Beaverton High School's basketball team dropped its opening game of the season last Friday night to Roosevelt High of Portland 42-34 on the home floor. After a close first quarter which ended 6-6, the Teddies rolled up eight quick points against the Beavers' second team and maintained a comfortable lead of 8 to 20 points until the final quarter when a desperate Beaver rally was cut short by the final gun.

Inability to connect from the field was the principal factor in the Beavers loss, as they were successful on only 13 of their 58 shots at the basket.
