

HAWAII AT WORLD'S FAIR

No Hula Hula Dances
Will be Allowed
to Show.

(Journal Special Service.)
ST. LOUIS, May 31.—When John Barre, Commissioner-General to the Orient for the World's Fair, arrived at Honolulu on his trip around the world, citizens representing the commercial and industrial interests of the Hawaiian Islands arranged a meeting for him in the Government building, which he addressed. Over \$50,000,000 of invested capital was represented in the audience. Mr. Barre summarized the situation in the islands as follows: "The business interests of the islands will proceed forthwith to take such steps as will result in a creditable exhibit, to be accomplished if necessary, by popular subscription, and supplemented later by Act of the next Legislature, which convenes in the early part of 1903. The intention expressed at yesterday's meeting, and confirmed by the appointment of a committee is that Hawaii shall have a greater exhibit at St. Louis than she has had at any other Exposition. It is one of the chief desires of this community that so-called 'Hula-Hula' or low-class vaudeville midway effects shall not disgrace these islands. I assured the meeting that the Exposition management would heartily join with them in preventing such unfavorable features from being a discredit to the Hawaiian exhibit."

"In conclusion," he said, "I am more than satisfied by what has been accomplished in the taking of preliminary steps. During the few days that I remain here, I shall be in consultation with the government officials and the committee in regard to the plan and scope of Hawaiian participation. The committee, as you will see, have given considerable attention to my mission and have informed me that they will certainly support the movement which has been inaugurated. By the time I leave for Japan on the 10th of June, I hope that the situation will be so well in hand that the final consummation of plans can be left entirely to the local committee."

THE DEAD ALIVE.

This Corpse Was Only a Dead Drunk.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 31.—About the liveliest corpse that has been seen in Seattle for some time came to the official notice of Deputy Coroner Shirley Wiltie. The dead man absolutely refused to be searched as an ordinary corpse, and staggered away without even viewing the interior of Butterworth's dead wagon. Some one telephoned to police headquarters that there was a dead man lying on the beach under the Pacific Coast Company coal bunkers at the foot of King street. Deputy Coroner Wiltie was notified and immediately went to the scene of the alleged tragedy. Face downward in the dirt, under the bunkers, was the "corpse." Dr. Wiltie had just climbed down to the man and was turning him over when signs of life appeared. The man gave a sigh and opened his eyes. He rose to his feet in the presence of the collected crowd and after climbing up the dock, made his way up to the front. The dead man, it was learned, was a local fisherman.

ROMANCE BLIGHTED

Telegram received by the local police from the girl's parents and while a search of the city was being made, the agent of the steamship line recognized the girl as she purchased her ticket. The detectives went aboard the boat and induced her to come ashore. She will leave for the East tomorrow. She was richly dressed and had \$2000 in cash with her.

