CASE OF PANEL TRUCK

The case of a mysterious panel truck is somewhat mystifying but Elmer Stipe and "Speedy" Classen would like to have all the answers to it.

During the night of January 2, recites Stipe, the Speedy Freeze Market at Beaverton was broken into. Stolen were 60 cartons of mixed cigarettes, a couple boxes of Rol-Tan cigars, half case of Borden's canned milk, two slabs of bacon, about ten pounds of butter and possibly other items.

Entry was by breaking a rear window, crowding into the storage room, taking pins from door and entering inside store room by removing door.

Suspects . . . and here the panel truck figures . . . are a man and woman who entered the store about 4 p. m. of January 2, and bought a ten cent bag of peanuts. They continued on toward Hillsboro in their panel truck.

Mrs. Alexander Pesenti, who lives behind the store, saw such a panel truck pull alongside the store about 8:30 that night, at which time entry was believed made.

CONFLICTING ACCOUNTS

From a three-car accident at 9:10 p. m., January 3, on Canyon road across from the bowling alley, conflicting accounts were told.

Involved were a 1937 Buick sedan of Arthur Munsen, 1884 SW 4th street, Portland; 1950 Pontiac station wagon of Erwin Lutz, 293 Murray avenue, Beaverton, and 1949 Pontiac sedan of Harry W. Prost, 224 Highland avenue, Beaverton.

Conflicts in the story were noticeable. Final disposition awaited filing of a complaint and the return on a blood test for Munsen.

WHOLESALE GAS LARCENY

The "take" of a carefully planned larceny effort was on the wholesale level, reports Oscar Granum, of Reedville service station.

On January 2, between 200 and 300 gallons of ethyl gas was taken from Granum's storage tanks. A large amount of gas was spilled on the ground and it is believed a power pump was used to accomplish the theft.

Tire marks indicated a truck was used.

Thayne Smith, owner, reports the loss of 20 cartons of Lucky Strikes, valued at \$30; 20 cartons of Cam-

els, \$30 value; one 5-tube Arvin radio, light blue plastic case with crack on right rear, \$15 value, and \$30 in change, mostly pennies, from a one gallon jar. An attempt to enter the pinball machines proved unsuccessful. All drawers were ransacked but certain valuable property was listed as "apparently overlooked."

Hildenbrand is a senior in the college of Business.



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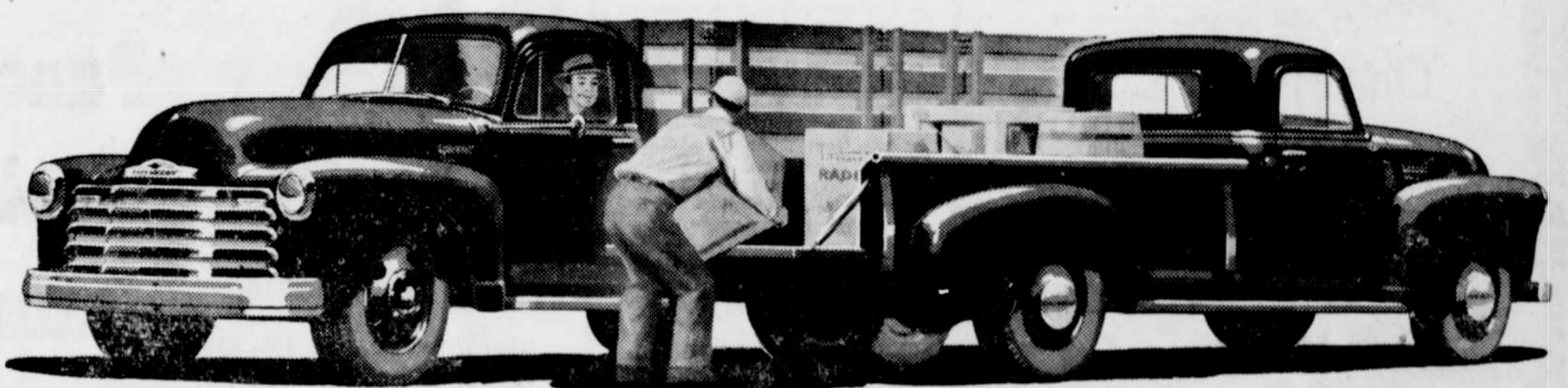
