Noted "Female Man" In County Jail.

BILLINGS, Mont., April 22.—The mighty Jane, "Calamity Jane," a noted scout who was with Custer on the Big Horn and who has scoured the Western plains for years with cowman and government officers, reposed the other night in the Yellowstone county jail. Jane spent the day before with friends. She visited many saloons and drinks were easily forthcoming to the old veteran.

Later in the evening she became boisterous on the street. She is noted for her lust of billingsgate and she turned loose her entire vocabulary in that line. It was impossible to quiet her and finally when patience was exhausted, she was arrested by Policemen Hayden.

STUDENTS MAY BE EXILED

(Journal Special Service.) ST. PETERSBURG, April 22.—St. Petersburg university and a number of higher educational institutions were reopened yesterday with a light attendance. Bottles of ill-smelling chemicals were opened in the lecture rooms.

Student reports give the number of arrests in Moscow during the last two or three weeks as 1,500. The exile to Siberia of the majority of the 400 students who offered the government armed resistance in the university of Moscow is expected.

WHOLESALE VACCINATION

DEADWOOD, S. D., April 22.—Two hundred and seven persons were vaccinated in one bunch at the Green Front Theater in Deadwood. The place is a variety house and dance hall and a case of small-pox was recently found there and removed.

The night following four doctors visited the house, accompanied by the sheriff and several deputies. The latter stood guard at all entrances to prevent the escape of any of the inmates, and the players and audience alike had to submit to the operation. A great many tried to force their way through the doors and get out, but were driven back, one being badly beaten in the attempt. Three or four made their escape through the skylight. Others who could not show that they had been successfully vaccinated within two years or had had smallpox were ordered to bare their arms. All complied but five, who were marched to the county jail to spend the night. They were turned out upon submitting to the virus inoculation.

RUSSIA HARD UP

ST. PETERSBURG, April 22.—General report has it that Minister Witte seriously proposed to charge all Russians who desire to go abroad 300 rubles for the first six months and 200 rubles for each additional half year. Fiscal as well as political reasons are urged in favor of this project, complaint being made that wealthy Russians are wasting the money of their country in Paris and Monte Carlo.

FARMERS ARE HAPPY.

George H. Hibbs gives a glowing report of conditions in the Hood River country, where he has spent the past week in the interests of the Oregon Historical Society. The strawberry-growers are increasing their acreage over 50 per cent this year, and more apple trees are being set out. Last season an order for 10 carloads of Hood River apples came from the East, but owing to the shortage of the supply it could not be filled. The price acreage is being added to also. An air of prosperity can be seen among the farmers, and the indications for many returns from the various products of that section this year were never equaled there.

SWEET WILL RUN CAMPAIGN

Democrats Elect Him Chairman and J. B. Ryan Secretary.

After a lively contest last night at the rooms of the Mining Stock Exchange, the Democratic City and County Committee elected Judge Alex. Sweet, chairman and John B. Ryan secretary of the committee. Fifty of the 70 members were present.

In the absence of Chairman H. B. Adams, W. N. Gatens called the meeting to order. On motion of James Gleason, C. B. Williams was unanimously elected temporary chairman.

John Lamont nominated Alex. Sweet for permanent chairman. W. T. Vaughn and Pat Powers seconded the nomination. Jimmy Gleason nominated John Van Zante. The nomination was seconded by John T. Miller and Geo. H. Thomas. The roll was called when Sweet received 43 votes and Van Zante 25. Mr. Van Zante then moved to make the nomination unanimous, which was accordingly done.

MRS. ROOSEVELT WILL PUT ON SOME STYLE

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Fill Up the Gulches.

City Engineer W. B. Chase stated today that if the city and the property-owners work in unison in the matter of filling up the gulches of the city that are now spanned by low bridges, the task could be accomplished in a few years. Altogether there are about two miles of filling to be done. Thus far, only sixteenth street has been treated in this fashion. The dirt has been brought up to the proper grade and the planks will be laid next. Owing to the loss to 12 per cent shrinkage of the loose earth, it will be necessary to first plank it, then after a year or more crushed rock may be substituted. The City Engineer is now busy compiling a list of the property-owners abutting these proposed fills, and as soon as it is completed the general work will be ready to go ahead.
