EMERGENCY HOSPITAL NEEDED

By Dr. D. H. Rand. "I will say at the start that one of the long-felt wants of the City of Portland is an emergency hospital, which should be located somewhere in the central part of the city. I really believe that a building erected in the rear of the Courthouse block would be the most desirable. There is would only take a few minutes for a seriously wounded man to be attended to. Portland is a growing city, having at the present time a population of at least 100,000 people, and an emergency hospital is one of our greatest needs. The city is growing now more than any previous time in its history. Many cities of much less population than Portland have had an emergency hospital for many years. The hospital would be a place where the most serious cases, such as men badly wounded in a street-car, elevator or some other serious accident, could be taken and receive instant attention. A hospital of this kind would no doubt be the means of saving many a life, and I don't think that the little matter of expense should stand in the way of its erection. If the hospital is located in the county courtyard, it should make his headquarters there and be on hand to attend any cases that may come in. The hospital would not be used to keep a person in until they recover, but until they are out of all danger and can be easily taken to another hospital or their home is wanted. The only expense attached to the building of the hospital would be the erection of the building, the employment of a nurse, a matron and a superintendent. The matron and superintendent could be a man and wife. In connection with the hospital should be a city ambulance, which Portland has been lax through these many years in providing for. It is not right to take a man who is badly injured in the patrol wagon, which is used to convey common drunks or criminals. I don't think that we can construct an emergency hospital too soon. The sooner the better for many a suffering individual. The city and county officials ought to get together and take the matter up between them. We delight in calling Portland the metropolis of the Pacific North west, but do we deserve the title? Let us build that emergency hospital at once."

Trade in Coal Dust.

The scarcity of anthracite coal has developed a new business. Coal dust is being sold at retail. Within the last month the demand for the dust has increased greatly.

Although the price has advanced nearly 100 per cent during the last few weeks, coal dust retails at about one-seventh the present cost of anthracite coal. It now retails at \$150 a ton. Speaking of the coal dust situation, a prominent Philadelphia dealer said the other day: "Never since I have been in the business, 23 years, have I had such a demand for anthracite coal dust as at present. The manufacturers are beginning to realize the great value of this dust for steam purposes. I remember the time, and not so long ago, either, that I had to pay teamsters to haul this dust from my yards and dump it on the vacant lots in South Philadelphia. Now I would like to have a couple of hundred tons for my customers. The demand is greater than ever before, and I shouldn't wonder if the price would reach \$1 within the next few days."

POISONED BY SODAWATER.
