EXTENSION OF HOMESTEAD LAW

New Rule Favorable to Irrigation Bill.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Senator Gibson of Montana today introduced a bill extending the privileges of additional homestead entry to veterans of the civil war, who had served less than 90 days and who had been discharged from the service by reason of wounds received in action; also extending the privilege to widows and orphan children of soldiers killed in action before completing the 90-day service.

Grain, Flour, Feed and Millstuffs Are Defined.

A circular issued by the Northern Pacific general freight department, which will become effective May 20, is of more than passing interest. It defines what is meant by the terms "grain," "feed," "millstuffs" and "grain products."

oat groats, oatmeal, pea meal, bean meal, rolled barley, rolled oats, rolled rye, rolled wheat, and wheat manna. Shredded wheat or imitation coffees are not included in the millstuffs rate. Grain rates will not apply on popcorn. Flaxseed and malt will take grain rates in straight carloads only, unless otherwise provided for.
