

PRESIDENTS OF TWO EXPOSITIONS

Exchange Letters on the Subject Their Respective Fairs.

(Journal Special Service.)

ST. LOUIS, May 26.—The following correspondence has passed between President H. W. Corbett, of the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition, to be held at Portland in 1905, and President David R. Francis, of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. President Corbett opened the correspondence with the following cordial letter to President Francis:

My Dear Sir: The Board of Directors of the Lewis and Clark Centennial and American Pacific Exposition and Oriental Fair had the pleasure yesterday afternoon of a conference with Hon. John Barrett, representing your company, on important matters of interest to the exhibitions which St. Louis and Portland are preparing to hold in honor of the one-hundredth anniversary of the acquisition of Louisiana, and of the Lewis and Clark expedition. Mr. Barrett acquainted us with the scope of your World's Fair project and the present status of the preparations, and made known to us the desire of your company for our good will and assistance. It was unanimously voted to be the sense of our board that I should express to you as President of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition Company, and to the Senators and Representatives in Congress from the State of Oregon, our hearty good will for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition and our concurrence in the wisdom of a postponement of the time of opening until 1904, and to bespeak our hearty co-operation in any step that may be required to be taken to insure the success of your enterprise. In carrying out the instructions of the Board of Directors, it affords me pleasure to assure you of the great interest of this corporation and of the people of Oregon in your exhibition, and to express the sincere hope that your efforts will be rewarded with the full measure of success. Ties of friendship, old and enduring, bind Oregon to its sister State of Missouri. It was from Missouri that Lewis and Clark started on their great journey to the Pacific Ocean and it was to Missouri that they returned. The fur-trader whose field of operations was the region of the headwaters of the Missouri and the Columbia outfitted at St. Louis, and it was towards St. Louis that the trapper looked when his packs of beaver were ready to go to market. All the trails of the immigrants and the traders that led to the West had their Eastern terminus in Missouri. In the great struggle in Congress that ended in the extension of American sovereignty

over the region between the 42d and 49th parallels, and west of the Rocky Mountains, Oregon's cause was championed by Missouri's statesmen, Linn beginning the fight in the Senate in 1838, and Benton continuing it to final triumph in 1858. Among the pioneers of Oregon in the early days Missouri had a larger representation than any other single state. In more recent times, the proposal that the City of Portland should hold an exposition in 1905 in honor of the heroic deeds of Lewis and Clark, had, in its initial stages, the hearty encouragement of the present Chief Executive and the press of the State of Missouri. To the further suggestion of your company, laid before us by Mr. Barrett, that the State of Oregon be adequately represented at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, I beg to reply that the matter will be taken up with the Legislative Assembly that will meet in January, 1903, and an appropriation large enough for a full exhibit of the state's resources will be asked. This company will do the utmost to have Oregon's exhibit among the best at St. Louis. In closing, I desire to thank you for the assurance of your friendship for our exposition conveyed to us by Mr. Barrett, and to say that we are at your service if at any time we can be helpful to you here in Oregon, or with the state's delegation in Congress. President Francis has replied to the above as follows:

"I heartily respond to your fraternal sentiments and am deeply appreciative of your generous tender of good will and assistance. For historical and sentimental reasons the two great exhibitions are almost identical in interest. We celebrate the great purchase; you commemorate the wonderful exploration to ascertain the extent, geography and natural resources of the acquired territory. Your celebration will be the complement of ours. The great Missourians, Lewis and Clark, blazed the trail to the mystical lands beyond the crest of the Rocky Mountains, came back and told the fascinating story of the fallow fields, where rolls the Oregon, the endless forests of pine, the evidences of marvelous mineral wealth, of broad rivers ready to carry the commerce of a future empire to the western sea and of a climate blending the influences of the luxuriant semi-tropic and the delights of the temperate zones. Then followed the sturdy Mis-

