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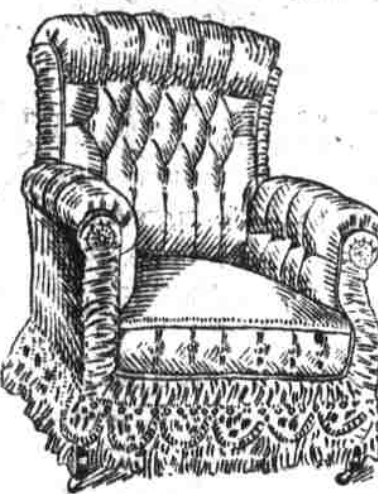

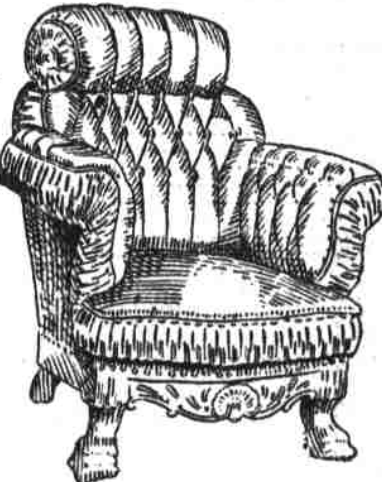

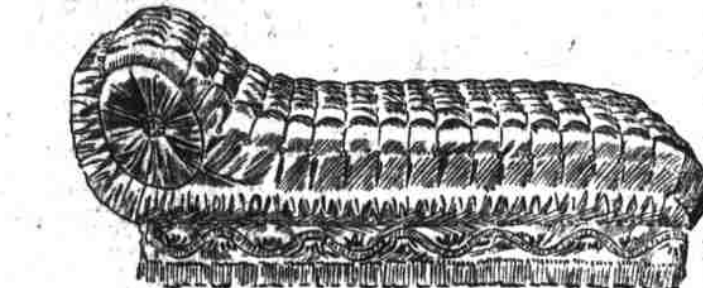

DIVORCE WANTED

By Woman Who Found She Had Married a Woman.

BAITMORE, Md., July 4.—Mrs. Ernestine L. Rauck has sought the aid of the courts in order to annul her marriage to Lydia Lotta Sawyer, alias Herman G. Wood, whose masquerade as a man has been reported. Mrs. Rauck, by Attorney James A. McCarthy, filed a petition in the Superior Court, asking that her "colorable and feigned marriage" be declared null and void, and upon the petition Judge Wright signed an order for a hearing of the case.

The bill filed by Mrs. Rauck said that the petitioner, a widow and the mother of children, was married to the defendant by the Rev. Anthony Bilkovsky at the minister's home, 229 East Twenty-second street, on June 16 last, and that two days subsequent to the ceremony discovered that her "husband" was a woman. The bill says that the defendant has confessed the deception, and has also undergone a physical examination which established the averment as to sex.

CRIME IN HIS SLEEP

The victim was terribly lacerated about the body and legs and can not recover. The young man is disconsolate over the affair and protests he dreamed he was attacked by burglars.

TIGHT LACING KILLS

Singular Case at Salvation Army Meeting in London.

LONDON, July 4.—Tight lacing combined with religious excitement and the heated atmosphere of a Salvation Army hall, has had fatal consequences for Mary Edwards, a housemaid.

She went with a fellow-servant to the Salvation Army barracks, in Portobello road, and after entering the building was heard to complain of the sudden change in the weather.

During the evening she was called upon to sing, and began the hymn "When on Earth Life is Ending." At the end of the first line she fell back into her friend's arms, and expired almost immediately afterward in the lobby.

At the inquest the doctor who made the autopsy said that the action of the heart had been impeded by tight lacing, which, together with the heat of the hall, had caused the girl's death.
