THE ROOTERS' CLUB ORGANIZES

Members Will Endeavor to Remove Hoodoo on Local Ball Team.

The unsatisfactory trip made by the Portlands was the occasion of a special meeting of the Rooters' Club, held Fourth of July eve in the clubrooms at the Imperial Hotel. President Charley Malarkey occupied the chair and Secretary Dave Houston kept the official record of the proceedings.

Everyone admitted that the ball team was "hoodooed" and the question arose as to what steps should be taken to raise the "hoodoo." The discussion was long and animated. Billy Upton maintained that having 13 men on the trip was the cause of it all, while Dave Houston thought no club should have two players of the same name. Both of these causes having been removed by the release of one Mahaffey and the desertion of the other, both Upton and Houston expected Portland to take all five games from Seattle, expecting Thursday's postponed game to be played Monday.

At this point some one quoted Manager Dugdale as saying he expected to take two games only out of the present series. This caused Lou Coulter to ask if Dugdale, because of the rain, expected to play more than the two games. At this there was an awful roar, and cries of "Expel him! He's a 'knocker'!"

The upshot of the whole thing was that formal charges were preferred against Coulter, the main one being that he never let pass an opportunity to pull out his little hammer, and that no "knocker" was worthy to be continued a member of the club anyhow.

The consideration of the charges occupied most of the evening. Among those taking a prominent part in the discussion were: Messrs. Upton, Griffin, Matthews, Adams, Harbaugh, Houston and Lyons. None of these gentlemen had a kind word for the accused, they all maintaining that he always was, and never could be anything but a "knocker." Dave Houston said that even when the Portland Club did play perfect ball and win out Coulter would not render unto Caesar the things that were Caesar's, but, on the contrary, would hint excuses for the opposing team and endeavor to show how all luck was with the Portland boys.—President Malarkey made a strong plea

for clemency on the ground that the club had never as yet taken such radical action as to expel a member. Whereupon Ed Lyons jumped to his feet, yelling: "He has no right here, anyhow; he got in under false pretenses."

The tide was too strong to stem, and by a vote of 25 to 1 (Coulter voting for himself), the motion to expel was carried. The expulsion was formally effected by the adoption of these resolutions:

Whereas, We have organized as a Rooters' Club, the members to be friends of the Portland baseball players and to uphold them in adversity as well as prosperity; and

Resolved, That Lou Coulter, who never was anything but a "knocker," be dishonorably expelled from the club without a chance of resignation; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the records of the club and a copy sent to the family of the late member.

Objection was made to the last part of the resolutions, but President Malarkey ruled that such wording was usual in death resolutions, and that as expulsion was in this case equivalent to death, he saw no reason to depart from the usual form. There being no appeal from the president's ruling, the resolutions were recorded as read.

When it was all over there was a sigh of relief. The only word of sympathy came from "Big-Hearted" Houston. He said he was afraid the stigma would follow the poor fellow through life.

The discussion of the main question was then resumed, but was not continued long, the members agreeing to see if Upton and Houston knew what they were talking about when they said the departure of the Mahaffey brothers for Baker City would break the hoodoo cast upon the club.

The only other business before the club was the election of new members. There were no applications for active membership, but the Hon. George H. Williams, Charles H. Prescott and Frank A. Spencer were elected to honorary membership.

After prayer by Chaplain Harbaugh that it would not rain on the Fourth, the club adjourned subject to the call of the president.
