

GREAT CROWD OF ODD FELLOWS

Three Thousand at Dedication of Odd Fellows' Home.

In the presence of between 2500 and 3000 people, the Odd Fellows' Home near Kenilworth was dedicated this morning.

The gathering clouds and the falling mist did not seem to dampen the ardor of those present.

Visitors began to arrive late last evening, and a steady stream flocked out to the grounds early this morning.

Shortly after the hour set, 10:30 this morning, the services of dedication were begun, the following grand officers officiating: J. H. Nelson, grand master, McMinnville; Robert Andrews, deputy grand master, Portland; Joseph Micelli, grand warden, Roseburg; E. E. Sharon, grand secretary, Portland; Byron E. Miller, grand treasurer, Portland; J. K. Weatherford, grand representative, Albany; C. L. Palmer, grand representative, Baker City; G. V. Standish, grand marshal, Brownsville; A. W. Storey, grand conductor, Ashland; George H. Foster, grand guardian, Baker City; G. M. Morrison, grand herald, Adams; A. LeRoy, grand chaplain, La Grande.

Mrs. Nellie L. Gustin, president of the Rebekah Assembly, represented the women's branch of the order, being assisted by several other members. The Rebekah Lodge has done a great deal toward furnishing up the new home, and deserves credit for its zeal.

When the visitors arrived in the city they were escorted to the Odd Fellows Temple, corner First and Alder streets, and each was presented with a button with the picture of the new home and the words "I. O. O. F." and the date of dedication.

From the Temple they were taken out to the home, where the dedicatory services were held, after which a light lunch was served.

The morning program was as follows: Opening ode; prayer, Brother A. LeRoy; music, orchestra; dedication addresses by Brother J. J. Walton, past grand master, and Brother O. D. Doane, grand past master.

Dr. W. T. Williamson made a very pleasing dedicatory address, stating the objects of the order, past, present and future.

Mrs. Gustin delivered an address on the work of the Rebekahs and the uplifting of the order in general.

Miss Hurley followed with a song, after which the orchestra discoursed music. The home was crowded with visitors long before the time for the services commenced. Visitors were there from all over the state and Western Washington.

After the dedication ceremonies luncheon, consisting of sandwiches without amber and coffee, was served.

A reception was held by the Rebekahs at the Odd Fellows Temple, corner First and Alder streets, at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The 33d anniversary of the founding of the order will be celebrated at the White Temple this evening at 8 o'clock.

It was on May 21, 1878, that the Odd Fellows of Oregon decided that their lodge needed a home for the care of aged members, and soon afterwards a farm containing 100 acres of land was purchased near Fairview. The cornerstone of a four-story frame building was laid, the oration of the day being delivered by the late Senator J. N. Dolph. The building, though, was never finished. Several years ago it was decided to sell the property and purchase a home in a more central location. Bids were asked from the different cities of the state, the one subscribing the largest sum, to determine the location of the home. The honor fell to Portland, and the present grounds were selected. The building and ground cost about \$10,500.
