

BEFORE ITS MOTHER'S EYES

A New York Child is Burned to Death.

NEW YORK, May 19.—Crippled with rheumatism and unable to move from her bed, Mrs. William Wagner, of Newark, N. J., saw her daughter Edna, two and one-half years old, burned to death within a few feet of her bed. Mrs. Wagner has been unable to get out of bed for a month. While her nurse was absent the child procured matches and, while playing with them, set fire to her clothing and the curtains. Mrs. Wagner screamed loudly, but the child was fatally burned before assistance arrived. After the fire, which had spread about the room, had been quenched, Mrs. Wagner was found to be unconscious.

A LONG JUMP.

DANVILLE, Ky., May 19.—Leonard Lucas, a turkman, was riding along a narrow road above Dix river, when his colt became uncontrollable and plunged straight for the brow of the cliff. Every effort to rein the animal back was fruitless, and just as the horse went into the air Lucas leaped.

A growth of bushes and saplings 30 feet down the cliff arrested his fall, and, clinging to these, the man managed to gain an insecure foothold, from which he worked his way back to the road overhead. The colt's spring carried him clear off the cliff, and he struck full on his back in the river 150 feet below. The water is 20 feet deep at that point. The colt swam ashore.

LONG AND SHORT

"YOU SHOULD BE HANGED"

CHICAGO, May 19.—Guy Locke, aged 18, and Edward C. Buysse, 20 years of age, were sentenced to penal servitude for life for the murder of Peter Fafinski. "You ought to be hanged—you deserve it; but being minors protects you," said Judge Brennan, in announcing sentence. The murder was committed while the boys were attempting to rob Kalfinski's grocery.

AN EARLY START

DENVER, May 19.—"I have been a burglar ever since I was eight years old, and this is the first time I ever was caught." This was the remark made yesterday by Edward Bradley, charged with burglarizing the house of James W. Pope, No. 1130 Logan avenue. Bradley was held in \$500 bond for trial by the criminal court by Magistrate Hynes. He made his remarkable confession while on his way to the county jail, in charge of Deputy Sheriff James Connolly. Bradley is now about 25 years old.

HOT FIGHT

FORT SMITH, Ark., May 19.—P. R. Davis, a wealthy wholesale merchant of Fort Smith, was stabbed five times in an encounter in his bedroom with a negro burglar at 4 o'clock. Davis shot the burglar in the leg and beat him on the head with his revolver, but the man escaped. A posse has started out in search of him and there is talk of a lynching. The negro's clothes were found later in the office of a negro doctor. The doctor has disappeared. Davis' wounds are serious.

FIERCE FIGHT WITH MAD DOG

GREENSBURG, Pa., May 19.—A mad dog running at large in the vicinity of Latrobe, created the wildest terror. It entered the barnyard of John Linoski near that town and attacked Mrs. Linoski, who was engaged in milking a cow. The dog grabbed her by the forearm and she was unable to shake the mad brute off.

Her screams brought her husband to her aid. He drew his revolver and fired at the dog. His aim was bad and the bullet struck his wife, making a serious wound in the groin. Finally the husband succeeded in compelling the animal to loosen its hold on his wife's arm. The dog then turned on Linoski, tearing the flesh from his right arm. After a terrific battle the dog was driven away. Both husband and wife are badly hurt, the latter being in a critical condition. Physicians extracted the bullet.

MISSOURI MEDICS

Many Are Gathered in the City of St. Joe.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., May 19.—Between 500 and 600 physicians and surgeons are here for the annual meeting of the Missouri State Medical Society, which will be in session here during the next two days. The presiding officer is Dr. J. D. Griffith of Kansas City, president of the association. An interesting program of papers and discussions has been arranged and the meeting promises to be the most notable of its kind ever held in the state.

SCENES OF HORROR

A Girl's Vivid Description of the St. Pierre Disaster.

POINT-A-PITRE, Island of Guadalupe, May 19.—The only description of the scene at St. Pierre as viewed from the land is given by Harvira Da Igrille, a native girl, who is one of the thirty survivors brought here by the French cruiser Souchet. "I was going to vendors at the cathedral," said the girl, "when a mother asked me to go up to my aunt's, who keeps a small pastry shop near the cemetery, to deliver her a message. The cemetery, you see, is half up the mountain, just where it turns below what we girls used to call the 'corkscrew,' an old crater which had a winding path, down which we used to lead visitors to the island."

SAW THE ERUPTION START.

"The other girls did not want to go, because they thought I could not run up there and be down at the cathedral in time, but I hurried. When I got to the 'corkscrew' I saw some puffs of smoke coming out of it, and only thinking it was some 'villie' (aged negro) lighting a fire, I did not go to look. I had hardly gone more than three steps when I felt hot wind from the 'corkscrew.' Thinking that something must be on fire, I ran to the top of the path, and there I saw the bottom of the pit, all red, like boiling, with little blue flames shooting up from it. There were two guides leading a woman up the path and hurrying as fast as they could run. I saw a puff of blue smoke seem to hit the party and they fell as if killed. 'Horrified,' I stayed a minute or two till I saw the boiling stuff creep up the side of the 'corkscrew' until it covered the three people who were lying there. I got frightened then and ran down the road as fast as I could run, screaming all the way. I couldn't see anybody on the 'corkscrew' and I was too frightened to stop and tell anybody. I think they must all have been at the cathedral, as it was the vigil of Ascension."

FLOODS OF BOILING WATER.

