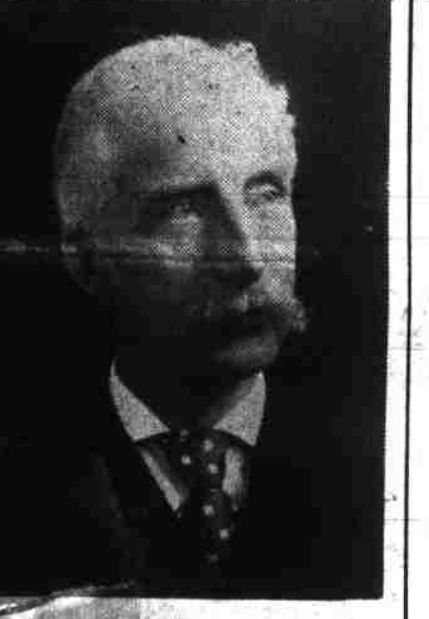

FOR CITY ATTORNEY.

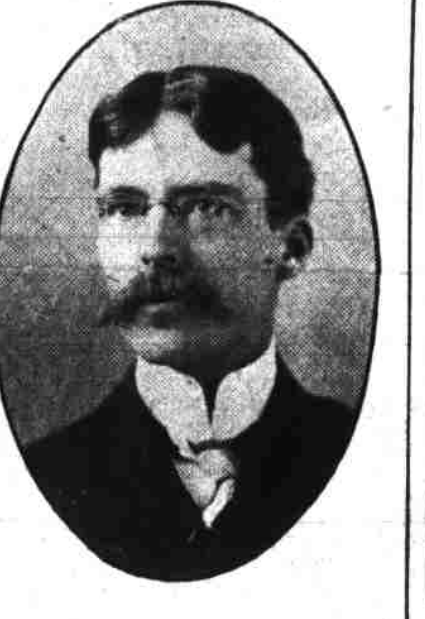

FOR MUNICIPAL JUDGE.

R. W. Thompson, Citizens' candidate for Municipal Judge, is one of the wide-awake young lawyers of Portland. He is aged 35 years, was reared in Portland, and all his life is an open book to this community. 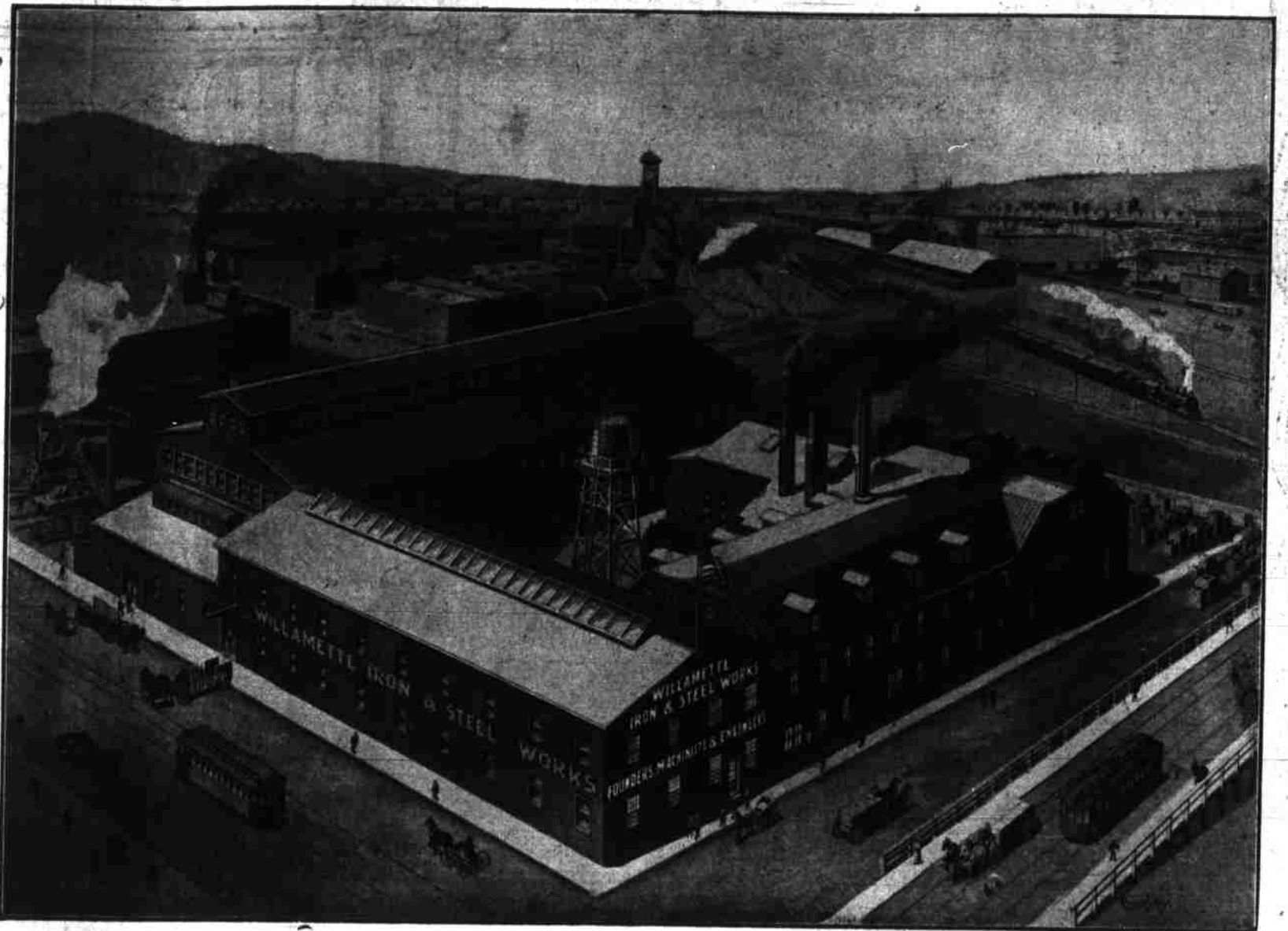
If this is not record enough for any man, then it would be hard to say what is.

