FLEECE HER EASY SISTERS

The Medford Teachers Neatly Worked by a Smooth Crook.

MEDFORD, Or., May 12.—A tall, dark young woman, dressed in the height of fashion, flitted through Medford Saturday, and a couple of school teachers here who gave her \$20 each would like to know of her present whereabouts.

The young woman represented herself to be traveling for the Sprague Book Company of Chicago, successors to J. H. Moore. Teachers seem to be her especial prey.

"I make you an offer," said she, in suave business tones, to some of the local teachers, "by which you can travel over the country during vacation time and make all expenses and earn \$25 per month."

Then she unfolded her plan to the interested listeners. It was simply this: By advancing \$20 each, they were to get outfits with which they were to establish agencies any place west of the Rocky mountains and charge each agent \$7. They were to stop at the best hotels and get all expenses paid, besides their salaries. In each town they visited they were to first interview the leading minister or doctor and ask his advice about appointing agents.

"You understand," she said impressively, "you do not have to do any canvassing. It is a very lady-like occupation, very."

A couple of the teachers produced the necessary coin, but got suspicious and asked for the return of their money. The smooth young woman said she had already sent in the orders and would have to wait until she had heard from her firm in Chicago. Local teachers here claim several of the teachers in Ashland "bit" at the scheme. Those in Grants Pass were warned by telephone.

MEDFORD NOTES.

G. Stoltz, a manufacturer of vinegar and cider in Salem, was here during the past week, looking over the field with a view of starting a similar factory. He says the Medford apples contain 4 per cent more sugar than any he ever handled.

There will be a creamery man here next week to look over the field with a view of starting a creamery.

The City Council is figuring on putting in an independent line in opposition to the Sunset Telephone & Telegraph Company, so as to communicate with its water and electric plant and city offices.

Mayor Crowell states that the decision of Judge Bellinger the other day overruling the demurrer of the Sunset Telephone & Telegraph Company, as the city of Medford was not based upon the merits of the case, but simply upon the demurrer. Guided by the demurrer, the court, he says, assumed that a franchise had been granted the Sunset Company, when in fact no such franchise was ever granted, which will be shown in the answer the city is preparing to file to the original complaint of the company.

Orchardists all over the Rogue River Valley predict extra large crops. The weather for the past month has been perfect for crops—cloudy, moist and warm. It has proven a much later spring than usual so far as rain was concerned, but it has kept warm, and danger of frost is practically over.

Discarding Furnish Buttons.

LA GRANDE, Or., May 12.—A most remarkable feature of the state campaign that has begun to warm up here considerably, is the fact, developed here during the past few days, that many of the Republican candidates of this locality have removed the furnish buttons from the lapels of their coats. When the campaign opened the buttons came in from headquarters in Portland, and at once they were pinned to the coats of the faithful, with great glee. It was apparent that everything was serene in the furnish camp, and that the leaders of the forces of the Pendleton banker had things lined up all right.

They made claims in the papers of the state that furnish was going to sweep Eastern Oregon, and that all of the old and young war horses were properly enthused. Later, it was found that such an impression was erroneous.

There were grumblings and discontent, and this began to show in the openly declared hostility on the part of a few. These few soon had accessions to their numbers, until it was manifest that there was a large-sized disaffection. So marked did this become, that the Republican candidates actually took off their furnish buttons.

One of them had been absent from the County, and had one of the buttons upon his lapel. He returned to his home and, finding that he was the only one of the bunch that was wearing a furnish button, appeared the following day without his.

The incident has been noticed generally, and causes no little comment among the voters of all classes. It illustrates that there is a sentiment throughout the Eastern part of the state that will show itself on election day in a heavy vote for Chamberlain for Governor. Of this, the best political guessers in this region are certain.

PLOWED UP GOLD.

GRANTS PASS, May 12.—News is revealed here that a farmer of the Gold Hill mining district, east of this city, while ploughing in his corn field, uncovered a number of large pieces of gold quartz. Some of the chunks are half gold and contain \$150 each.