"Just as I got to the main street I saw this boiling stuff burst from the top of the 'corkscrew' and run down the side of the hill. It followed the road first, but then, as the steam got bigger, it sat up the houses on both sides of the road. Then I saw that a boiling red river was coming from another part of the hill and cutting off the escape of the people, who were running out of the houses."

"I ran as hard as I could to the beach and saw my brother's boat with sails set close to the stone wharf, where he always kept it. I jumped in it, and just as I did so I saw him run down toward me. But he was too late and I heard him scream as the steam first touched him and then swallowed him. I cut the rope that held the boat and went to an old cave about a quarter of a mile away, where we girls used to play games, but before I got there I looked back and the whole side of the mountain which was near the town seemed to open and boil down the screaming thousands. I was blinded a good deal by stones and ashes that came flying about the boat, but I got into the cave."

"I remember hearing an awful hiss as the boiling stuff struck the sea and the cave, which was generally dry, filled up to the top with water, and I do not remember any more until they picked me up two miles away, and I found myself on a big steamer."

The officers of the Souchet say the girl was found unconscious in the sailing boat, which was badly charred and having been snatched off, it is thought the boat was too light to be swamped by the tidal wave.

The 25 others who were saved by the Souchet tell much the same story, but they did not see the first signs of the explosion. With one exception all of the survivors were working close to the sea when the eruption began and had two full minutes to get away from the shore before, as the girl said, "the mountain opened its side and boiled down" upon the town.

LUMBER LOW IN ORIENT.

The lumber market in the Orient continues low. A writer at Manila states that Portland lumber has suffered in competition with that of the Sound, owing to some inferior shipments made from this port.

British interests are trying to have a 15 per cent import duty put in the Chinese treaty, and local lumbermen are taking steps to prevent this being done.

A movement has also been begun to get the co-operation of Puget Sound interests in assisting them in this matter. Then strong influence will be brought to bear upon the State Department at Washington to keep the tax down to 5 per cent, the present figure.

FARMER SIMS WAS SMOOTH

MEXICO, Mo., May 19.—Confidence men attempted to rob B. O. Sims, a prosperous farmer of this county, allowing him to win \$5,000 and then insisting that he put up security in case he lost. Sims dropped out, but returned the money and reported to the authorities. Two of the men, giving the names of Hill and Egan, were arrested. They had \$10,000 in good or bad money.

One of the men called at the farm of Mr. Sims and said he was Banker Harris of Fulton, and wanted to buy a farm for a widow. While they were looking at the land a third party "happened" along with his game of cards.

Lumber Rates High.

The lumber mill owners of Centralia, Wash., are making an effort to secure lower insurance rates. With this end in view they will hold an early conference with insurance men in Seattle. The Portland mills will watch the result of the conference with interest. Rates are very high here for some of the mills. Some of the mills here are only able to secure an insurance on a fraction of their value.

LABOR NOTES.

The janitors and elevator conductors have organized a joint union, and have sent for a charter. There was some talk of their organizing separately, but on mature reflection they deemed it best to organize as one body.

An effort will be made to have the Oregon City barbers affiliate with Local No. 25, as there are not enough barbers in that city to organize a union.

Organizer Duke said today: "Six more unions will be organized in this city within the next two weeks, and some of them have already sent for charters."

District Organizer Whitney is in Seattle looking after the interests of labor organizations. While here he organized a federal union at Vancouver, Wash., and a union of the cement workers of this city. A charter for the latter organization has been sent for.

The blacksmiths have organized a union, securing about 25 members.

Ten shares of Lewis & Clark stock have been subscribed for by the Bricklayers' International Union No. 1, of Oregon. Mr. Lenton, business manager of the Carpenters' Union, says that the constitution of that organization prevents it from subscribing as a body, but that the members will take stock individually.

At the meeting of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters Wednesday night the members by unanimous vote agreed to give their moral support to the Amalgamated Woodworkers during their strike. This is the second strongest organization in the city, having over 800 members. There was a large attendance, and much enthusiasm was shown when the strike situation was referred to.

CLEAN SHIRTS COME HIGH

St. Louis People Must Stand a Raise in Prices.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 19.—A general increase in laundry prices was put into effect in St. Louis today. The advance was agreed upon by the proprietors of all the large laundries in the city, who say that their action was made necessary by the increase in prices of material. They say that soap has advanced in price 40 per cent, starch 15 per cent, and horse feed 100 per cent.

CLACKAMAS POLITICS.

OREGON CITY, May 19.—From a Democratic viewpoint the prospects in Clackamas county are very bright. There is no straight Democratic ticket in the field, but a citizens' ticket made up almost equally of Democrats, Populists and Republicans who are dissatisfied with machine methods. This is normally a county of about 600 Republican majority, but the most conservative guessers say that this majority is now reduced to 100 or less. Reasonable men say that G. W. Grace, the citizens' nominee for the Senate, will defeat George C. Brownell, who has heretofore seemed to have a lifetime lease on this office. Others of the citizens' nominees are likely to win. The chances for the Democratic state ticket are good.

Residents Complain.

Residents along the line of the Portland City & Oregon Railway Company on Milwaukee street are raising a protest over the action of the company in plowing up the street and throwing refuse on the sidewalks. The company has a large force of men grading the middle of the street for the laying of the new double track. The street is graded with heavy gravel, and the company's men, instead of throwing the dirt along to one side, put it on the sidewalk, breaking it down in a great many places. The grading horses are also driven on the sidewalks, contrary to the laws. The chief of police has been appealed to, but says that the parties making complaint should come down to the station and swear out a warrant.