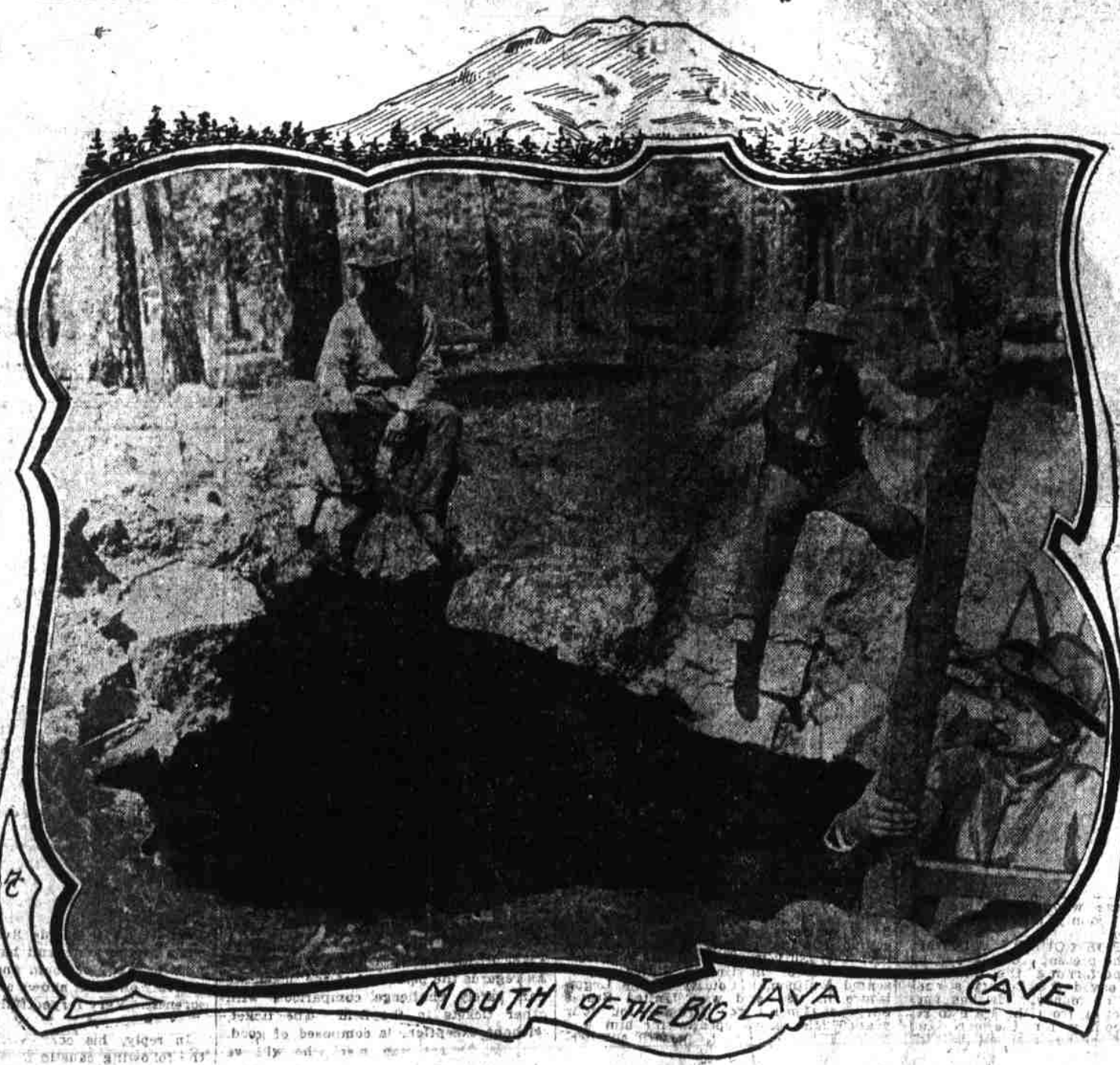
SNAKE YARN

Lava Poured Down the Sides of Mt. Adams.



MOUTH OF THE BIG LAVA CAVE

Up near the foot of Mount Adams, where the Mazamas are going on their annual outing this year, is a large lava cave, which will prove of great interest to those making the journey. In order to visit this cave, one must go to White Salmon, opposite Hood River, and there take a stage into the interior for 25 miles. The cave is but a short way from where the Mazamas have decided to camp.

The entrance to the cave is in a knoll of ground several feet high, and is comparatively small. At first glance the bot-

tom cannot be seen, being 35 feet down. The cave spreads out in all directions from the entrance and is one-half mile in length; its width varies from 25 to 30 feet. The roof is arched, and, like the walls, is smooth, but the floor is corrugated from the natural flow of the lava as it cooled. The cave is serpentine in form and is entirely without angles.

A drive of six miles through the timber land brings one to an ice cave, one of the most interesting places of the kind in Washington. The entrance to this is also small and the cave is 29 feet

deep. From the roof hang immense icicles, some reaching to the floor. Many are from eight to 10 feet in length and are 18 inches through. They hang so closely together that one can not pass through the cave without knocking some of them down, as they fall at the slightest touch. From the ice formations on the ceiling water has dripped to the floor and there frozen again, so that stalagmites of ice are formed which almost meet the long stalactites and form a grand effect in the dim light of the cavern. A great peculiarity of the cave is

that, although the elevation is but 3000 feet, the ice is perpetual and is as solid in August or September as in the early spring.

Settlers there formerly used the ice from the cave in the summer for household purposes, but the government has prohibited this, in order to preserve the beauty of the place.

A small ice cave near here is directly under a house, and is used by the family as a cellar. These caves have been known as long as people have lived in the vicinity.

ROYAL FLUSH BEAT THE ACES

And Also Beat the Pawn Broker for Twelve.

PHILADELPHIA, May 31.—To Mrs. C. Harris, a pawnbroker, a needy looking man showed a dusty picture frame, in which was a "royal flush." Emerging from the edges of the cards were seen the greenbacks it had won. The stranger said that he wanted a loan on this "royal flush," he said, "I've got it, but I want to keep it, and I don't want to be a pawnbroker's slave." He related how the hand, had beaten four aces, and the pawnbroker lent him \$12.

Exactly the same thing happened to several other pawnbrokers. One of them opened the frame. He found that the edges of the greenbacks were only edges arranged so deftly that the fact was impossible of detection without taking the frame apart. Three-fifths of the bills had been cut off and redeemed at the pawnshop. This had been done in every case.

Neither the federal nor the local laws can touch the fellow. When redeeming three-fifths of the bills he did not have to swear that the rest had been destroyed. A pawnbroker is supposed to know whether or not an article upon which he loans money is worth it.

HOT HUNT

BLUEFIELD, W. Va., May 31.—A huge black bear was brought to this city yesterday and sold to local butchers. Its weight was 430 pounds and in capturing it a young man sustained possibly fatal injuries. For some time past the farmers living in the "Wilderness" in Blaine County, Va., have missed their sheep. Thursday partly devoured carcass of a fine ewe was found. A party was organized to hunt down the carnivorous animal. The country was scoured for hours, and a fine pack was gotten together.

The hounds soon struck the bear's trail and in a short while one of the hunters, Charles Burton, got a shot at the animal. The bullet took effect, but did not check the bear's flight.