RAILROAD SURVEY STARTED

GRANTS PASS, May 12.—The surveyors and engineers for the Oregon & Pacific Railway, which will run from Grants Pass to Crescent City, Cal., are here, under the management of Colonel T. W. Draper of San Francisco, chief engineer of the proposed road. They have made their first camp across Rogue river about one mile from this city, and will begin at once the survey of the road from here to Waldo in southwestern Josephine County, where the rich copper mines of the company are located.

FRANK REED FREE.

ROSEBURG, May 12.—Frank Reed, who shot and killed a man named Owen, whom he suspected of stealing an overcoat in Eugene, had a preliminary hearing before Justice Robinson, and was discharged. Owen alighted from a train and when the officer ordered him to halt he started to run. Reed discharged his revolver at the fleeing man, the bullet striking him in the back of the head. The justice concluded that no evidence had been introduced to the effect that Reed intended to kill Owen, and discharged the defendant.

Reed contended that the bullet struck the ground and glanced upward.

HIDDEN GOLD.

GRANTS PASS, May 12.—A probable mythical story of buried treasure has set several men to work on the claim of Jas. Luck, a Willow Springs district miner, searching for a sum of money, in the shape of gold dust and nuggets, valued all the way from \$5000 to \$20,000, which it is believed was concealed by its owner before his death, which recently occurred. Luck had mined in the vicinity since the early '50s.

A 30-ton Bryan concentrator is being erected on the Maybelle group of claims two miles east of town.

CHAMBERLAIN MAKES VOTES

THREATEN WAR

SALEM, May 12.—Despite the desperate attempts of the small furnish faction in Marion County to deny the fact that their candidate will not receive any considerable vote, even of the Republicans here, and despite the report daily sent to the Oregonian to that effect, the feeling against the banker candidate is daily growing in bitterness and extent and an editorial utterance of the Salem Statesman—which is a present supporting furnish—has put it beyond the power of even that political ring to longer dispute the fact that the Geer men are about to wage a war to the knife against the men who turned their leader down. The statement in that paper that if the fight on Geer were not dropped (the majority of some of the furnish) candidates would look like 30 cents," has created a sensation, and prominent Republicans are openly admitting that furnish is already a dead end in Marion. This is no campaign story. It is the fact.

The manner in which Geer was sold out at the convention, the bitter personal fight which has been waged on him by the paid retainers of furnish and Fulton, the misrepresentations which daily flood the pages of the Oregonian, and the manner in which Dunbar has treated the candidacy of Geer for the Senate, are fast doing their work and there is now absolutely no doubt that the friends of the Governor realize that in order that he may have any chance furnish and all his supporters must be knifed at the polls.

Money talks, they say, and the fact that a bet of a large amount was recently made here that Chamberlain would carry Marion County by 500 indicates that the general feeling is not particularly favorable to the furnish supporters. Reports of the feeling in the rural districts also confirm this view. The great thing with the farmers is the proposal to put all state officers on flat salaries, and furnish's shuffling attitude on this question, when contrasted with Chamberlain's plain promise to do all in his power to compensate the farmers, are turning hosts of old-time Republicans to vote for the man who is likely to work for the reform.

An indication of the effect of the open threat by the Statesman, voicing the sentiments of the Geer men, was seen in an attempted meeting of the furnish faction, calling themselves the Salem Republican Club, in the City Hall last night. Only about 10 of the most rabid furnish partisans were present, and after some desultory and despondent talk the meeting adjourned with the secret conviction that they were the unfortunate apostles of a lost cause.

INDEPENDENCE.

INDEPENDENCE, May 12.—Last Friday evening, while taking a drive, Clyde Hill had a serious runaway accident. When about a mile from town, his team became frightened at a large piece of tin and other building material in the road, and started to run. The buggy was upset and Miss Mollie Johnson and Miss Gertrude Dickinson, who were with Mr. Hill, were thrown out. Miss Dickinson received slight injuries and Miss Johnson was seriously bruised about her limbs and forehead, and her back was severely injured. The buggy was wrecked.

