Labor Earnings Lag Below '49 Mark Last Year

Overtime work declined in several Oregon industries during November, resulting in the lowest earnings for production workers since last May, according to reports from manufacturers as tabulated by the state unemployment compensation and U. S. bureau of labor statistics.

Average weekly pay checks were \$70.28 in November, comparing with \$71.69 the previous month, and \$65 a year before. Average hours declined to 38.1, even below the November, 1949, figure and lower than any 1950 months except January and February when the long cold spell curtailed many activities.

Hours of work went down in practically every important industry group with the exception of machinery, where plants busy on trucks, trailers, pumps and fans reported increases. Textiles and apparel also stepped up activities slightly, while plywood mills and other finishing wood operations continued high with 42 hours a week as against 42.8 in October. Steel and can plants cut down sharply on overtime.

Only slight changes in the hourly pay scale were noted. The average increased slightly to \$1.84, a penny higher than in October and 14 cents above November, 1949. Biggest increase during the year came from "other wood products", representing plywood, planing and other finishing plants, which reported \$2.01 an hour against \$1.82.

Printing and publishing production workers continued to lead in both weekly and hourly earnings with \$79.39 and \$2.24 respectively, but little change was reported in recent months. Employees in canning and preserving plants were low with \$43.37 a week against \$48.15 in October and \$43.91 a year ago.

Relief Heifers Bring Milk To Speed Recovery

The official board of the First Methodist church has agreed to support the Heifers for Relief project, with fifty dollars to help with shipping costs. The annual conference of the Methodist Church of Oregon agreed last June to send a carload of heifers to Europe this year. This action is only a share in the nation-wide project sponsored by the Friends churches.

The Heifers for Relief organization purchases the animals and pays shipping costs to the wharf in New York City, from where they are delivered to Europe, where lists of people who are equipped to care for them are kept. There are from 9 to 13 million refugees in Western Germany, of which about 500,000 have an agricultural background. Meeting the need for a continuing supply of milk and building dairy herds is a permanent gift of overwhelming importance to the recovery of Europe and to the goodwill of the American people.

FINAL FISHING RULES ACTION SLATED BY GAME COMMISSION

Oregon state's game commission was meeting in Portland today to take final action on 1951 fishing regulations tentatively drawn and released two weeks ago.

Tentative regulations indicated opening dates of trout season will closely follow the pattern set last season, barring last minute changes these regulations are to be approved today.

Opening date for zone 1, coastal streams, and all of the Willamette watershed, except the McKenzie river, is set for April 28.

Greatest innovation in the new regulations, according to the commission, is the opening of hundreds of miles of tributary streams throughout the state to angling. Closed for many years, the streams have been investigated by field agents and populations of mature trout in them have been declared available for unrestricted fishing.

Steelhead Season Extended
Winter regulations already announced allow taking steelhead in coastal streams through March 11 instead of closing February 28 as in the past. Intensive research on the McKenzie river east of Eugene has resulted in a maximum length limit of 14 inches. This measure is designed to protect large spawning adults for a few years to improve natural reproduction in the stream.

In the Tualatin river drainage area the Tualatin river and tributaries above the Hillsboro water intake are closed at all times. Sain creek, above the Hillsboro water intake is also closed.
