

Fighting Wrestlers Sock Bystanders, Friends in Grudge

Mack Lillard's two showmen, Pete Belcastro of Weed and Ray Frisbie of Medford, further crystallized their long-standing personal grudge in the ring Wednesday night in the form of legitimate— and not so legitimate—boxing.

The wrestlers, for they are of the strain and moan trade, decided gloves would help pick the better man and anyway they each had a burning desire to swing wildly when they saw one another, so Lillard, always willing to meet his charges half way and please the fans thereby, agreed. Twice Frisbie had gotten a decision over Belcastro, who wasn't satisfied yet that the Medford fireman could lick him, and issued a gloved challenge.

In the first round, than which there was no whicher, Frisbie had his rival on the canvas three times, had him groggy and sick, but didn't quite give him the right dosage, for bellicose Belcastro came back, witnesses say, to knock Frisbie to sleep with one mighty thrust of his shoulder. It seems that Swede Anderson, former football player, was no more popular with the Californian than the fireman, and when Swede climbed through the ropes to help Frisbie to his feet, he found himself on the receiving end of several husky punches. He retaliated in true football style, with a tackle and body punches. In the melee that followed Belcastro was pulled to his feet and stood there arguing while Frisbie, come to, espied the back of his neck and promptly mistook it for a jig-saw puzzle. He evidently figured his glove was the missing piece to make the picture complete and he forthwith planted it there. It fitted. Belcastro hit the floor with a thud and stayed there. However, the Italian from below the Siskiyou won the decision.
