## THE SCOTTISH RITE MASONS'

Elaborate and Spacious Cathedral—Corner Stone Laid.

The Scottish Rite Cathedral now being erected will be of pressed brick and will be two stories, over a high basement. It was originally intended to erect the edifice of white stone, plans for the building placing the cost at \$150,000. As this is impossible at present, the smaller cathedral will be built. It will contain spacious rooms and accommodate a large number of people. The main entrance will be on Madison street, by three sets of double doors opening into the large tiled vestibule, connection with the first floor being a broad stairway. On the first floor is the banquet hall, 60x84 feet, having a platform for musicians. The ceiling will be carried by four huge steel girders. The floor will be of polished maple. The library will also be on this floor. It will be 27x48 feet, and contain a large fireplace. The secretary's office and a large parlor will complete this floor.

The second floor has the large auditorium, 60x70 feet, with a seating capacity of between 800 and 1000. The gallery will seat 250. The ceiling is 30 feet high, with a dome. It is planned to secure a large pipe organ of the Aeolian make for the auditorium. The armory will adjoin this room, and contain lockers for all members. There will be a large ante-room, a chamber of reflection and a property room. On the gallery floor is the organ loft, choir parlor and property room with janitor's apartments. The basement will be occupied with cloak room, a large dining room for ordinary use, and store rooms for chairs, tables, etc.

It is expected the building will be completed in six months, if the work can steadily progress.

### COURT NOTES.

The timber land suit of Anthony Neppach against the Oregon & California Railroad Company, has been appealed to the State Supreme Court. Neppach secured a judgment for \$47,000 in the former trial.

The suit of Ole Ostad against the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining Company, for \$25,000 for personal injuries received, was set for trial in the Federal Court yesterday. The case was continued by stipulation.

### HAS HER NAME PATENTED.

Novel Step of a Resourceful Party to a Social Dispute.

The headship of a family has become an issue. It exists as a fact today, quite independent of our long-cherished national antipathy to anything favoring of social inequality.

We are not quite ready, indeed, to place a law of primogeniture upon our statute books, but that matters little, so long as a man retains the right to dispose of his property as he deems best. And it is upon a property basis that the distinction necessarily rests, in default of any hereditary honors outside of a church, vestry or election.

The multi-millionaire (what a ludicrous phrase!) has only to endow the eldest son or the favorite son with the bulk of the family fortune and the thing is done; forthwith Mr. Johnson Jones becomes Mr. Jones par excellence, and he proceeds to emphasize the distinction on his visiting cards—he is THE Mr. Jones, and all others will please take notice. It follows as a matter of course that Mrs. Robinson Jones becomes Mrs. Jones, and it is just here where the trouble begins; there are some of us who can remember the martial law which prevailed for a whole season at a certain summer colony in consequence of a disagreement on this very question between a distinguished dowager and her daughter-in-law.

Even now there are rumors in the air of a similar casus belli, and if all that we hear be true, it would seem that one of the contestants has scored a novel point in law. The Mrs. Jones in question has had her title designation legally registered upon the copyright law, and all infringers are liable to civil prosecution.

More than that, the name, being a piece of property, can be legally bequeathed, like family plate or old lace, and remains in force for the full term of any copyright—42 years, to be exact.

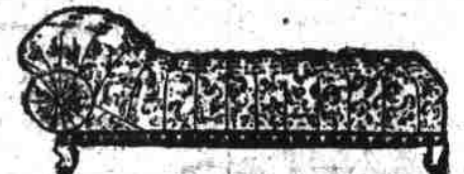