sourians, always in the vanguard of pioneers, with bateau and axe and 'prairie schooner,' making a highway of the sunset trail along which the actions of historic families of St. Louis and Missouri crowded until they debouched upon the plains of Oregon and peopled the land with the sturdy race which will leave its population for prosperous centuries and which has already stamped its characteristics of virile strength, rugged honesty, unstinted hospitality and indomitable enterprise upon the wonderful civic achievements of the state they helped to create. On behalf of the corporation I desire to assure you of its reciprocity of sentiment, though it may not be expressed in language as eloquent as yours. No exposition illustrating the natural wealth, commercial enterprises and intellectual and social development of the Louisiana Purchase can be complete without an adequate representation by the State of Oregon, and we are glad to receive your assurance in this respect. Our best efforts will be directed to a representation for Missouri at your exposition commensurate with her wealth, pride and dignity. Concluding, permit me again to thank you and those you represent for this fraternal message you have so agreeably delivered from Oregon to Missouri."

A LETTER TO MR. HANNA.

The following letter has been sent as addressed:

Hon. Mark Hanna, Senator, Washington, D. C. Dear Sir: I see by the Oregonian that you are expecting certain things of the Republican party of Oregon. During the McKinley administration, capital combined, and trusts were formed against the best interests of the citizens of this country, and against the best interests of the world at large. Said combinations were entered into in the interest of the capitalists. Now, since the death of the McKinley administration, we have a President who is of the people, and is trying to have legislation in favor of the people, but capital is combining to prevent such legislation, and also to prevent Mr. Roosevelt getting the next nomination for President. Now, the Republicans of Oregon (excepting the capitalists) know fully well that your interests and influence are at variance with the interests of the voting population of Oregon. If you want the Republicans of Oregon to stand together you will not have the Oregonian to say Hanna expects Republicans to carry the election. And I expect the party in that State to do its duty. The Republicans of Oregon know full well that your interests are not identical with theirs, and they care but little of what you may expect or wish. The Republicans of Oregon think they are capable of running their own mill.

AN IMPORTANT NEW BUSINESS

News of Manufacturers in and Around the City.

A new establishment, handling everything in the harness line is the Collins-Preston-Wilson Company, at Second and Taylor streets. The building is a new one, having been completed about two months ago, and since occupied by this company. The building is two stories in height, the upper floor being occupied by the manufacturing department under everything in their line save the metal trimmings, etc., are manufactured. A force of from 20 to 40 men is employed throughout the year. The company makes its own patent leather goods, in addition to a full line of gig saddles, housings, coach pads and the like. Since occupying their new quarters the firm has added a retail department to its growing trade. In addition to catering to the local trade, they are the source of supply for from 85 to 90 California firms, also a large trade with Washington, Idaho, Montana and other Eastern States. A large order has just been shipped to Lewiston, Mont. Shipments are constantly being made to California, the monthly average being from 50 to 75 sets of harness. Fifty sets have just been shipped to Los Angeles.

The Buffalo Pitts Company have received a letter from Rockville, Idaho, stating that their traveling representative, I. M. Bates, is ill at that place with tonsillitis and kidney trouble. Mr. Bates has been in the employ of the Buffalo Pitts Company since January 1. Prior to that time he was in newspaper work, having been associated with the Detroit Tribune for a number of years.

The work of rebuilding the Albers & Schneider Mills, which were destroyed by fire last February, is rapidly going on, and the mill is expected to be in operation in about two months. A 45-foot extension has been constructed in the rear of the establishment. Another story is being added, and as soon as the roof is completed, the machinery will be installed. The company has invested \$20,000 in new machinery from the East and elsewhere and the establishment will be second to none in the State.

ATLIN IS A NEW ELDORADO

Rich Clean-Ups Start a Stampede Into the Country.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 26.—Great excitement reigns at Atlin over the clean-ups which have just been made. More than \$100,000 has been taken from the Pine Creek diggings alone. Experts who are on the ground figure that the finds are equal to the Eldorado placers. A stampede has resulted, within a radius of some hundred miles. On Gold Run, every man is averaging \$40 per day.

