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Jury Scales Down Damages For Treatment Plant Suit

PESENTI AWARDED \$2886 FOR LAND INCLUDED
IN TRACT NORTH OF OREGON ELECTRIC TRACK

Verdict of the jury in Judge R. Frank Peters circuit court in Hillsboro, November 29, allowed Gelin, da Casale Pesenti and Alexander Pesenti damages in the amount of \$2,886.33 for about 4.5 acres of land north of the Oregon Electric railway track, which had been condemned and taken over by the city of Beaverton for erection of a sewage treatment plant.

The Pesentis had asked \$6,750 for the land and \$7,500 damages to their remaining property, along with \$3,500 for attorney fees.

This suit concerned about half of the treatment plant site, with about 4.31 acres known as the Biggi tract yet to be settled.

The legal action began in March of 1949, after the Pesentis had turned down an offer by the city of \$850. This amount was determined after a panel of viewers had surveyed the land and made an appraisal of its actual value.

It was the claim of the Pesentis that not only was the land removed from their ownership but that the water which would run out of the plant helped influence a depreciation of land values.

The viewers, in their findings, stated the land taken over was unfit for agricultural purposes, being normally under water for a good portion of the year and subsequently the soil was sour and not conducive to crops raising.

The amount of attorney fees, which was not included in the jury's findings must be determined in conference of the Pesentis' counsel and Judge Peters.

P.O. Observes Longer Hours For Mailing

CARE IN WRAPPING
AND EARLY SENDING
SPURS DELIVERIES

In line with increased patronage of the post office during pre-Christmas mailing, the Beaverton office will remain open for handling of parcels and stamp sales on Saturdays of December 9, 16 and 23 until 6 p. m. announces Virginia L. Jenkins, acting postmaster. Regular schedules on other week-days are from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m., but beginning December 12, these hours will be extended to 7 p. m.

Patrons are urged to mail early for prompt delivery. Packages may be marked on the outside, "Do not open until Christmas," if so desired.

Requirement on parcels in regard to size permits a maximum weight of 70 pounds and a length of 100 inches. Holly and Christmas trees may be sent to almost every state in the union without inspection and both of these gifts are believed well received in the eastern part of the country.

Each year, post offices across the nation accumulate an imposing stack of Christmas cards which are non-deliverable because of insufficient postage. This, the postmaster points out, represents not only a loss of such postage as was paid out but also in a case of holiday a greeting not received.

The post office encourages the use of 3 cent stamps instead of the 2 cent stamp required on unsealed cards. The 3 cent postage will insure delivery of a card in case of an unknown change of address. Likewise, first class mail will have precedence over the cards with 2 cent postage.

Beaverton Five Takes Over Top Of Hillsboro Lg.

A sharpshooting, close-checking band of Beaverton Legion basketballers leaped into undisputed first place in the Hillsboro league Monday night, submerging previously unbeaten Gaston, 60-35.

The Beavers have won four straight games in league competition. Thursday night the locals defeated the Hillsboro JC's by a 35-26 score in a slow-moving encounter.

Beaverton completely outclassed their opponents from start to finish. Gene Springer wished the first basket from the corner with a few seconds gone in the game, and Gaston never got within striking distance from that point on.

At one time, early in the first half, Beaverton led by a 15-1 margin.

The tight zone defense employed by the Beavers prevented any effective Gaston shooting around the basket, and in this way their top point-makers were completely bottled up. This, combined with the uncanny basket-making ability of the locals, turned the expected tight contest into a rout.

Guards Jack O'Connor and Chuck Hullings played an outstanding passing and running game, while Springer, Jay Gibson and John McKnight gathered in a large share of the rebounds. O'Connor headed all scorers with 19 points, followed by Springer with 15.

The game was rough as well as one-sided. Gaston scored 17 of their 35 points via the free-throw line.

Next game for the league leaders is tonight at the Barnes junior high school in Hillsboro, against the Economy Drug. Game time is 7:30 p. m. The team still welcomes more players, particularly forwards. Players—O'Connor 19, Springer, 15, Hullings 10, McKnight 9, Gibson 5, Biggi 2, Lindsey, Paxson.

