When a cutthroat bootlegger was accidentally killed in a raid while reaching for a rifle, this editor clamored for two years to bring the "guilty" to justice. The editor's closest friend, another in the journalistic field, recommended that the raiding officers be lined up and "the tops of their heads blown off by soft-nosed pills."

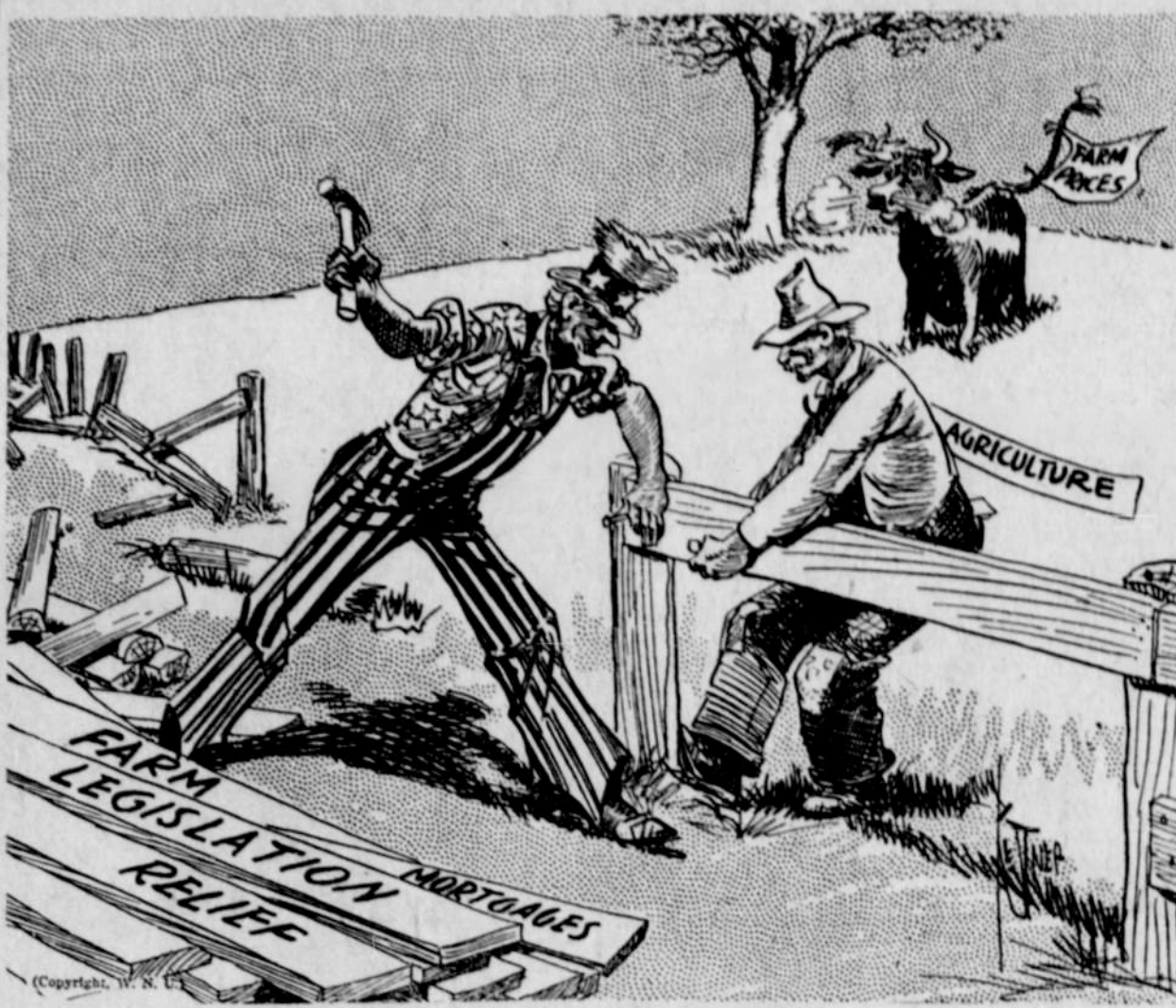
When a man in Ashland was accidentally killed during a drunken brawl, and a coroner's inquest placed no blame, this same editor yells to the mountain tops that another miscarriage of justice has been committed by the state. He clamors for the hanging of the one responsible for the death.

But when that same editor, after carefully building up his own defense beforehand with daily lies and charges, hides behind the skirts of his wife to shoot an innocent and unoffending officer who was endeavoring to serve an arrest warrant. THAT is different, by some stretch of his own imagination.

Because he had boldly announced beforehand in his newspaper that he would kill and draw blood, and warned that the state was "leading a lamb to the slaughter," this editor believes HE was the victim of persecution! He demands an entirely different consideration from that which he had given to others and a reversal of the doctrine with which he had attracted hundreds of his misguided followers.

When this editor comes to trial for HIS life, he resorts to perjured testimony, alienists and manufactured evidence to escape punishment. When this editor commits a far worse crime than those whom he had based his claims for support on, he immediately argues that he was being persecuted! He betrays his friends on the witness stand, tells lies about a dead, defenseless

officer, and attempts to place the blame, as usual, on his opponents.

Yet all Jackson county knows George Prescott, the victim, was not the type of man who would ever curse, threaten a man's life or draw a gun on a woman. All Jackson county should know by now that Defendant Banks is an inveterate liar, and that even a few days after his FIRST arrival in Jackson county had debts followed him here.

And now, since three weeks of the trial, all Jackson county should know beyond the shadow of a doubt that Banks feels that HE should be exempt from ordinary consideration and punishment. Although he gained much of his political strength by attacking special privilege, his followers and all should plainly see now, if they ever will, that Mr. Banks' interests were not for the common man, but were for himself alone, and that he wants special privilege for himself.

The trial's developments should be proof enough for any of Banks' insincerity, his hypocrisy and ego, yet there are still some misguided Good Government congressmen who feel just as their leader does, that HE should be excused for murder—THAT HE CAN COMMIT NO CRIME.

It is for this reason, among others, that the outcome of the murder trial in Eugene concerns far more than just the disposition of a man and his wife who committed one of the most cold-blooded murders in the history of Jackson county.

And, because of his proclivity for getting more than 20 formerly fairly law-abiding citizens into trouble and bankrupting the county, it is important that the extreme penalty be given this public enemy No. 1. The ordinary man, who murders in a fit of rage or in an effort to escape the clutches of the law, is understood and more easily disposed of. But a fiery, fist-banking editor who craftily plans and commits murder and involves dozens of his countrymen in crime at the same time is far more dangerous.

Where the ordinary murderer's menace extends usually only to his victim or victims, this man Banks thrusts an entire county into shame, crime and heavy financial loss. Neighbor has been pitted against neighbor through this man's efforts. A former prosperous, peaceful community has been torn apart and its citizens divided and lined up against one another instead of being united in their battle with the rest of the world. And as if this were not enough, he then commits one of the most inhuman murders within the comprehension of man.
