The University of California baseball team departs on May 18 for an extensive trip through the Northern States and Canada. The itinerary for the trip is nearly completed, and the college ball players have arranged to meet the leading teams in the Northwest.

The Californians will come direct to Portland, where they will meet the Multnomah Athletic Club on May 21. The next games will be played on May 23 and 24, at Victoria, B. C., during the celebration of the anniversary of Queen Victoria's coronation. During the latter part of May a game will be played at Rosslyn, Canada, and on June 1 at Spokane.

Two games will be played at Butte, Mont., and one each at Great Falls and Helena. Upon the return trip bats will be crossed at Spokane, Vancouver, Tacoma, Seattle and Nanaimo. Games will be played on July 3 and 4 at Portland.

An innovation has been established by the Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club, and all interested in athletics will be admitted free tonight to witness the indoor meet of the athletes looking for honors. The different events scheduled follow:

Running high dive, for record: pole-vault, 15-yard dash, running high jump, wrestling match (not open), boxing match (not open); standing hop, step and jump; rope-climbing, hand-over-hand; combination rings and high jump; running long dive, for record.

The running long dive record for distance will be one of the most interesting features. This record, 13 feet 5 1/2 inches, was held by Beck of the Portland Y. M. C. A. for two years until broken about 10 days ago by a member of the Y. M. C. A. in Edson, with a record of 13 feet 7 1/2 inches.

Bert Kerrigan, who now holds the American record for the running high dive, will also try to break the record in the long dive. It may be possible that he will be able to break his own record in the high dive made in January.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 2.—The presence of hundreds of visitors for the American Derby causes the Empire Athletic Club to expect a large attendance tonight when Joe Chynski and Al Weingie "Kid" Carter a terrific battle in Chicago. Chynski, though one of the veterans of the ring, is still regarded as a tough proposition for the best men of his class. Both appear to be in good shape for the battle.

Jack Jeffries has begun his training for the coming bout with Hank Griffin about May 12. Jack is working at the Jeffries mansion in East Los Angeles, where the champion has fitted up rea-

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 2.—Tomorrow the race meeting at Churchill Downs will open with the historic Kentucky Derby. The horsemen are gathered in force, and are sending their bangtails down the line in good form. The track during the past few days has been in splendid condition and many fast works have been recorded. The track, it might be said, has been in perfect shape all week, and as a result the derby candidates have all been out. It is generally conceded that John W. Schorr's Abe Frank, Frank McDowell's Alan-a-Dale and John E. Madden's Slipthrift will be the contenders in the derby, with Abe Frank a slight favorite.

NEW YORK, May 2.—Devilotes of the game of billiards are on the qui vive in anticipation of a battle royal between the two foremost cue experts in the world. BIG TIME

Given Mr. Chamberlain at Roseburg.

Sentiment That He Will Sweep the County.

(Journal Special Service.)

ROSEBURG, May 2.—Hon. George E. Chamberlain and his associates on the Democratic ticket continued their tour through the valley from the fine beginning made at points south from here and were greeted by an immense throng here last night. J. K. Weatherford, candidate for Congress from the First district; Colonel J. H. Raley, candidate for Attorney-General; W. A. Wann, for Superintendent, and Henry Blackman, for State Treasurer, accompanied Mr. Chamberlain. The meeting held here was of a nature to indicate enthusiasm for the Democratic ticket, and Mr. Chamberlain especially was given an ovation.

The candidates were met at the train by hundreds of citizens, and escorted to their hotel, where they held an informal reception, in the evening proceeding to the hall, and addressing a crowd that more than filled the room.

The principal address of the evening was given by the candidate for Governor, and it was a masterly discussion of the issues of the campaign. He took up the subject of the conduct of the state government, evincing perfect familiarity with public affairs, and offering solution for many of the problems that have absorbed attention of the taxpayers during past years.

The other candidates spoke, and presented arguments why the Democratic ticket should be elected next June.

The visit to Roseburg, which is the home of A. M. Crawford, Republican candidate for Attorney-General, developed the fact that Crawford is not strong in his home county, and that Colonel Raley will secure more hearty support than Crawford.

At Chamberlain sentiment, it is the opinion of local politicians that he will sweep this region. His friends are legion, and there is a disposition to support him regardless of party affiliations. Estimates were given on the status of the vote, and the result was to demonstrate that success is assured for Chamberlain throughout this part of the state.

The candidates left for Eugene, where they appear tonight, and where preparations have been made for a big demonstration.

