cigarettes, pipe tobacco and other items was left on the money slot end of the Shuffle Bowl game, pinball game, the sack fell from the pocket of the nocturnal visitor, had been laid down and then been forgotten in a hurried exit.

Considerable damage was done to machines, although one pinball device successfully resisted the "pry-attack". Electric clocks, cigarettes and other articles were untouched, indicating that money was the main objective of the incident.

No fresh prints were discovered. It is believed the burglar wore brown cotton gloves.

HIGH SCHOOL BREAK-IN

It wasn't a burning urge to get an education, apparently, which was behind the November 19 break-in of the Tigard high school.

Principal Tom Fowler states that as far as known, nothing is missing. But on the night before there was the highly successful Junior Prom and it is believed this was the lure that dangled before the culprits.

Entrance was gained by reading a window and reaching in to unlock the East door to the basement. Fowler's office had drawers and bookcase ransacked. And a door was taken from its hinges for entry into the adjoining room, occupied by the teacher in charge of the Junior Prom. Nothing turned up missing, here in spite of a thorough ransacking.

Clear fingerprints were taken from the door. It is believed someone local is responsible for the outrage, as no other rooms were bothered. The fingerprints repose in the sheriff's file.

THANKLESS PREVIEW

In West Slope, on November 22, there was a thankless preview of the holiday that followed.

Someone broke into the Duo Rain workshop at the west end of the community. Although there are many expensive tools there, nothing has been listed as missing.

The Olson's Used Car lot, likewise, was given the once-over lightly and lost four all chromium-hub caps, valued at about \$25.
