

MANIAC MOTHER KILLS HER CHILD

A Pitiful Tragedy in a Salinas, Cal., Home.

 SALINAS, Cal., June 30.—Mrs. Charles Leslie is a raving maniac, and her seven-month-old infant lies dead from ammonia poisoning. When Mr. Leslie, who is a slaughterer for butchers, returned to his home in the outskirts of the city he found his wife acting wildly. She brought him to save the baby, as some persons wanted to kill it. The child was unconscious and remained so till midnight, when it died. The fumes of ammonia were apparent. On the child's neck was a large burn, as if from a fiery liquid. The husband says he believes that his wife was frightened at something and attempted to crawl under the house with the baby, but in her excitement must have dropped it. Seeing that the infant was unconscious from the fall, the mother probably became more excited and used the ammonia in her efforts to revive it. In her trepidation she spilled some of the contents of the bottle on the child's neck and the fumes killed the child.

JEFFERSON DAVIS

JADE SEALS IN SOLDIERS' KITS

Sacred Chinese Tablets Are Recovered in Frisco.

 SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—Five imperial jade seals of the Chinese Government and ten priceless jade sacred tablets from the imperial temple at Peking have been seized here by customs officials at the transport dock in the baggage of Lieutenant Schoeffel, Ninth Infantry. Two other tablets were found in the possession of A. Hease, who returned on the transport Sherman. Schoeffel says he purchased them for \$50 after the capture of Peking. The Chinese Government offered large rewards for their recovery. Each tablet is a history of the reign of one Emperor, and they are of enormous value, both in age and in sentiment, as they have never been duplicated.

GREAT INFLUX OF IMMIGRANTS

 NEW YORK, June 30.—There is no truer indication of national prosperity than the volume of immigration. As the conditions of prosperity in this country have become more and more pronounced during the last few years there has been a steady increase in the number of immigrants. Figures for the fiscal year, ending today, at Ellis Island show that nearly 500,000 aliens have landed at this port, the present month alone bringing more than 50,000 from the various countries of Europe. A noticeable fact is the increase in the number of Italian arrivals, due in all probability to the unprecedented volume of railroad construction, which employs large numbers of the workmen from King Victor's domain.

RAG TIME OSTRACIZED

him as a girl and treated him as a daughter. He was taught to do house-keeping, and later found work as a woman servant in Saxony. While washing dishes and scrubbing floors in his native place, a woman employed in the same household left Saxony for Philadelphia. She secured a good place, and "Ouille" decided to follow her.

"Ouille" almost passed the rigid scrutiny of the government officials without arousing suspicion. "Ouille" wore a small shawl over his head as he walked by the officials. But when he was taken before the board of special inquiry the palm of his hands and his fingers aroused the suspicion that he was a man and the medical staff was asked to set all suspicions at rest. The officials cut away the supposed woman's fine blonde hair, which was worn long and carefully dressed, and to further prevent deception dressed the intending immigrant in his proper attire.
