The marine engineers' strike is on in earnest. The tie-up is complete so far as the important boats are concerned.

There was a report yesterday that the Regulator and White Collar lines had signed the agreement, but this was untrue.

The whole trouble can be summed up in a few words: There is a strike on and it is going to continue for several days at least.

TRACY CORNERED NEAR SEATTLE

A Bloody Battle Is Expected at Any Moment.

Big Force of Sheriff's Deputies and Police Are Surrounding the Convict.

SEATTLE, July 3.—Convict Tracy held up four men and compelled them to run a launch from Olympia to Seattle yesterday.

They landed at Ballard, a suburb of Seattle, last night. Tracy told the men in the launch that he had killed Merrill, as he was suspicious that the latter was losing his nerve and wanted to give up, so he shot his companion three times in the back and threw his body in the brush.

Tracy was seen at 6:30 this morning by workman A. D. Freeman, walking along the Seattle & International railway, past Ravenna Park, at the edge of the city.

At a distance of 100 feet Freeman recognized him from his published pictures. Tracy had a peck on his back and was carrying a rifle. Freeman ran to the nearest telephone and told the police.
