The following letter has been received from Henry B. Miller, United States Consul at New Chang. The letter shows the opportunities for American trade in China.

The main imports from the United States into Manchuria are cotton goods, kerosene and flour. These are consumed by the Chinese and sales of all are most likely to increase.

Lumber in quantities will only be imported by the Russians into Port Arthur and Dalgny. The increased number of Russians coming into Manchuria makes an opportunity for trade along many new lines.

There is a splendid opening for an agency for American goods at Dalgny or Port Arthur with a branch at Hsichin. The agent should be able to speak Russian and be well supported by home firms.

A fire insurance company would also be able to do considerable business. A permanent agency at Dalgny could handle business by selling at Port Arthur, Chefoo, Tien Tsin, New Chang, Moukden, Tieling, Harbin and other places.