However, others of the party fired with equally effective aim, and the bear, after carrying 10 rifle balls around with him for over an hour, was finally brought to bay by the hounds.

In his eagerness to be one of the dispatchers of the brute, John Burton, aged 27 years, got too close to the bear, and before he could get a shot was bowled over by the bear's heavy paw. His face was badly lacerated by the blow, and after he had fallen to the ground he received another blow, which broke his left arm.

The bear then bit nearly through Burton's left leg, and was gnawing at his stomach when the party came up. A shot, fired by a man named Ramsey, ended Bruin's earthly career.

The young man was removed to the home of his father on Kimberland Creek, where he lies in a critical condition.

A BIG NUGGET

DUEL BETWEEN TWO BROTHERS

COREY, Pa., May 31.—Two brothers fought a duel with revolvers on a farm a mile from this city and both are now dying.

Spencer and Laverne Page have had some difficulty over money matters and it is said that bad feeling has existed between them for some time. Today Laverne drove to his brother's farm and accused Spencer of unfair dealing. Laverne drew a 32-caliber revolver and fired at his brother, who had also drawn a revolver from his pocket, and the duel was fought.

Neighbors came to the scene and found that two shots had taken effect in Spencer's head, inflicting fatal injuries. One had lodged in Laverne's body, passing over his heart, and he can not live.

BOY BURGLARS

BERRY FIELDS

Present Good Opportunity for the Unemployed.

A resident of Hood River was in the city today. He says that the strawberry season in that section has opened up in all its glory.

Pickers are receiving 1 1/2 cents per pound for the berries they gather, and it is said that at this rate they are able to make from \$2 to \$4 per day. As the season will last until the middle of August, they are figuring on making a winter's stake, in connection with what they will earn immediately afterwards when hops are ready to harvest.

It appears that pickers are scarce there at present, as the Davis Fruit Company is wanting 300 more employees and another firm 100.

In the past few days quite a number of people have left Portland for the strawberry fields, taking camping outfit with them and intending to remain during the summer.

The fields are in the shadow of Mount Hood and the place is described as a land of strawberries, fruit and flowers. It is an ideal camping place, and those who have been there say that if the people out of employment here understood the conditions existing in that section there would be a stampede in that direction which would almost equal that now under way to Thunder Mountain.

POLITICAL FALSEHOODS.

Who are J. E. Lewton, H. G. Green, H. D. Steward paid out, and are they on the tax roll, or are they three rounders hired with a few glasses of beer to sign the article mentioned, gotten up by a candidate who is too big a coward to sign his own name. We have met such people before, but they were short-lived. Like Davey Crockett, "I am sure that I am right, then I go ahead."

BULLET IN HER BRAIN

Peculiar Suicide of a San Francisco Woman.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—Miss May Peters of 1015 Sanchez street has ended her life by shooting herself through the head at the home of her sister, Mrs. Henry G. Gerdes, 2251 Market street.

It is believed to have been the cause of a cheerful disposition, but of late sickness had made life a burden for her. Her physician had told her, too, that her heart was affected, and this preyed upon her mind. She brooded continually lest death would come day overtake her in the street.

Early in the evening Miss Peters went for a short stroll. Not returning soon, her mother sought her at Mrs. Gerdes' residence. Not finding her, the mother returned to her home. About 9 o'clock Mrs. Gerdes saw her sister crossing the street toward her home. Mrs. Gerdes called to her and the answer was her sister's voice crying in a strange, unnatural tone:

"I'm crazy! I'm crazy! I'm crazy!" The young woman entered the house, ran up the stairs and took a position directly in front of a mirror. Before her sister could reach her Miss Peters placed a pistol to her head and sent a bullet into her brain.

IS CHARGED WITH VAGRANCY

Saloon Man After Law and Order Workers.

VICTOR, Cal., May 31.—On complaint of Minor Acton, a Victor saloon keeper, a warrant was issued in police court for the arrest of T. S. Ferris, secretary of the Law and Order league of this city, on a charge of vagrancy. The warrant has not been served. Ferris left for Cripple Creek while it was being issued. Acton was recently prosecuted and convicted on a charge of gambling preferred by the league.

"SISTER MARY" FOUND DEAD

MOSCOW, Idaho, May 31.—John Lanier, 55 years of age, was found dead in his bed at the Commercial Hotel by Landlord Miller. Heart disease from excessive drinking was the supposed cause of death. Lanier had been a resident of Moscow for the past 12 years and was well known to every one in the community as "Sister Mary." He worked for several years at the Mix nursery, but of late has been tending bar. He was heard to complain about his heart Monday, and went to his room quite early in the evening.

KANSAS CITY, May 31.—Carey Snyder, son of B. M. Snyder, the banker of Kansas City and New York, and William L. Grimes, a well connected young man of Plattburg, Mo., have been rearrested, charged with "holding up" and robbing O. H. Stevens, a Kansas City pawnbroker, two weeks ago of diamonds worth \$5000. Mr. and Mrs. Stevens were returning from the dog show at night. Last week the two arrests were made, but B. M. Snyder's influence saved the young men from police exposure.
