The bigness of our country, is emphasized every now and then by some obsecure governmental routine. Away off in the Philippines we are delivering mail in cance-like boats, and, on the other hand, a contract was let last week for carrying the mail in Alaska by dog sleds. The successful bidder was Oscar Fish, and his route lies between Eagle and Valdes, a distance of 414 miles. He makes

two trips a month, and receives nearly \$1500 a trip, or \$35,000 a year. Only 300 pounds are carried per trip.



There are to be a rather cheerful lot of sub-organizations in the old Lemion Stock.

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There had been a great deal of money made just then on the Stock Exchange. and these clubs were one of the means whereby certain whiked and licentious men got rid of their gains. They were popularly called "hell-fire clubs." Their members were known by pseudonyms such as Pluto, the Old Dragon, the King

of Tartarus, Lady Envy and Lady Gom-orrah. They showed their contempt for everything sacred or awful by such de-vices as that of burning sulphur at their meeting. So much disconfort will men incur for the sake of doing something outrageous! Many were the stories that went about

concerning these "H. F." clubs. It was frequently related that after drinking a more than ordinarily horrible toast, some young man would fall down dead. Once it was said that a circle drank boiling scaltheen (a mixture of butter and whisky), before a roaring fire, so that "the marrow melting in their wicked bones,

they fell down dead upon the floor." At their wakes there was an unaccount-

able smell of brimstone, so that the very horses refused to draw their hearses. For when these clubs had had their day in London, the idea migrated to Dublin, where it was taken up with embellishment. Many other stories concerning them are told in Ireland even to this day, and especially of the large black cat that presided at the board, and was always nelped first.
