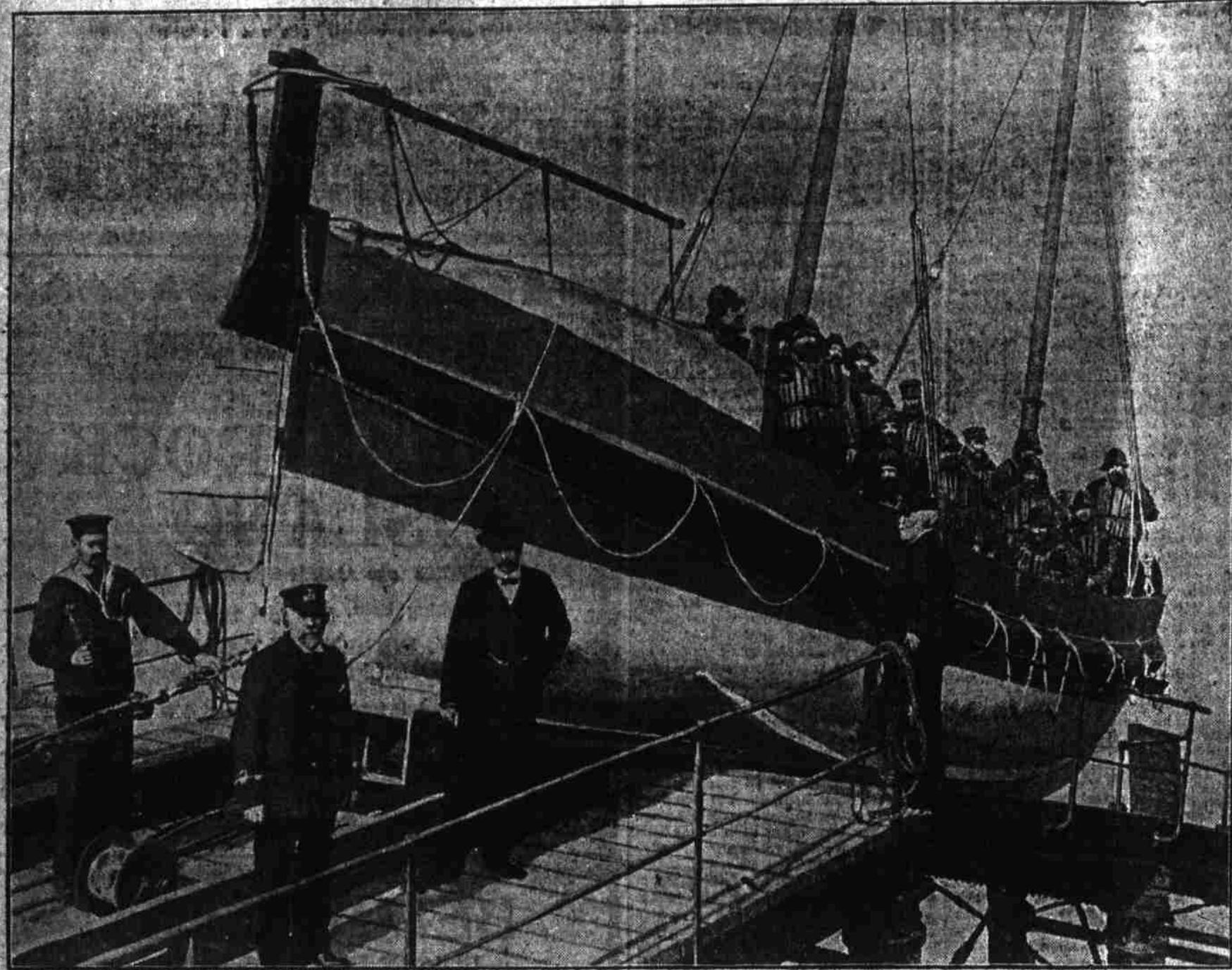

TO DEVELOP WEST VIRGINIA

CHARLESTON, W. Va., June 27.—The most important railroad enterprise of the year in West Virginia will be prosecuted by a syndicate, which has just been chartered by leading capitalists of Grafton. The company is the Greenbrier, Monongahela & Pittsburg, whose intention it is to build a road from Marlinton, in the extreme southern part of the state, to Point Marion, near the Pennsylvania boundary. The road will thus traverse the state in an almost northerly direction, and will have an outlet at Pittsburg if present plans are carried out. The line will open a new territory of unsurpassed richness in timber and coal as well as agricultural resources.

SELF HANGED ON SAME ROPE

The Ghastly Suicide of Man and Wife in Paterson.

PATERSON, N. J., June 27.—The bodies of Taraj Kirzan and his wife, Poles, were found in the attic at their home, swinging from a beam. The man was about 30 years old and the woman two years younger. No cause for the act has been found, but it was evidently the result of agreement between them. They had no children, but the woman was about to become a mother. The two bodies were within a few inches of one another and facing. They hung at each end of one piece of rope, which had been thrown across the beam, one body counterbalancing the other. After firing the rope around their necks they had tied their hands and kicked from under them the support they had stood upon.

THIS PREACHER WAS HUSKY

A Southern Minister Backed His Words With Blows.

NORFOLK, Va., June 27.—Rev. D. H. Tuttle, a Methodist, conducting a temperance crusade at Elizabeth City, N. C., was told by W. H. Baxter, a saloonist that he would have to retract certain statements. The preacher refused and, making a further attack on Baxter, was assaulted on the street by the latter. A desperate fight ensued, and Baxter was badly beaten by the preacher. Great excitement prevails at Elizabeth City between citizens and the liquor element, and an outbreak is feared.

SONS OF PEACE WERE SCRAPPERS

AKRON, O., June 27.—A bloody factional fight took place this forenoon in the Jewish synagogue on Bowery street, between members of the congregation known as the Sons of Peace. Bricks were used and several men were knocked down. Two received bad scalp wounds, one having his scalp nearly torn from his head. The fight occurred during services, when one member of the congregation was making a speech. It is claimed that Ben Rudimsky interfered with the services. Five people were arrested and warrants are out for more. All were charged with disorderly conduct and fighting.

Rhuse of Tiffin, O., in a suit for damages filed here, tells the champion hard-luck story. He was not only forced to walk all the way from New Orleans to Tiffin, but it took so long to do it that he alleges he lost \$15,000 on Beaumont oil leases which elapsed while he trudged through the swamps of the South. The suit is against the L. & N. Railroad, and \$25,000 is asked as damages resulting from the railroad's refusal to honor a ticket for passage from New Orleans to Tiffin.

BAD CONVICT KILLS PURSUER

DALLAS, Tex., June 27.—An escaped convict entered the home of a farmer named Peary in Kaufman County, stole a shotgun and frightened Mrs. Peary. Her husband returned home later and organized a posse, which went in pursuit of the convict. They overtook the fugitive near Lawrence and he opened fire, killing Allen Holenquest. The convict was pursued and captured after being slightly wounded. He is now in jail at Kaufman, with threats of lynching.

HELD FOR A QUEER CRIME