Mr. Chamberlain was asked by a representative of The Journal how he looked upon the progress of the campaign thus far. He replied:

"I am more than pleased with the outlook. I find that the ticket is growing in strength, and that the apparent landslide towards us as viewed from a distance is a reality which local conditions are learned. You may see, in brief, that I am assured from all quarters of support from the voters regardless of party lines, and that these assurances are from reliable sources. They are not mere hints, but open declarations of loyalty throughout the campaign. The outlook is exceedingly bright."

THE PARK COMMISSION

Will Now Sell Guinea Pigs and Canaries.

The question of retaining the guinea pigs in the City Park engaged the chief attention of the Board of Park Commissioners at their monthly meeting in the City Hall this morning. When Park Keeper Lowitz submitted plans for the proposed house for the pigs, Commissioner Rufus Mallory said that he thought the best way to solve the guinea pig problem was to give them away to anybody who would come and get them. A motion was made to authorize the keeper to dispose of them, and Commissioner Fleckenstein seconded it. T. L. Elliott suggested that perhaps Colonel L. L. Hawkins might have a good word for the guinea pigs. Mr. Hawkins said he was opposed to giving them up; that they were a feature of the park, and that if they were confined to some place by themselves and had a house where they could keep warm it would be better to keep them. Commissioner C. F. Beebe, who had been an attentive listener to the controversy, inquired of Keeper Lowitz:

"Of what particular interest are the guinea pigs, anyway?"

Mr. Labovitz replied that they were great attractions for children.

Colonel Hawkins then explained that the canary birds, as well as the pigs of the City Park, were reproducing so rapidly that some means would have to be adopted of thinning them out. It was suggested to sell them, and the question of arranging a schedule of prices was referred to the zoological committee.

The judiciary committee reported adversely on the request of candy-peddlers to work the parks, and the same was adopted.

Commissioner Fleckenstein stated that Columbia Park had been fenced, and that the underbrush would have to be taken out and the stumps removed. He was authorized to complete the improvements. Some of the transplanted trees have died, but owing to the heavy winds and the soft nature of the soil, Park Keeper Lowitz explained that this was to be expected, and that probably not more than one-half of those set out would live. The need of a station in front of the park gates was spoken of. Mr. Mallory promised to take the matter up with the City & Suburban Railway Company at their next meeting.

The chairman was authorized to purchase three box swings for Terwilliger Park. T. L. Elliott reported progress in the matter of correspondence with Eastern parties to secure a landscape architect. Colonel Hawkins reported that the path connecting McClay Park with the City Park had been completed.

Dr. Elliott was authorized to draw up a set of resolutions asking the executive committee of the Lewis and Clark Fair to bear in mind the value of permanent improvements for City Park purposes.

The bills for April, including the pay roll, were allowed, amounting to \$1583.95. The estimate for May is \$1195.60.

The ladies of Sellwood were busy today decorating the hall with flowers and bunting. A grand banquet will be given in the hall by the ladies after the exercises are concluded.

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OPENING

Of the Woolen Mills at Sellwood Today.

Today was a red-letter day in the history of Sellwood.

The Portland Woolen Mills at that place were thrown open to the general public today for inspection for the first time and the citizens of Sellwood prepared an interesting program to commemorate the event.

A large number visited the mills this morning and inspected the plant. The credit for securing the new industry belongs to Charles Cooley, whose untiring energy was brought into play about five years ago to secure a woolen mill for this city, and he has kept everlastingly at it until he landed the prize.

At present about 25 people are employed in the mill, and the force will be increased as soon as the machinery which is now on the road is installed and in working order. The full capacity of the mill will be about 125 employees.

The company owns 47 acres of land near Sellwood, where the mill is located, and it is the intention to help their employees to build cottages on the grounds by advancing them the necessary money permitting them to repay it in monthly payments the same as rent, the money to be applied on the purchase price. "In this manner," said a mill official today, "the employees will take an interest in the success of the enterprise."

The officials of the Portland Woolen Mills Company are: W. P. Olds, president; E. L. Thompson, secretary and treasurer; Charles Cooley, Fred Carter, W. P. Olds, E. L. Thompson and H. W. Hogue, directors; Charles H. Carter, superintendent and manager.

An effort is being made by the company to establish a clothing factory in connection with the mills, the estimated cost of which will be about \$55,000. Nearly all of the goods manufactured in the state are sent East and then returned to the Coast after manufacture.

The establishment of a clothing factory in this city will save the consumers quite a large sum in freight shipments. Tonight the Sellwood Sub-Board of Trade will have charge of the exercises in Firemen's hall, the program being as follows:
