

ALL DOUBT REMOVED

Chamberlain Elected By Safe Majority—Returns From Every County In the State Have Been Received.

GEORGE E. CHAMBERLAIN IS ELECTED GOVERNOR OF OREGON BY A MAJORITY.

These figures are justified, when all returns are tabulated, and doubts given to furnish in all counties from which official totals are not yet at hand. The figures of the day are based upon those of the latest published this morning, with corrections that came in through the day. In a number of counties, the complete returns today gave a large addition to Chamberlain, while some added to Furnish's figures, but the entire body of the returns of the day show the Portland man ahead by the number given herein.

All day there has been a feverish anxiety regarding the Governorship. No other offices were paid any attention by the people here or through the state, so far as news that came in is concerned.

The Governorship was the absorbing topic, and nerves were tense and countenances expressive of interest.

SOME OF THE CHANGES.
For the purposes of conservatism, the

figures of the Republican managers as printed early in the day were taken, and then the various counties were communicated with to ascertain the truth. There were some interesting alterations in the previous returns.

For instance, Umatilla was reported to be only 100 for Chamberlain. And on the street a report was circulated that it had gone about six for Chamberlain. The latest figures coming to The Journal from Pendleton gave the county to Chamberlain by 20. That was a substantial gain for him.

In Union County the majority was 707. The previous figures were 607. This was a forging ahead for Chamberlain of 100 on the total, which, of course, makes a difference of 20 when majorities are being handled.

Wheeler showed a loss for Chamberlain over the first returns, being 139 for Furnish.

Harney was a surprise for all. It was tabulated as about 50 for Chamberlain, but Julian Byrd, editor of the Times Herald, wired that it had gone 50 for Furnish. This was a loss of majorities of 100 for Chamberlain.

Grant County was a startling alteration of the expected result, for it had been conceded to Furnish by 200. The latest gave it to him by only 2. This is from Orrin L. Patterson, editor of the Blue Mountain Eagle, printed at Canyon City.

Malheur put down the expected Chamberlain margin from 50 to 15, constituting a loss on majorities of 70 for the Portland man.

When Marion County was brought in by Sheriff Frank Durbin, it was found that it had given Chamberlain 299, instead of 273, which was a gain of 26; or, figuring majorities, of 52 for Chamberlain.

COUNTY TICKET

Citizens Win Assessor and City Treasurer.

The Citizens' ticket won only two offices in the county—that of Assessor, carried by Charles E. McDonnell, who defeated George E. Watkins by 372. The other Citizens' ticket winner is J. E. Werlein, for City Treasurer.

Everything else is Republican in the county, including all legislative candidates, who won by big majorities.

There are several precincts from which accurate returns are not to be had, but in no wise can the result be changed.

A WILD UPROAR

In British House of Commons—Cabinet in Session.

(Scripps-McRae News Association.)
LONDON, June 5.—A wild scene was created in the Commons this afternoon during the debate on the proposed grant of £50,000 to General Lord Kitchener. Redmond, Irish Nationalist, said Kitchener's name would go down in history as having made war on women and children.

The House was immediately in an uproar. When order was restored, Redmond proceeded, claiming that Kitchener was responsible for the death of 10,000 children.

It was howled down, and a motion of closure was made and carried. The grant carried by a vote of 380 to 44.

HANNA FIGHTS THE CANAL

Makes a Talk Against the Nicaraguan Route.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—When the interoceanic canal bill was laid before the Senate this afternoon, Hanna took the floor in support of the Panama route. He was followed by Mitchell of Oregon, who said a failure on the part of the Senate to pass the House Nicaraguan bill will mean an indefinite postponement of the project.

Dickering with the Panama people, he said, would lead only to complications with the French government. The Nicaraguan route was perfectly feasible. He did not favor turning the matter over to the President, asserting that the duty of selecting the route is legislative, not executive.

A duty of tremendous responsibility was resting upon Congress and the executive.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—In illustration of his speech and to combat the assertions of Morgan that there is no danger to be feared from volcanoes on the Nicaraguan route, Hanna today produced in the Senate a large map showing the active and dead volcanoes of the Isthmian territory. It shows that within 100 miles on each side of the proposed Nicaragua route there are 29 active or extinct volcanoes. On the Panama route there is not a single volcano, active or extinct, and the Ohio supported the latter proposition.

Charge Against Robert N. Suito.

The composition of the next Oregon Legislature will be overwhelmingly Republican. In all, the Democrats will have but six members of the Senate, as follows: W. H. Wehring, Washington, hold over; Alex Sweick, Columbia, Multnomah and Washington, hold over; and Justus Wade of Union, hold over. The new Senators elected by the Democrats are M. A. Miller, Linn; Walter Pierce, Morrow, Umatilla and Union, and C. J. Smith of Umatilla.

GOD REVEALED THE MURDERER

Strange Testimony of a Woman in Salt Lake.

Continuing, he said that next day he had a vision of the bloody trail across the railroad track at the point where the body was subsequently found last December. Sharp, as are all the others connected with the case, is a Mormon. His testimony created a scene in the courtroom.
