Testing Rivershore Sands on Applegate

H. F. Way and son Herb started last week testing ground a few hundred feet above the covered bridge at Applegate. Although they are down but a few feet in the river sand, colors have begun to appear in the long sluice box they have rigged up.

The senior Way has been working at the Madden mines on the coast experimenting with a new inverted flotation process. This new development, according to Way, consists of a compound of pine tar which gold and other metals will adhere to. The black sands of the coastal region are ground to 150 mesh fineness in a ball mill and passed onto a revolving belt covered with the tar compound where only metallics will remain. After a run is made the compound and accumulation is scraped off and the mixture burned. The residue is panned out and it is claimed the new discovery recovers all the silica-coated shore gold.

The younger Way, Herb, has been mining in the Feather river country in California, where he has had some unusual experiences. One of these, Herb related, was rather humorous. He and another young fellow were swimming in the river one day when they happened to notice a yellow reflection in a few feet of water. They promptly hurried into their clothes, got a rope, bucket and pan and returned. One would dive to the bottom with the bucket to fill it with the colored sands while the other pulled it to shore. After working industriously for quite a while they panned out their mound of soil and were rewarded with an accumulation of glittering mica. Not a gold color was found. Since then they have not mixed bathing with mining.

MINE IN OLD WELL

H. A. De Haas, Donald Dorothy and Homer Lontz are cleaning out an old well and sinking shaft on the Ward property here. Pump is set up and working. They received welcome encouragement the other day upon reaching bottom of the shaft when they picked up an old horseshoe. They deny being superstitious but have named the development the Horseshoe mines.

START MINING ON KENNON CONFECTIONERY PROPERTY

Sinking of shaft has been completed and drifting begun on bedrock by the K-W-F mining company, Kennon, Wheeler and Flitcroft, on property adjacent to the Kennon candy factory.

The day bedrock was reached gold was panned. Several good sized nuggets were found in addition to finer particles.
