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CHICAGO RIOTERS

Have a Hot Brush With Police.

(Scripps-McRae News Association.)

CHICAGO, June 3.—Rioting as the result of the stock-yards drivers' strike was resumed this morning when the packers sent a number of wagons up town to deliver several tons of meat. The wagons were escorted by fifty police who were later augmented by fifty reserved when the outbreak took on a serious phase. Shortly before the wagons reached the center of the downtown district a mob of several thousand gathered and followed them jeering the drivers. Later a rush was made for the contents into the street but the police charged the mob using clubs freely and making several arrests. They succeeded in getting the wagons to one of the big department stores where the delivery was to be made. Here a crowd of ten thousand gathered and made another rush for the wagons but the police beat them back until the wagons had delivered the meat. The wagons then returned to the yards followed by a jeering crowd.

TO SETTLE THE STRIKE

Civic Federation Makes a Strong Appeal.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—An appeal has been made through the National Civic Federation to the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western and Delaware & Hudson roads with a view to the settlement of the coal strike. These two roads, Vanderbilt concerns, have been most opposed to making concessions to the miners.

WARMLY PRAISED

Kitchner and Milner the Heroes of the Hour.

LONDON, June 3.—An Exchange telegraph says the prevailing view is that the Commons will authorize a vote of thanks to Lord Kitchner, which will be accompanied by a vote of 100,000 pounds and an Earlom. Milner is also expected to be raised to an Earlom.

Signing Peace Terms.

LONDON, June 3.—The details of signing the peace terms reached London today. The signing was without any particular ceremony. The signers met in the dining-room of a house occupied by Boer delegates. Without delay the Boers signed the agreement. After the paper was duly signed Kitchner's secretary took it and immediately started for England with it. When the fact that peace was assured became known in the concentration camps the occupants became hysterically joyful.

Corn Tax Sticks.

LONDON, June 3.—In the Commons today the Chancellor of the Exchequer again denied that the corn tax would be abandoned.

Boer Exiles Pleased.

HAMILTON, Bermuda, June 3.—The news of peace in South Africa was communicated to the Boers in the inclosure on Hawkins Island last night. The prisoners were delighted, and received the news with great enthusiasm, shouting, singing and hurrahing. Some of them rushed wildly about embracing every English soldier they met and said: "Yesterday we were foes, but today we are friends." Drinks were served out to the Boers on Hawkins Island, and the rejoicing there continued until a late hour. The Boers on Tucker's Island also received the news with great joy. When the fact of peace was communicated to them, the prisoners went fairly wild, shouting and singing the "Folkedied" and other hymns until 1 o'clock in the morning. At reveille the bands of the Warwick Regiment moved up to the Tucker Island inclosure and played "Auld Lang Syne," "Old Hundred" and "God Save the King," and in all of these airs the prisoners joined most heartily. The peace news was received by the prisoners on the other islands here with similar manifestations of joy.

World Wide Joy.

LONDON, June 3.—King Edward has been the recipient of a large number of congratulatory telegrams from European sovereigns. A message from Emperor William is understood to have been of a particularly gratifying character. While London went temporarily mad in a saturnalia of rejoicing over the news from South Africa, the telegraphic nerve system of the empire throbbled responsively. From Canada and Jamaica and from India and Australia came messages of congratulation and reports of local rejoicings. Gibraltar, Malta, Cairo, Bombay and Melbourne each in turn recorded the enthusiasm with which the news of peace was received.

Lords Were Glad.

LONDON, June 3.—The Prince of Wales and the Duke of Cambridge went to the House of Lords to hear the peace statement of the Premier—Lord Salisbury. There was a large attendance of peers and peeresses. Lord Salisbury, before mentioning South Africa, referred to the great loss which the empire had sustained in Lord Pauncefoot, who had done more than any one man to cement the union of the two great Anglo-Saxon races, "which is one of the healthiest and most promising indications of the time."
