Medical Soc. Of Ore. Sets Defense Plan

INSTITUTE DEC. 3
DEALS IN MODERN
WARFARE STUDIES

Meeting the medical problems among the civilian population resulting from modern warfare is the theme of the Institute of The Medical Aspects of Civil Defense to be held Sunday, December 3rd, in Portland, according to a statement of Dr. W. J. Weese, Ontario, president of the Oregon State Medical Society, and Dr. Russell H. Kaufman, Portland, Chairman of the Society's Committee on Emergency Medical Service.

The Oregon State Medical Society is sponsoring the Institute in cooperation with the Oregon State Board of Health and the Oregon State Civil Defense Agency. The purpose is to acquaint physicians with the principles, procedures and organization methods of the medical phases of civilian defense.

Especially invited to attend are the members of the committees on emergency medical service of each of the twenty-five local medical societies of the State who function as the medical arm of civil defense.

Heading the program will be Colonel William L. Wilson, M.C., Washington, D.C., Special Assistant to the Surgeon General of the Army, who will speak on "Military Experience Applied to Civilian Medical Plans for Civil Defense."

Other speakers and subject titles are: Dr. Kaufman, "Effects of Atomic Explosions as a Basis for Civil Defense Planning"; Dr. Joseph M. Roberts, Portland, member of the Committee on Emergency Medical Service, Oregon State Medical Society, "The Treatment of Atomic Weapon Injuries"; Dr. William Y. Burton of the University of Oregon Medical School, Chief, Radiological Defense Division, Medical Department, Oregon State Civil Defense Agency, "Ionizing Radiation and Types of Resultant Injuries"; Nicholas P. Sullivan of the Portland Regional Blood Center and Deputy Chief, Laboratory Section, Oregon State Civil Defense Agency, "Special Problems of Blood, Plasma, and Blood Substitutes"; Dr. Arthur F. Scott, Professor of Chemistry, Reed College and Associate Chief, Radiological Defense Division, Oregon State Civil Defense Agency, "Radiological Monitoring—Demonstration of Detection Instruments—Personnel Protection"; Dr. Harold M. Erickson, State Health Officer, Deputy Director in charge of Medical Department, Oregon State Civil Defense Agency, "Civil Defense Planning."

A special feature of the Institute program will be showing of a motion picture, "Medical Effects of the Atomic Bomb" produced by the U.S. Army.

Participants in the Institute will be welcomed by President Weese. Presiding at the morning session will be Dr. James E. Buckley, Portland, Past President, Oregon State Medical Society. Dr. John C. Adams, President-Elect of the Multnomah County Medical Society will be in charge of the afternoon session. All sessions will be held in the Auditorium of the Medical-Dental Building.

Citing the difference between good teams and bad, he declared that good ones win games and are able to pick up on the other's mistakes. Bad teams, however, make mistakes when they really count against them.

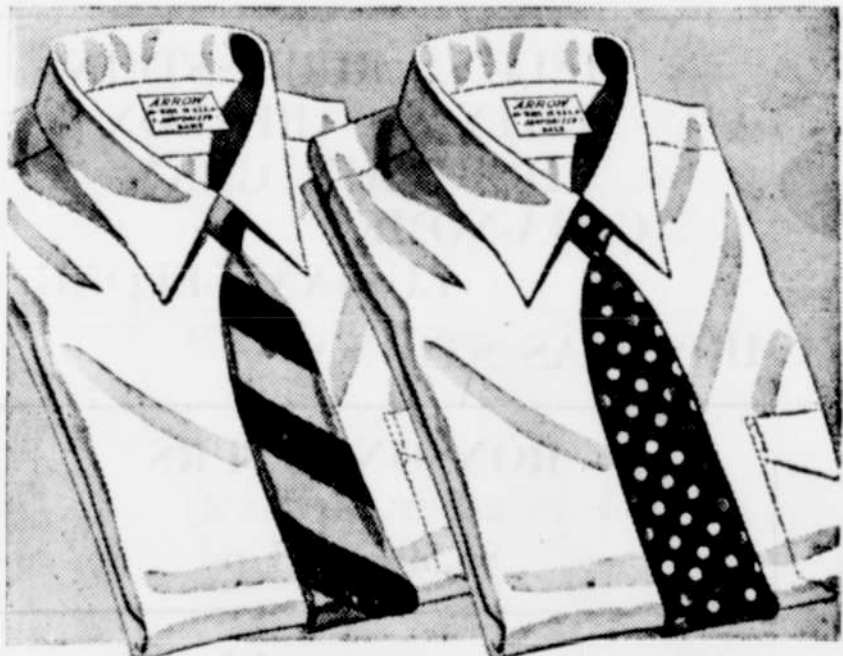
All make mistakes, he said. It's when that makes the difference.
