WASCO COUNTY

Are Mad at Mr. Moody's Turning Down.

THE DALLES, Or., May 25.—Wasco County people have not yet forgiven the Furlish-Williamson combine for the turning down of Malcolm A. Moody, and they also resent the slandering of T. T. Geer in the state convention.

Mr. Moody lives here. He is looked upon by the people generally as a citizen who has honored his town and county. They regard his Congressional career as creditable. They saw no reason why the courtesy of a nomination was not accorded him, in keeping with the accepted precedents. There was no assertion that he had not been faithful to his constituents; that he had not been industrious; that he had not succeeded in securing remarkable prestige in the National House.

Yet he was "turned down" for J. N. Williamson, merely because the latter wanted the nomination. This, they argue, was merely a matter of personal ambition on Mr. Williamson's part, and not because of any economic or party policy considerations. Hence, say they in conclusion, the voters are not bound to uphold his nomination as a party proposition, but are at liberty to act as to Mr. Williamson's ambition as they see fit.

They will act, and vigorously, too, on June 2 Mr. Williamson will conclude that he has been mixed with a Kansas cyclone before he hears the last of the Wasco County election. He and Furlish will lose the county.

GOOD PRICES

Will Be Paid for Salem Berries—Big Crop Expected.

SALEM, May 25.—The Salem Fruit Growers' Union convened in regular session at the City hall Saturday and transacted business of importance. The directors reported having decided to select Mr. J. M. Kyle, an old and experienced fruit-packer and shipper, as manager for the Union during this coming season, and represent the Union in all its transactions. This appointment means Mr. Kyle shall see to the grading, packing and shipping of all fruit. A report was also made upon the style and size of the berry boxes and shipping crates. Arrangements were also completed to sign up a contract with the Oregon Packing Company, for the canning of the strawberry crop. Something like 50 acres of berries have already been signed over and the indications for a lively season are pleasantly anticipated by the Union. The

MARION IS IN OPEN REVOLT

SALEM, May 25.—The political situation in Marion county grows no better, fast. There is no abatement of the anti-Furnish wave that set in here after the speeches of Fulton and Furlish here on the night of the 16th and of Chamberlain on the day following. A matter of concern among the Republicans now is how far will the disaffection affect the state ticket. It is an open secret that Dunbar, candidate for re-election as Secretary of State, will not receive the party vote in this county because of his subservience to Fulton and the prejudice that has grown up against him because of fees and charges he is pocketing. Since Chamberlain's charges as to the fees of the Secretary of State, investigation has been instituted and it is stated upon good authority that the fees and charges of the Secretary of State's office are now greater than ever before and that if published to the world they would appall the taxpayers and insure Mr. Dunbar's defeat. James Godfrey, Democratic candidate for State Printer, may also be expected to capture some Republican votes here by reason of this being his home.

In seeking an analysis of the situation here as to the head of the ticket, one finds there are almost as many reasons for not voting for Furlish as there are for supporting him. Some will not support him because he cannot make a speech. Some will not support him for the reason that he cannot discuss public questions either privately or publicly. Some consider him wholly incompetent for the Governorship of Oregon. A common complaint, particularly from the farming districts, is the failure of Mr. Furlish's friends to defend him against the charges of Judge Harbman, of Umatilla county, wherein he is accused of collecting off his own people enormous fees and charging his own county interest at the rate of 250 per cent or more. Some see in the election of Mr. Furlish a throwing of the control of all the boards, and with it the state patronage, into the hands of Furlish and Dunbar, the Furlish voting of the state and giving opportunity for the Clatsop county manipulator to engage in the high-handed methods of which he is capable. It cannot be said that it is Furlish's own weakness that has turned the tide, against him here. There is bitterness here against the Oregonian and some can see in the defeat of Furlish an indirect slap at Editor Scott, who it is claimed is trying to force upon the people men whom the Oregonian has educated them to loathe. Jack Matthews is also a source of weakness to Furlish as well as the whole ticket in this county. He is looked upon as an extreme factionalist and every act of his as state chairman has tended to increase dissension rather than pacify the warring elements. He has refused to render the managers here any financial aid whatever and Furlish's friends are now charging that their candidate for Governor is being thrown down by Matthews, who having taken the Pendleton candidate's money is using it in the effort to pull through a weak legislative ticket in Multnomah county while Furlish's interests are wholly neglected here.

Above all, and as a common cause for the unusual revolt, it should be taken into consideration this is an off-year election, and there is more or less dissatisfaction and prejudice against trusts and labor is fearful of its rights in the face of the great capitalistic combines. Many were in a frame of mind, when it was easy to influence them to strike a blow at the dominant party. Some were looking for the excuse and the party managers seem to have spared no pains to furnish excuses for a bolt, and though Marion county is normally 700 Republican, men who have voted the ticket all their lives are wagering money that Chamberlain will carry the county. The disaffection is general throughout the county and is confined to no one element of the party. The wave of disaffection started at the state convention has swept over the county and to attempt to counteract its effects before election would be futile. The head of the ticket will be a loser in this county and Mr. Dunbar will suffer.

GRANTS PASS

GRANTS PASS, May 25.—Another new copper strike has been made in Josephine county. This last discovery was made in the Slate Creek district of northwestern Josephine. The discoverers are W. A. Ingram and W. H. Ramsey, two miners of that district. On a high mountain ridge overlooking Slate Creek an 80-foot ledge of copper has been discovered. The great vein extends entirely through the mountain. Its copper values on the surface range from 6 to 20 per cent.