Eleven foreign countries and a round trip across the United States packed plenty of sightseeing material for Kim Sinclair, graduate of the University of Portland, who attended Beaverton high finishing in 1944.

Employment Office Gives Ability Test

EXAMINATIONS FOR
APTITUDES START
DEC. 11, HILLSBORO

A chance to test aptitudes as an indication of the employment to follow will be offered the public after December 11 at the Oregon State Employment Service office in Hillsboro, announces Alvin Elkins, office manager.

At this date, a General Aptitude Test Battery will be installed. Elkins continues, with special quarters set aside for examination purposes. No cost is made of the service and no obligation is incurred by those being tested, as to choice of job opportunities.

The office will be able to handle six at a sitting, which requires one hour time. Three tests will be conducted in the morning and 2 in the afternoon, with a maximum capacity of 30 per day.

Clarence Baker, of the Programs and Methods Division of the Oregon State Unemployment Compensation Commission, in Salem, will come to introduce the new service, although local office personnel will conduct all actual tests.

Any individual or group, upon application for a scheduled appointment, may take advantage of this method of testing individual aptitudes. Following the tests, individual counseling will be offered to anyone wishing advice on training for more desirable employment.

Draft Takes Twelve Men December 6

NO RULE CHANGES
IN INDUCTIONS SO
FAR SAYS BD. SEC.

Twelve more county men were inducted into the armed forces, in the latest draft of local Selective Service Board No. 4, at Hillsboro, according to Mrs. Barbara Macleod, secretary.

The new fighting men include: George Holcombe, Route 1, Sherwood; Eugene M. Vandehy, Forest Grove; Robert C. Wolever, Forest Grove; Nicholas A. Sumich, Tigard; Leroy M. Whiteside, Buxton; James W. Taggart, Beaverton; Harry L. Frantz, Hillsboro; James R. Schultz, Beaverton; Ernest C. Phillips, Hillsboro; Charles R. Hedricks, Cornelius; Weldon K. Corder, Newberg and John J. Swartwood, Hillsboro.

In connection with reported declaration at some recruiting center, Mrs. Macleod pointed out that there has been no change in rules for induction. Eighteen year olds are not subject to classification until after they reach their nineteenth birthday.

Likewise, new regulations have not been made in regard to students attending high school or college. A student who is classified in Selective Service may expect to continue through the present school year without call to service, as long as he maintains a satisfactory grade record.

High school students are not under the draft until graduation or attaining of the age of 20 years.

"Any change in draft specifications," the board secretary stated, "will be given prominent publication. And until such announcement is made, regulations will remain as they are at present."

Research In Polio Virus Has Promise

HEAD OF NATIONAL
FOUNDATION TELLS
SCIENCE ADVANCES

Polio researchers have isolated three virus and have been able to stop the particular three virus, caused diseases in animal experimentation, Basil O'Connor, national head of the Infantile Paralysis Foundation declared in Portland, according to Harold W. Johnston, West Slope, Washington county chairman of the March of Dimes for 1951, who attended a banquet tendered in O'Connor's honor, December 5, in Portland.

By its scientific advances, the foundation hopes reasonably soon to effect a quicker cure of infantile paralysis attacks and to soften the serious crippling complications.

Such medical gains, however, have not been achieved without a terrific price, O'Connor pointed out. The polio foundation by the end of the year expects to owe at least five million dollars, due to the serious incidence of the disease. Worst year on record was 1949 and 1950 is cited as the second worst.

In Washington county, Johnston announces, plans are being made for a vigorous campaign to insure the county chapter sufficient funds with which to meet further out-breaks. Particular emphasis will be stressed on the importance of county residents working in another county to donate within the county of their residence. Money donated for this cause is used solely in the county of its collection, with exception of that amount sent to the national headquarters.

In West Slope, the Lions club has undertaken to furnish man, power in its area for March of Dimes solicitations. The club has also indicated its intention of making a significant donation of its own.