HOW A BODY WAS FOUND

NEW YORK, May 26.—Filled with mercury, a loaf of bread hid in Coney Island Creek yesterday what the police considered a considerable annoyance and loss. It located the body of Abraham Cohen, the 5-year-old son of Julius Cohen of West Twelfth street and Surf avenue, who was drowned by the capsizing of his father's boat in the creek on May 7 last.

MANIAC'S MYSTERY

SILOU FALLS, S. D., May 26.—In the county jail in this city is a stranger who is a raving maniac. He arrived at Garretson the latter part of last week, and shortly before being placed in jail suddenly became violently insane. He is unable to tell his name or where he came from, and nothing could be found in his pockets which would aid in revealing his identity. The authorities will endeavor to ascertain who he is and where he came from.

RIVER BOARD OF TRADE.

There is no question as to the successful growth and prosperity of the Columbia River Basin Board of Trade. There are now already 10 commercial organizations throughout the valley belonging to this organization, and each week they are supplied with duplicate copies of the addresses and objects of letters of inquiry received by the Portland Board of Trade from all parts of the United States. A large number of these inquiries are sent out and valuable returns have been received.

F. M. Heidel, of Hillsboro, states that in the past few days he had received calls from four different parties who had received the Hillsboro Board of Trade printed among the hotels in Portland.

It is expected that a large amount of printed matter from towns all over the Northwest will be supplied to the Secretary to be distributed amongst the hotel arrivals in Portland. When this is accomplished people will not say they are not able to find any literature in a variety regarding the surrounding country. So far, Hillsboro, Grant's Pass and Lewiston are the only towns that have sent in printed matter for distribution. The

good effects of this distribution of printed matter among the hotels has induced the Hillsboro Board of Trade to send in a large supply to the Secretary for distribution, and it is hoped that other organizations will follow suit.

How to Advertise Our Resources.

A neat publication is that just gotten out by the Southern Pacific Company, entitled "California Industries." The book is based upon "personal testimony of experienced cultivators." It contains just the sort of information which persons who are looking for new homes desire. In accordance with the new and liberal spirit which dominates the affairs of the company under the Harriman regime, the company is soon to publish a similar book covering Oregon's resources. General Freight and Passenger Agent Coman is setting in motion the wheels of progress, and is collecting the data for a work on Oregon. Matters will be pushed as soon as he can find time to give the work his personal attention.

BLOODY BATTLE WITH OUTLAWS

A Virginia Sheriff Puts Up a Game Fight—Two Dead.

MIDDLEBORO, Ky., May 26.—A bloody fight between Sheriff Broadwater of Scott County, Va., and the Wright gang of outlaws took place in the mountains of Hancock County, Tenn. Two outlaws, John Van Sant and John Templeton, were killed. Sheriff Broadwater says the outlaws cannot escape.

TO MAKE SURVEYS.

A deposit of about \$10,000 has been made by E. B. Bond for the survey of 30 full and fractional townships lying southeast of Eugene, through the Cascade Forest Range Reserve. Mr. Bond is President of the Oregon & California Land Company, successors to the Oregon Central Military Road Company. Surveyor-General Meldrum has applied for authority to advertise for bids for the proposed surveys, which advertisements are to be made in June.

BIG PRICE

CHICAGO, May 26.—The highest price for Texas cattle in the history of the stockyards was paid today for a carload belonging to Charles McFarland of Alledo, Tex. The cattle averaged 1355 pounds. The price paid was \$6.35 per 100 pounds.

Farmers for Chamberlain.

S. P. Hutchinson, a farmer of Umatilla County, is visiting in Portland. Mr. Hutchinson is a life-long Republican, served during the Civil War, and is a member of the Grand Army of the Republic. He says Furnish will not get the full support of his party in Umatilla County, that fully 500 Republicans, mostly farmers who know the banker candidate for Governor will refuse to vote for him and will support Chamberlain. Nearly every prominent Republican living in the North end of Umatilla is openly supporting Chamberlain, and the outlook is certainly favorable for Chamberlain to go out of Umatilla County with a handsome majority to his credit.

