PENNOYER'S WILL

Estate Valued at \$130,000—Land Bequests to Local Hospitals.

The will of Sylvester Pennoyer, deceased, was filed for probate in the County Court today. Two magnificent bequests are made to local hospitals. His Columbia Slough farm of 20 acres is devised to the Good Samaritan hospital, and the seven-acre tract at Woodstock is bequeathed to the St. Vincent's hospital. A part of the remainder of the estate is devised to lawful heirs, the residue to be divided as if the testator had died intestate. The will is written in the deceased's own handwriting, dated March 27, 1902, and is scrupulously prepared. It follows:

"I, Sylvester Pennoyer, of Portland, Or., do hereby make this my last will:

"I give the 20 acres, more or less, of land lying north of the Columbia Slough road in the Cuthbert Slump donation land claim, except the west 88 feet thereof, over which a right of way is given to the officers of the Good Samaritan Hospital, of Portland, Or., and their successors in trust to be forever used for the benefit of the patients of said hospital, said gift to be void whenever the property is not so used, or whenever any encumbrance shall be permitted upon the property.

"I give, under like conditions, to the officers of the St. Vincent's Hospital, of Portland, and their successors my seven-acre tract, west of and adjoining Woodstock.

"I give my 45 acres of land in Clark County, Washington, to my daughter, Gertrude Elizabeth, during her life, the remainder to the lawful issues of her body, her surviving.

"I give to each of my nieces and nephews \$100. The rest of my property, real and personal, to go to my heirs as if I had died intestate.

"I hereby appoint my wife, Mary A. Pennoyer, my executor without bonds, and direct her to employ Wm. M. Gregory whenever any lawyer shall ever be necessary in the settlement of my estate."

The entire estate is said to be worth about \$130,000. It includes a valuable sawmill on the water front and a fine residence on West Park and Morrison streets.

At the monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Free Library Association this week, the progress made recently is most encouraging and the attendance daily increases. The average daily attendance has been 54 and the daily average circulation of books was 466; one day 653 books were distributed. The children's department has a membership roll of 782, and the average circulation of these books was 83.

During the absence of the librarian, Miss Mary Frances Isom, the library will be in charge of Miss Harriet B. Gooch, former librarian at North Adams, Mass. Miss Isom will attend the library conference at Magnolia, Mass., and will be absent two months visiting friends.

THE VOTE

By Which Chamberlain Was Elected.

It is now absolutely certain that George E. Chamberlain has a sufficient majority over the Republican candidate to insure his election as Governor of Oregon and the politicians are now busy examining the records of the vote in the different counties in the endeavor to find out how it happened. Grant County, which ordinarily is heavily Republican, has given Furnish a majority of but one vote and Malheur, generally, strongly Democratic, has yielded Chamberlain a majority of but twelve.

In Umatilla, Furnish's home county, he was badly beaten, Chamberlain leading him by 308, while that old Republican stronghold, Marion, registered its protest against the political assassination of Geer by turning a normal Republican majority of 700 to a majority of 32 for the people's candidate for Governor, thus turning over 500 votes.

On the other hand, Clackamas, which was expected to be close, gave Furnish a plurality of 347, due, doubtless, to the efforts of that smooth politician, George C. Brownell, who despite the most determined opposition, won out for State Senator by over 600.

For Congressman, both Tongue in the First district, and Williamson in the Second, with majorities of 6,000 and 8,000 respectively, are only what was expected. The heavy vote polled by Geer over Wood for United States Senator has been a surprise to the politicians, he having received the endorsement of a very large majority of the voters of the state for the position to which he aspires and a subject of animated discussion at present is whether the next Legislature will dare to disregard the expression of the people in this matter.

THE COST IN BRITISH LIVES

As Paul Kruger Said Will Stagger Humanity.

(Journal Special Service.) LONDON, June 6.—An official statement issued by the War Office last evening shows that the total reduction of the British forces in South Africa up to May 30 of the present year was 7,477. This includes killed, wounded, prisoners, deaths from disease and men invalided home. Of these, many have recovered and are joining their regiments, leaving 2,894 dead or permanently incapacitated. The total number of troops killed in action or who died of wounds is 772, while the total number of deaths from disease is 12,250.

Information Dismissed. On the motion of Deputy District Attorney John Manning, Judge Sears yesterday dismissed the information against Lottie Gould, colored, charging her with the larceny of \$340 from J. R. Freshall, on March 15th. The prosecuting witness has left the city and can not be found.

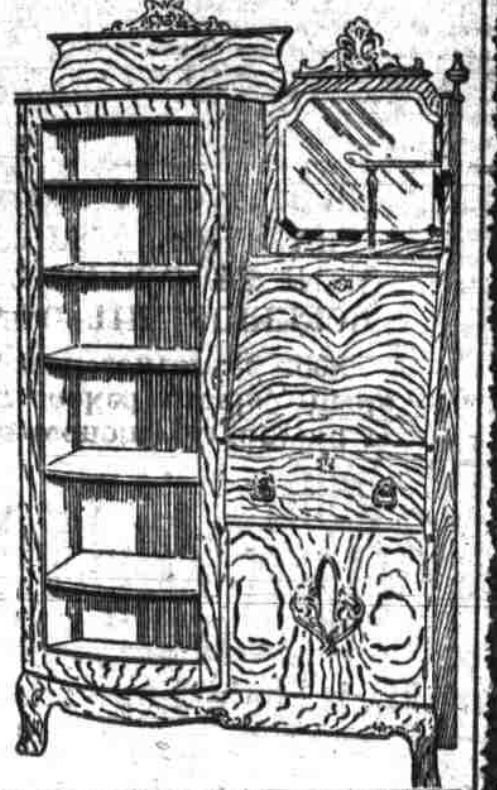
