Most of these buckets were made underneath the basket, where he, John McKnight, and Gene Springer performed outstandingly well on the boards. Much of the credit for the smooth-working fast break of the Beavers should go to Jack O'Connor, who repeatedly fed the ball off to team-mates instead of shooting himself.

Symphony Sets Extra Programs In January 1951

During January two programs of exceptional interest will be presented by the Portland Symphony Orchestra conducted by James Sample. The concerts will feature conductor-composer Ernest Bloch on January 22, and on January 15, Oscar Levant as a special attraction, not on the series.

"A pianist of perfectly amazing ability, grasp and imagination" will be heard for the first time by Portland audiences when John Crown makes his debut with the orchestra in the Liszt Piano Concerto No. 1. One of America's best pianists, Mr. Crown is head of the piano department at the school of music at the University of Southern California and has concertized in Europe, Australia, and the United States.

His extraordinary virtuosity has earned him the distinction of appearing as soloist with the N.Y. Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra and all other top orchestras of the land. He will play here Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" and Tchaikovsky's 1st Piano Concerto.

On January 22nd Oregon's most distinguished "artist in residence", Ernest Bloch, will join the orchestra to conduct the second half of the program in two of his own compositions, "Three Jewish Poems" and "Suite Symphonique". Mr. Bloch will return from the East for this concert where he has attended the six-day Ernest Bloch Musical Festival in Chicago.
