Such feeling, such naturalness of human emotion we seldom find depicted. The listener suffers as the actor seems to suffer. It is so real. The tragic tension is strong, but there is no exaggeration, no absurdity of action.

The support is good throughout, especially Miss Linden and Miss O'Malley and Mr. Canfield. Tonight we have the opportunity of seeing Mr. Willard in something different—The Professor's Love Story. It can be caught else but pleasing.