The end of her thumb was pushed against the needle, the instrument running into the finger, striking the bone and breaking off. After splitting the thumb, the needle was removed in three pieces.

CARELESS CANDIDATE.

THE DALLES, May 12.—Earl Sanders, Democratic candidate for Representative for Wasco, Crook, Lake and Klamath Counties, failed to file his acceptance of nomination within the time prescribed by law, and is now circulating a petition for signatures to allow his name to be placed on the ticket.

LINN COUNTY

(Journal Special Service.)

ALBANY, May 12.—The progress of the campaign thus far in Linn County is decidedly favorable to the Democratic ticket. Chamberlain will have a majority of not less than 800 over furnish, and it may be considerably greater.

To Give Chamberlain a Big Majority, Says a Correspondent.

(Journal Special Service.)

Percy Kelly, who is a candidate for reelection on the Republican ticket, will be defeated. Four years ago he was elected by a scratch, a plurality of about 40 votes, which was due to the influence of the Gun Club, which wanted to defeat Clem and Mackie, the Democratic candidates. Mackie proved the weaker of the two, and Kelly's election was the result, although the real effort was to defeat Clem. Four years ago Kelly pledged himself to vote for the mortgage tax law, and thereby got a number of votes from farmers, but he failed to keep faith when the opportunity offered to keep his pledge. At the last session of the Legislature, a mortgage tax bill passed the House, through the efforts of Representative Whitney, and was sent to the Senate 10 days before adjournment. Kelly paid no attention to it, refused to urge its passage, but let it die on the calendar. The farmers who supported him have not forgotten this, and will not trust him again. Kelly's action in forcing the election of Jim Finch as calendar clerk of the Senate will also operate against him. Finch was for years a Populist, fighting the Republicans in Linn County, but lately joined the Republicans, being rewarded by a position he was in no way entitled to. Senator Kelly forced his recognition, much to the disgust of many Linn County Republicans.

The registration in Linn County is 1400 short of the number registered two years ago, and Republicans will suffer greatly from this difference on the part of many voters in this county. Linn will give an old-time majority to most of the candidates on the Democratic ticket, particularly those seeking legislative honors.

Whitney, the Republican candidate for State Printer, will fall far behind his ticket, many Republicans refusing to vote for him.

SALEM NEWS NOTES

SALEM, May 12.—At a meeting of the Salem Woman's Club, at the Hotel Wilmamette Saturday afternoon, the annual election of officers was held. Mrs. T. T. Geer was re-elected president. Mrs. R. S. Bean, re-elected vice president; Miss Mattie Beatty, secretary; Mrs. C. L. Ogilvie, treasurer. The following are members of the executive board: Mrs. J. F. Calbreath, Mrs. R. Catlin and Mrs. Alice H. Dodd. The calendar committee: Literature, Mrs. Dr. C. L. Bristol-Kellher; science, Mrs. William Brown; art, Mrs. Myra A. Higgins; education and domestic science, Mrs. Florence Irwin; current events, Mrs. George W. Jones. Some amendments to the constitution and by-laws were also made.

The much-expected report of the experts engaged in examining the records of the Marion County officers did not materialize last Saturday as was anticipated. The report could not be completed in time to submit the same, and will probably not be handed in before next Wednesday. While the experts and the County Court refuse to disclose the nature of the report, enough has been learned to indicate some strong recommendations will be submitted for the introduction of a new system of record-keeping hereafter. The present system is condemned because of its bulkiness and unnecessary complication. The report will also touch pointedly upon the management of the different offices.

Work of expediting commenced last November, and during the six months some \$3000 delinquent tax money has been turned into the treasury.

Seven hundred dollars has been raised by popular subscription toward the Fourth of July celebration to be given here. The committee expects to raise \$2000, and feels very much encouraged in its work. The celebration is to be the greatest ever held in this part of Oregon.

Tip Humphrey of the Jefferson Review was in Salem Saturday. In speaking of the political situation, Mr. Humphrey said he was certain of the election of George E. Chamberlain for Governor. He estimates Chamberlain will carry Linn County by from 800 to 1000 majority. He expressed himself as very much pleased at the outlook.