Voters of Multnomah County now have an opportunity to cast their ballots for a person for County Commissioner who is a real business man and known to all acquaintances as such. 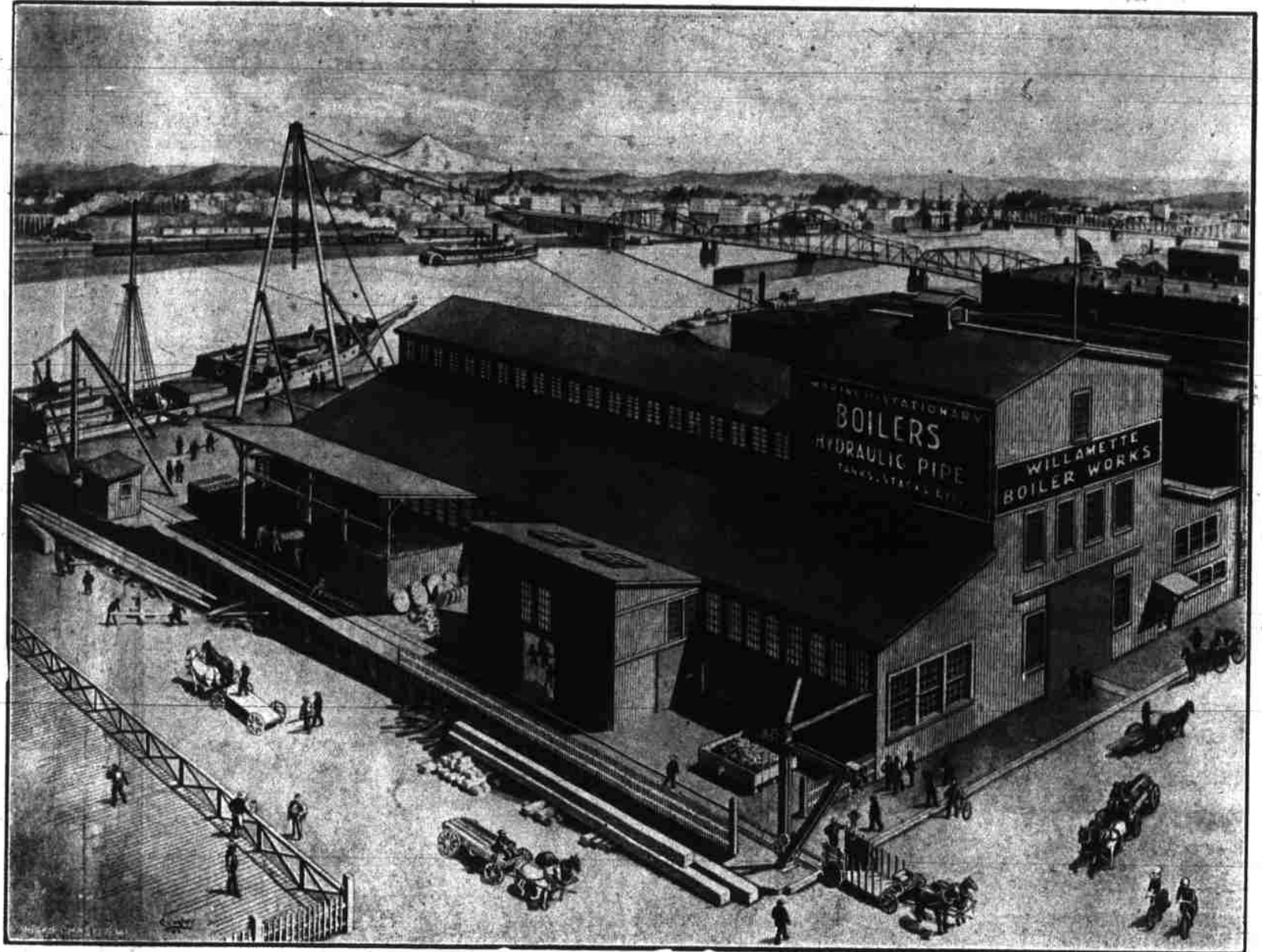

THE WILLAMETTE IRON & STEEL WORKS.
