A recent sale was made of the quarter block at Second and Taylor streets for \$24,000. Upon this property stands a modern, three-story brick building.

It is believed that a new era is about to dawn for Second street, south of Salmon, where property has not been very closely looked after for some time.

An improvement already noted by The Journal, is to be made at Fifth and Mill, by the Sisters of the Holy Name at St. Mary's Academy, which will cost \$15,000.

W. G. Baker and wife have sold 20 acres to the Title Guarantee & Trust Company for \$25,000.

Woodard, Clarke & Co., will build a one-story warehouse at Ninth and Hoyt streets to cost \$1700.

The past week has been very quiet in the matter of changes in the local wholesale markets.

The market is overstocked with second grade bananas and the hawkers are reaping the benefit.

Taft, Hine & Co. report very large receipts in the meat line. Pork and veal especially arrived in large supply.

The grocery market as reported by Wadhams & Co. is normal with very few changes the past week. No changes appear in quotations today.

Glazko & Co. say that business is excellent in the vegetable line. Receipts have been good the past week.

Receipts in the Eastern provision market, as reported by Sinclair & Co., are still a trifle below the average of last year.

According to the Portland Flouring Mills Company, there is still nothing done in the grain market. Nothing is moving and as a consequence no changes appear in quotations.

Turner & Co. say that receipts of eggs the past week have been very heavy, but the consumption has been about even with the supply.

As reported by Henry Everding, butter keeps about cleaned up. No changes appear in quotations.