The W. C. T. U. of this city is to have a home of its own. Active canvass is now on and somewhere in the neighborhood of \$1500 has been subscribed toward the cause.

Deeds aggregating \$40,000 were filed in the office of the County Recorder last week. Marion County in general has been struck with a regular boom in the real estate line. Such activity in land matters has not been seen during the last 10 years.

BIG LAND DEAL.

ASTORIA, May 12.—A land deal involving an investment of \$700,000 and 104,000 acres of land on Coos Bay is one of the recent transactions that is greatly discussed here at this time. M. J. Kinney of this city is the principal in the deal. Fifteen thousand acres of the tract are coal lands, 60,000 timber and the remainder grazing land and townships. Another deal involving 100,000 acres of fine timber land is nearly ready for closing.

OREGON CITY.

(Journal Special Service.)

OREGON CITY, May 12.—The administrator's sale Saturday afternoon of the John S. Green estate, consisting of 135 acres on the Upper Clackamas river, the strategic point of the water privilege that is to furnish the motive power for the proposed generating electric station of the Oregon General Electric Company, to F. S. Morris, of Portland, closed an intense contest supposedly with the Portland General Electric Company for the possession of a valuable franchise. Representatives of the Portland General Electric Company were present at the sale Saturday afternoon and parties supposedly in its interest did some lively bidding, until the property was finally knocked down to Mr. Morris for \$11,000. The latter's attorney, W. T. Muir, also was present.

Mr. Morris is prominently interested in the two corporations, the Portland City & Oregon Railway Company and the Oregon General Electric Company, and it has been given out by representatives of the trolley company that the proposed electric power station is to be used as a motive power in the probable extension of the railway lines to the Upper Clackamas.

Joseph Green, a brother of the deceased John S. Green, quit-claimed his interest to the property in question to George I. Brown, a representative of the Oregon General Electric Company, for the expressed consideration of \$1000 on the 20th of last November. On November 29 C. D. Latourette, local attorney of the Portland City & Oregon Railway, was appointed administrator of the estate on the petition of Joseph Green. Soon afterward Dan J. Moore of Portland, through his attorneys, Chamberlain & Thomas, began a contest for the removal of Latourette as administrator. Joseph Green changed his mind, and filed a petition for the appointment of Harvey E. Cross as administrator. After several hearings in the contest, Latourette resigned his trust as administrator, on stipulation that a third disinterested party be appointed. The court then appointed Tom P. Randall as administrator. The appraisers placed a total valuation of \$500 on the property, \$250 on 15 acres of deeded land, which included some islands in the river, and \$250 on 120 acres on which Green held contract of sale from the Oregon & California Railroad Company. There is still \$150 due on the railroad land.

The fact that Mr. Morris bid \$11,000 for 135 acres of unimproved land along the rocky bed of the Clackamas river is an indication of the value of the franchise for generating electric power. The fact also was known to the spirited bidders that Caroline Green, one of the heirs, had not acknowledged service of the citation calling attention to the sale.

The Mount Hood & Barlow Wagon Road Company filed its annual report with the County Board of Commissioners Saturday for the fiscal year ending April 7, 1902. The report shows that \$27,81 was expended in permanent improvements, and that the total expense of the road has been \$26,596.98. The tolls collected amounted to \$217.33, aside from permanent improvements.

A force of men are tearing down the roof of the Southern Pacific railroad bridge across the Clackamas river preparatory to building a steel bridge.

EUGENE.

EUGENE, Or., May 12.—The body of Eli Jeffries, the logger who was drowned at Jasper Thursday, was found Saturday three miles below the scene of the drowning. James Hoffman, a well-known Eugene capitalist, has sold his 200-acre farm several miles northwest of here, to Jacob Keeler, recently from Whiting, Iowa, for \$10,500.

A. J. Chapman, a prominent G. A. R. man, died here Saturday. He was aged 63 years. The funeral was held Sunday.
