GOOD SEASON IN PROSPECT

W. C. Calder Talks of Sumpter Mining District.

W. C. Calder, of the Sumpter Townsite Company, and actively interested in numerous mines, has been at the Portland for several days. He has confidence in the future of that district from a mining standpoint. It is common with other well-posted men, Mr. Calder says the eradication of fake schemes from the operations thereabouts will place the country upon a solid basis.

MINING NOTES

The Hydraulic Mining Company has disposed of several claims located in Jump-off Joe district in the Eastern Gold fields, to Mrs. E. A. Smith. The consideration named is \$15,500.

W. H. Ramsey and W. L. Ingram recently made a fine copper strike in the Slat Creek district.

A 10-stamp Hammond mill has been installed at the Eureka mine, Slat Creek district, which has been bonded by the Oregon & California Gold Fields, Limited.

Whitless Bros., of Minnieopolis, who recently bonded the Spencer & Cass properties, situated in Southern Josephine county, have a force engaged in developing them.

George Hoffman and Fred Bolt, of Thompson creek, who are working an excellent quartz mine in Tallow Box district, recently cleaned up several hundred dollars.

Twenty additional stamps in the mill of the North Pole mine, at Sumpter, are to be installed at once. It already has 10 stamps and an auxiliary cyanide plant, besides shipping a large quantity of ore to the smelter direct.

A large quantity of ore is being hauled to mill from the Gold Standard mine, located a few miles west of Jacksonville. It is of excellent quality and will doubtless yield well.

J. F. Garrison, who is developing a placer mine, situated in Sterlingville district, has run a tunnel 250 feet in length, but bedrock has not as yet been struck. The prospects for good pay are favorable, however.

Last fall, E. Everett and W. S. Driver purchased the Uncle Don mine, near Baker City, with the stipulation that they should thoroughly prospect the property before making the first payment. On Saturday they paid the first \$10,000 installment on the purchase price, and have assumed full control of the property.

Reent Legal Decisions

The continued use by a storekeeper of an appliance for hanging up and carrying about a movable electric light, which is defective because of insufficient insulation, is held, in Griffin vs. Jackson Light and Power Company (Mich.), 56 L. R. A. 218, to be an intervening agency between the negligence of the company in failing to keep the appliance properly insulated and an injury to a stranger attempting to use the light while delivering goods in the store, so that he can not hold the company liable for the injury.

A traveling salesman of a foreign corporation, sent to investigate the controversy out of which a cause of action arose, is held, in Abbvie Electric Supply Company (S. C.), 55 L. R. A. 146, to be within the provision of a statute authorizing service of process on a foreign corporation by serving personally any agent thereof within the limits of the state.
