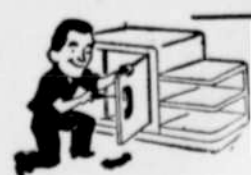

Rosa Newman, 91 Old Pioneer of Beaverton Dies

With the death of Mrs. Rosa Newman Saturday morning, January 13, Beaverton has lost one of its oldest citizens.

Born Rosa Filbert in southern Michigan she would have celebrated her 92nd birthday April 29. She came to Beaverton on May 13, 1879 the bride of the late John Henry. He was a pioneer of this the three men who later gave Beaverton its name. Two daughters were born to this union. The younger daughter, Alice, passed away in 1901.

In 1909 she was married to George Newman who died in 1937. Her entire married life was spent on the original homestead.

Having suffered a broken hip at the age of 77, she was confined to her home the latter years of her life.

She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Cora Henry Wetherell of Beaverton, two granddaughters, Mrs. A. Lars Nelson of St. John, Wash., and Mrs. Robert A. English of Ten Sleep, Wyoming, and four great grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted from the Pegg Mortuary Tuesday, January 16, at 2 p. m. with the Reverend O. L. Kendall of the University Park Methodist church officiating. Interment was in Crescent Grove cemetery.

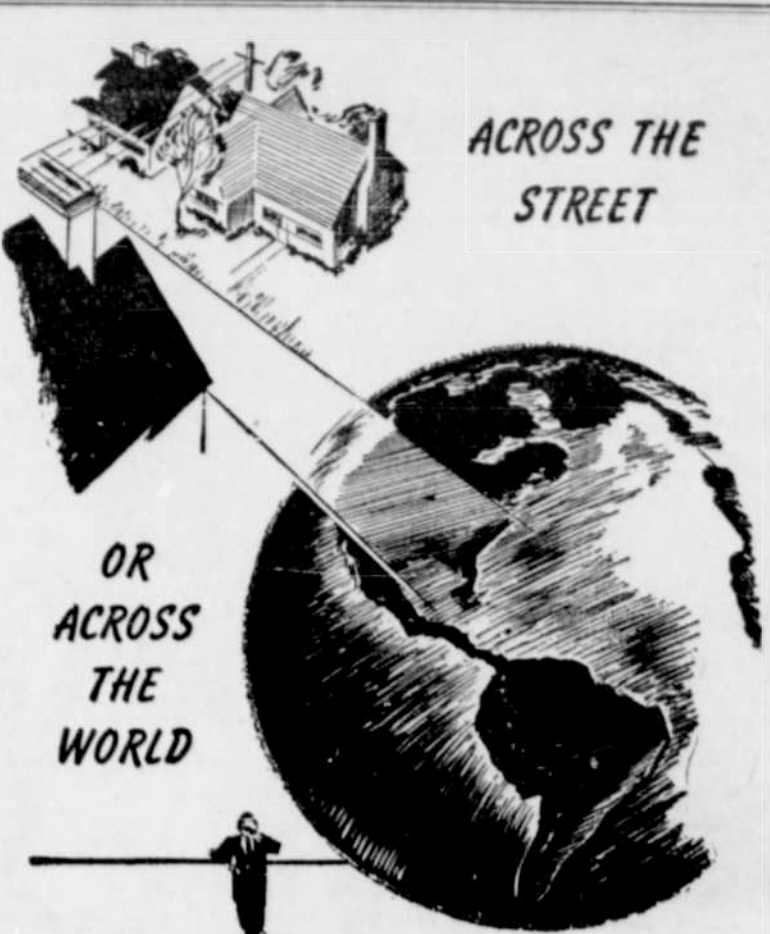
