All Along the Line the Company May Have Strike.

(Journal Special Service.) ST. PAUL, June 15.—Unless an agreement is reached with the local union of bootmakers at once, the Great Northern road is promised trouble all along the line.

The men say the officials have had time to think the matter over, and as they have made no offer to compromise, an effort will now be made to have every man employed in the boiler shops of the road between St. Paul and the coast lay down their tools.
