

The Commercial World

Green corn arrived from California yesterday in small receipt, and were sold by the few jobbers having them in stock at 50c a dozen. A few changes will be noticed this morning in the quotations on vegetables.

Butter still remains at the old figure, 17 1/2 to 18 1/2 for the best creamery, 16 1/2 to 17 1/2 for dairy and 15 1/2 to 16 1/2 for store variety. The large shipments of store butter to the California market still continue. The product is used in the manufacture of process butter.

At 15c a dozen, whole eggs may be said to be holding their own—and if anything, very stiff on quotations. A fairly good supply is arriving daily, but it does not seem to be able to keep up with the increased demand.

Small spring chickens in a rather too liberal receipt are keeping the poultry quotations down to bedrock. There is a good demand now for turkeys and quotations are said to be very liberal.

The poultry market will probably continue weak the rest of the week. Several changes appear in the quotations of canned salmon.

ABOUT RAILROADS.

The latest method adopted by the Missouri, Kansas & Texas to keep the road before the public is to supply soda water counters in Texas with drinking glasses bearing the monogram of "Katy."

Telegraph operators of the Canadian Pacific and the management, who were deadlocked on the question of wages because the operators insisted that the minimum on all divisions should be 30c a month, have reached an agreement, the nature of which has not been made public, but the employees say they are satisfied.

It is said that an extension will be built by the Great Northern from the terminus at Republic, Wash., to the main line at Wenatchee, Wash., a distance of 25 miles. Surveys have been made from Republic to Chewaw, and through the Meyers Creek district to Oroville, following the Similkameen River to Palmer Lake and Loomis, 65 miles from Republic. The balance of the line has yet only been determined in a general way.

Contract has been let by the Northern Pacific to Cook & Hinds of Helena, Mont., for the branch to be known as the Bismarck & Edgely line in North Dakota, and it is said that work will begin at once. Edgely is a terminus both of the Northern Pacific and of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul at present.

Grant was broken May 23 for the extension 22 miles long from Van Vleck to Bay City, Wharton County, Texas. R. L. Knebel has been appointed assistant superintendent of the William division and the William & Sioux Falls, of the Great Northern, with headquarters at Willmar, Minn., succeeding C. F. Sewell, transferred, effective June 1. J. C. Howard succeeds Mr. Knebel as assistant superintendent of the Eastern Minnesota division, with headquarters at West Superior, Wis.

The lightship tender Manzanilla left yesterday afternoon for Tillamook Rock to deliver supplies. The Quito will complete loading her cargo of hay and oats for Manila at the Alaska dock today. She will have aboard 1800 tons of hay and 375 tons of oats.

The new four-masted barkentine Aurora arrived at Port Townsend Saturday from Shanghai, after a fair passage of 42 days. She proceeded to Chemainus without anchoring. The tug Tye, of the Puget Sound Tugboat Company's fleet, went on the drydock at Quartermaster Harbor Saturday to remain until Tuesday, undergoing extensive repairs as the result of an accident she met with a few days ago outside the cape.

The British ship Speke is in the straits and ready to sail as soon as she secures a crew. There seems to be a scarcity of sailors in port today, and it may be some time before she is enabled to depart. The Speke will go to South Africa.

Many Portland people go on a short outing every Sunday to Oregon City, and to accommodate the crowds a boat left the Taylor street dock every hour Sunday from 8:30 in the morning to 5:30 in the evening. This is the first time that such service has been given this season.

The British ship Ventura, which is at Antwerp loading for Portland, was chartered yesterday to load wheat or flour at Portland in December at 28c. The schooner Repeat cleared at the Astoria custom house yesterday for San Pedro with 500,440 feet of lumber, loaded at the Knippton mills.

The American bark Kenilworth arrived out at Hamburg June 10, after a voyage of 148 days from Tacoma. The Kenilworth is owned by the Sewalls of Bath, Me., and is the only American vessel which loaded wheat on the North Pacific Coast this year. She took 123,400 bushels from Tacoma for Girwin and Eyre.
