The Louisiana Convention Was Opened with Prayer.

(Journal Special Service.) NEW ORLEANS, April 28.—Representative bankers and business men from all parts of the state were present today at the opening of the second annual meeting of the Louisiana Bankers' Association.

The gathering was called to order by President James T. Hayden, and the opening prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. B. M. Palmer.

After an address of welcome by Mayor Cabdville, the convention listened to an address by President M. J. Sanders, of the Progressive Union, on "The Port of New Orleans and the Future of the State."

The opening session concluded with the reports of the officers and the various committees.

One of the principal matters to receive the attention of the convention, which will be in session two days, is the proposed law to give operation to the principle of leaving property in trust.

The committee on legislation has prepared a special report on the subject, and a plan of campaign to secure the enactment of the measure will be outlined.

MILLIONS IN BONDS (Journal Special Service.) NEW YORK, April 29.—In financial circles considerable interest is manifested in the special meeting of the stockholders of the Pittsburg Coal Company at Jersey City today.

The purpose of the meeting is to vote on a proposition to issue \$5,000,000 worth of gold bonds, bearing 5 per cent. interest, to meet the cost of additional lands purchased recently.

The Union Trust Company of Pittsburg has agreed to take the entire issue in bonds of \$5,000,000.

The explanation given for the issue is that it became necessary to purchase large tracts of land at enhanced values, and that the sinking fund of the company was not equal to the excessive and unexpected strain.

RETIREMENT (Journal Special Service.) WASHINGTON, April 29.—To the long list of important naval retirements, this spring another was added today, when Captain Charles Henry Rockwell was retired by operation of the age limit.

Captain Rockwell was born in and appointed from Massachusetts and has served nearly forty years. He retires with the rank and title of rear admiral, junior class.

REMOVED FROM HOTEL Sol Smith Russell's Funeral Tomorrow Afternoon.

(Scripps-McRae News Association.) WASHINGTON, April 29.—The remains of Sol Smith Russell were removed today from the Hotel Richmond to the residence of his brother-in-law, Fred Berger, where the funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon.

Mrs. Russell, who bears up remarkably well, is receiving hundreds of telegrams of sympathy.

SULTANA SURVIVORS (Journal Special Service.) FT. WAYNE, Ind., April 29.—The survivors of the historic Sultana disaster assembled in this city today for their annual reunion.

Several states are represented among the visitors.

The local Grand Army members and Spanish-American war veterans escorted the visitors to Saengerbund Hall, where a business session was held this morning.

A public meeting will be held this evening, at which there will be an address by Lieutenant-Governor Gilbert, and the recitation of personal experiences by several of the Sultana survivors.

SUPREME COURT OF FORESTERS (Journal Special Service.) LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 29.—Upwards of 300 delegates, who come from all parts of the United States and Canada, are gathered in Los Angeles for the twelfth triennial session of the supreme court of the Independent Order of Foresters.

At the opening session in Blanchard's Hall today the visitors were cordially welcomed by Mayor Snyder, to whose address response was made by the supreme chief ranger of the order, Dr. Or-ohyatekha, of Toronto.

The regular business of the convention will be taken up tomorrow, and is expected to occupy three or four days, as several matters of importance are to be brought up for consideration and action.

Ask For New Surveys.

The owners of the old Oregon Military road and grant from Eugene to the eastern boundary of the state have applied to United States Surveyor General Meadron for the survey of 10 full and fractional townships in order that they may make selections of their lands.

The old road runs from Eugene to Goose Lake and thence northwest to the eastern state line. The grant consists of the 253 numbered sections in a strip six miles wide along the road.

STILL IMPROVING (Scripps-McRae News Association.) HET LOO, Holland, April 29.—The Queen continues to improve.

The following bulletin was issued this morning: "The Queen passed a quiet night. Her symptoms indicate an improvement in her condition."

TRAVELERS FOR HIM. Assurances have been received at Democratic headquarters from a reliable source that, almost to a man, the commercial travelers will support Mr. Chamberlain for Governor.

A drummer who returned from Eastern Oregon yesterday made the remark on the train that while he had talked with nearly every merchant in that part of the state, he had not found a single one who was opposed to Chamberlain.

RIVER AND OCEAN. The Italian bark Cavanti, recently released from a libel suit at Everett, Wash., has sailed for Peru.

The French bark Vendee will complete her cargo in a few days.

The steamer Dallas City left yesterday for The Dalles, where she will receive a new coat of paint.

The steamer Undine carried 250 recruits to Vancouver yesterday for the Seventh Infantry. The men came from San Francisco.

The German bark Nomia, chartered by Givlin & Eyre, will leave up from Astoria today. Very little new crop chartering is being done, owing to high rates asked by the owners of vessels.

The British ship Ventura is the latest vessel on route for this port. It comes from Antwerp to Taylor, Young & Co. This makes six ships coming from Antwerp, the others being the Christel, Bidston Hill, Copley, Hollywood and Mussel-crag.

The United States revenue cutter Bear left Seattle last night for a cruise in Bering Sea and the Arctic. She had on board a representative of the government who goes North to inquire into the condition of the natives. Another mission of the vessel is to land 400 Siberian reindeer on St. Lawrence Island for use of the natives.

The Pollard Steamship Company, operating between Aberdeen and San Francisco, has entered into an arrangement with the Northern Pacific Railway Company whereby passengers may leave Seattle for Aberdeen by rail, and then from that point to San Francisco by steamer, making the trip in two days. This has been a favorite route of passengers, but heretofore no steamers made the run at any stated periods.

William Dwyer, whose back was broken by a fall on the British ship Ardnamurchan some time ago, has regained his strength sufficiently to start for his home in England. Accompanied by his mother he will leave for New York Thursday, and physicians believe that the trip will be beneficial to him. At the time the accident occurred it was thought the injuries would prove fatal, but the young sailor has been gradually improving.