OREGON PACKERS NOT GUILTY.

In reference to the complaint forwarded him by Attorney-General Knox from Washington, United States District Attorney Hall has been making an investigation in Oregon. He does not find that the beef trust exists here in the same sense that it does in certain other states. To be sure, the great meat packers have representatives here, but they are not guilty. Mr. Hall says that he cannot find that the meat men in Oregon have conspired together to raise or lower prices of beef, or that they are in any way guilty of any violation of the interstate commerce act.

Mineral Discovery.

BAKER CITY, May 26.—A body of pure graphite has been discovered not more than 25 miles from Baker City, on the edge of the Malheur old district. The discoverer is an old prospector who is keeping his find a secret for the present. He brought in supplies of graphite which analyzed 90 per cent pure, and the ledge is said to be more than two feet wide, and is traceable for three miles. Considerable excitement was caused when the samples were exhibited here, and the ore is worth about \$200 to the ton. It means much for Baker City, and steps are said to be taken to develop the property in the near future.

ON WRIT OF ERROR.

In the United States Circuit Court Saturday Judge Bellinger issued an order to send the original exhibit to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals in the case of Gundersen vs. the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining & Excavating Company. The case was tried last fall and was brought to the attention of the court by a writ of error. The jury brought in a verdict for \$10,000 for the plaintiff. The case will be taken up on writ of error. The matter of appeal was perfected two months ago.

KILLED IN HIS DOORWAY

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 26.—James Clark, 45, well known as a cattleman, was assassinated in his home Saturday night. Clark was married the second time. His first wife having died two years ago. He is said to have carried heavy life insurance. No arrests have been made. Clark's wife had retired to bed. He was reading a newspaper when summoned to the door by a masked stranger, who shot him twice.

OUR INDUSTRIES.

The Fleischner-Mayer Company is an old establishment in this city, but there are probably few persons who realize the extent of the business done by them in a year's time.

The line of manufacture consists of shirts (linen, woolen, etc.), overalls and similar articles of clothing. In addition to a full line of novelties. The latter, however, are not manufactured by them, but are imported from elsewhere. The force of employees numbers about 300, with a payroll of \$75,000 per year. About 50 dozen shirts and 100 dozen overalls are manufactured daily. Two-thirds of this output is consumed on the Coast and the remainder is sent East. The total value of the year's product by this company runs well up into six figures.

The company also has an establishment on First street, near Burnside, where shirts, etc., are laundered before being packed for shipment. There are about 25 employees here.

NAVY WANTS RECRUITS.

The United States grand jury room, Postoffice building, will be rigged up as a recruiting office for the United States navy, from May 29 to June 5, by Chief Master-at-Arms F. Josephson. The office hours will be from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m.

The navy is short of men, because 10 new ships will be put into commission this year, and there are no crews to man them. Boys from 15 to 17 years of age will be accepted, and will be sent to the training school at San Francisco. All experienced commissioned officers from the army and Marine Corps are enlisted in the navy as master-at-arms, third class, at a salary of \$30 per month, with board, and work themselves up to \$65 per month. What is especially needed is such petty officers as yeomen, third class, at a salary of from \$30 to \$60 per month. This is open to all young men who can write well and operate a typewriter.

Mystic Shriners.

Ancient Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, the number of between 3000 and 5000 will pass through Portland next month en route in going to or returning from the meeting of the imperial council at San Francisco. One delegation will come in from Denver, making a tour of Yellowstone Park en route. An excursion to the Cascade Locks is planned.

Delegations also from Fargo, N. D., Spokane, Tacoma and Boise will also visit Portland. Chicago Medinah Temple will send 140 members, who will pass through Portland on the famous World's Fair special train of the New York Central.

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
