

A.O.U.W. DELEGATES TO ARRIVE TONIGHT

Met at The Dalles by Local Committee—Down the River by Steamer.

The Supreme Lodge delegates of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, and the Superior Lodge, Degree of Honor, will arrive in Portland this evening at 8 o'clock. They were welcomed at Huntington, at 2 o'clock this morning by Governor Geer and a special committee of the A. O. U. W.

The special train bearing the delegates was 12 hours late. At 8 o'clock the train pulled out of Huntington. Early Sunday morning Governor Geer and party were preceded by a band headed by Ralph Feeney, J. E. Werlein and John R. Mann, and followed by nearly the whole population of Huntington. Mayor Imbopper introduced the Governor who delivered the earliest Sunday address in Oregon.

The delegation took breakfast at Pendleton, after which Governor Geer extended the hospitality of the state of Oregon. A. C. Harwick of Buffalo responded in an appropriate manner, following which C. O. Hogue, grand master of Oregon, welcomed the delegation in the name of the A. O. U. W., and Mrs. Willa Belknap, in the name of the Degree of Honor. W. Warner Wilson of Michigan, and Mrs. Ella Mantor, superior chief of honor of the United States and Canada, responded in behalf of the delegation.

At The Dalles, a large crowd of about 1000 people awaited the delegates to the Supreme Lodge, who arrived at 1 p. m. Mayor H. S. Howe welcomed them in the name of the City of Portland, after which the guests immediately embarked on the Steamer Gatzert for Portland. When the steamer passed Yaquina Bay the Portland bells were rung and whistles blown. The party will arrive at 8 o'clock this evening, when an informal reception will be tendered at the Hotel Portland.

The convention of the Supreme Lodge A. O. U. W. will be held in the Hibernal Hall, corner Sixth and Washington streets.

The Superior Lodge, D. of H., will meet in the Sellsing-Hirsch building. Both sessions will last two weeks.

LONDON, June 9.—The remains of a young woman, sawed and chopped up into a dozen pieces, have been found in an alley in the Lambeth district. The body had apparently been hacked and boiled. The scalp had been torn off, and the hands, feet and intestines were missing. It has been impossible to identify the remains, as the face was practically destroyed.

IMPORTANT CASE

(Journal Special Service.)
BOSTON, Mass., June 9.—One of the most important civil cases ever tried in this commonwealth was called for trial in a jury-waited session of the Suffolk Superior Court. It is the suit of Edward P. Baker against the Boston Elevated Railway Company to recover damages on account of an injury to real estate occasioned by the construction and operation of the road. It will doubtless be a test case in settling many questions of law likely to arise in this connection, as there are before the courts actions for damages where more than \$100,000 is involved the outcome will be watched with the closest attention not only by the lawyers, but also by those who have claims of a like nature against the road. The principal question of law up for decision is that of whether the noise caused by the running of trains shall be taken into consideration in determining the amount of damages awarded. The road denies that this is an element to be considered.

ABERDEEN, Wash.—Paul Underwood, wanted for alleged killing of his child at Ballard recently, is cornered in the big timber north of Willapa Bay. His capture is hourly expected.

SEATTLE—W. W. Green, a brakeman on the new Seattle-Tacoma line, was killed yesterday near Auburn. He fell under the wheels.

SPOKANE—William Russell, manager of the Third Avenue theater of Seattle, is in New York to arrange for new attractions for the popular-price theaters of the Northwest.

SEATTLE—The body of John Pirie, a rancher of Avondale, was found in the woods near his home yesterday with a bullet from a rifle in his head.

TACOMA—Two columns of steam were seen rising from the peak of Mount Rainier here yesterday. Many people assert volcanic activity.

ST. PAUL—N. Marcotte, Fred Wayman and R. Roberge were seriously wounded here yesterday in a battle with 30 Italians. Twenty of the latter have been arrested.

CRIPPLE CREEK—"Pug" Ryan, who recently escaped from Leadville jail, was rearrested here yesterday. He is wanted for murder.

ALAMOSA, Col.—Hereshal Smith and his son Orval, who are on trial here for the murder of a Mexican stockman, attempted to kill Earl Hart in the courtroom Saturday night, but were subdued by armed officers.

OVER THE WIRES.

LONDON—News of the discovery of a plot to blow up Lord Kitchener's residence in Pretoria has just been received here. Sixty arrests were made on May 14.

BRUSSELS—Ex-President Kruger declares that he will never return to South Africa, but will end his days in Holland.

VENICE—J. Pierpont Morgan is not ill as reported. He left Brindisi yesterday for London, traveling overland.

HAZLETON, Pa.—The employees of the Delaware, Susquehanna & Schuylkill road have refused to handle trains carrying non-union men to the anthracite mines.

ALPENA, Mich.—Four men are dead and 24 injured as the result of the wreck of an excursion train here yesterday.

LADERO, Tex.—Romulus, the famous Mexican wrestler, threw a wild bull from the San Luis Potosi ranch in the bull ring at Nueva Mexico, yesterday.

HARRIMAN, Tenn.—George Robert, a colored man, who assaulted Mrs. Jack Bailey, the wife of a rancher near here and then murdered her, is likely to be lynched today. A furious crowd demands his blood.

CHICAGO—A great strike at the stockyards here has been avoided. The companies have yielded absolutely to the unions' demands.

Timely Tips.

Those who are fond of old-fashioned odors will enjoy a scent bag filled with the following mixture: A half pound of dried lavender, an ounce each of dried thyme and mint, two teaspoonfuls of ground cloves and caraway and an ounce of well dried salt. Put into the little bags and slip under the pillow or in a layer of clothing.

A cheap and harmless rouge is a slice of boiled beet rubbed lightly on the cheeks. The edges of the stain may be softened down by gently dabbing with a piece of damp cotton wool.

To relieve rheumatism bathe the parts affected with hot water in which potatoes have been boiled. If used just before going to bed, by the next morning the pain will be much relieved, if not removed.

To clean window blinds spread on a table and rub all over with bread crumbs. If the blind be only generally grimy and not really very badly soiled or stained, this treatment will make it look quite clean and fresh again, and it will not be pulled out of shade, as blinds often are in the process of washing or ironing.
