

PLUMBERS' TROUBLES

The Union Must Now Fight Its Own Battles.

The Building Trades Council is again working the card system with all the unions of which it is composed excepting the plumbers. The latter union has been cast aside and will be permitted to fight its own battles.

OREGON BADLY NEEDS A STATE MINING BUREAU

J. H. Fisk, the assayer, believes that Oregon's greatest need is a state mining bureau. He believes that the lack of one is the principal reason that Oregon's mining industry is not developed so far as it should be.

This is held by the Building Trades to be in violation of all rules of unionism, and as a result the card system has been taken away from the plumbers. Non-union plumbers can now work upon all buildings without interference, so far as the other unions are concerned, and the jobs will not be declared unfair.

Herein is where the members of the Plumbers' Union are going to get themselves into all kinds of difficulties from which they cannot be easily extricated. Not a union in the city is now affiliated with them, and it is evident that it will require superhuman effort on their part to preserve their organization intact.

TURN VEREIN JOINS GERMAN AID SOCIETY

At the semi annual meeting of the Portland Social Turn Verein last night the main question considered was a consolidation of that organization with the German Aid Society.

This action has been contemplated for some time. The move was made for the purpose of furthering the ideas and interests of the German population of the city. It is thought that these objects can be better subserved by the two societies working in unison.

The objects of the Aid Society are to erect a commodious hospital and aid all Germans in distress. This society now has on hand about \$3,000 in a fund to be devoted to that purpose.

When the new organization is formed it will, among other things, erect the best equipped gymnasium in the Northwest for the development of the physique of the young and old, and a hospital to take care of them when in need of such attention.

Those who were present at last night's meeting are very enthusiastic over the proposed consolidation, and are already throwing bouquets at each other over the outlook for the new society.

BICYCLE SLEUTHS ARE RESTING

There was an ominous lull in the bicycle department of the Sheriff's office yesterday, and unlicensed bicycle riders were unmolested by the wary deputy. When it was discovered yesterday that the Sheriff was collecting delinquent taxes and selling wheels without a warrant from the County Commissioners as required by law, the bicycle sleuths were

called off their beats. Although a new dicer was issued and the warrant was placed in the hands of the Sheriff yesterday forenoon, the deputies were not permitted to go out. This morning they reported for duty and were told to wait until this evening when they can begin over again.

MARINE NOTES.

The British ship Centurian, which left Portland in March with a cargo of wheat, arrived at Queenstown, Wednesday, after making the run in 114 days. The arrival of the Centurian leaves but 30 vessels on the way for Portland. Three of these, two of the March fleet are still on the same day as the Centurian, and six that have not yet reported started six days ahead of her.

The schooner Oliver J. Olsen, built on the coast of Oregon, was wrecked on the coast of California, and the crew and cargo were rescued.

Grays Harbor over a week ago, arrived at Astoria Wednesday and will proceed to Portland to load lumber. She has a capacity of over 800,000 feet. The F. S. Redfield and the John A. Campbell are also listed for this port to load lumber.

Sailing vessels are leaving Australia for Pacific coast ports in ballast, being unable for the first time on record to secure coal cargoes. The steamships are buying oil instead of coal, and the weak market makes the freight rates so low that it is not profitable for the grain ships bound for San Francisco or other coast ports to carry it.
