CZAR IS IN DANGER Russia Seething With Revolt An Outbreak May Come Any Day.

(Journal Special Service.) ST. PETERSBURG, May 19. — The czar's 54th birthday was celebrated throughout the empire yesterday. Te Deums were sung in all the churches; a brilliant court reception was held at the Zarskoe-Tselo palace near St. Petersburg, and every city, town and hamlet was ablaze with white, blue and red by day and with illuminations by night.

Despite these outward manifestations of loyalty, however, there is no disguising the state of unrest among the czar's subjects, and especially among the working people of Central Russia. The alarming progress of the revolutionary agitation forms the main subject of conversation of all classes, especially manufacturers and commercial men.
