Card History of Old Town Prepared by Mrs. A. A. Sargent

Alice Applegate Sargent, one of southern Oregon's authentic historians, has prepared a poster history of early days of Jacksonville. A dozen different cards have been printed telling brief history of the discovery of gold and interesting facts about the several landmarks found here.

The cards, to be placed in the Native Daughters' museum building donated by Mrs. Sargent to that organization, the Southern Oregon Museum in the U. S. hotel, and other points of historic interest, give in few words accurate information concerning names, dates and events surrounding the birth of one of the west's most colorful pioneer cities. Two U. S. hotel rooms, where President Hayes and General Sherman spent one night years ago, also will be marked. Mrs. Sargent's contribution is

part of the city-wide preparation for this year's Gold Rush Jubilee, and will fill a long need. The Jubilee is expected to rival in activity and splendor even the days when millions of dollars in pure gold were being mined within stone's throw of the town's main intersection.

One of the cards bears the following legend, "Discovery of Gold. Gold was discovered in Jacksonville by James Clugage in 1851. Clugage and his partner, a man by the name of Pool, were carrying supplies by pack train from Yreka to towns in the Willamette valley at the time of the discovery. This was the beginning of the settlement of the Rogue River valley." Another concerning great riches of the county reads, "In 1859 Jacksonville was the richest town in Oregon; Jackson county was the richest and most populous county in Oregon; Oregon was admitted as a state in 1859."

Mrs. Sargent is a daughter of one of the early-day freighters before the days of Jacksonville's beginning.

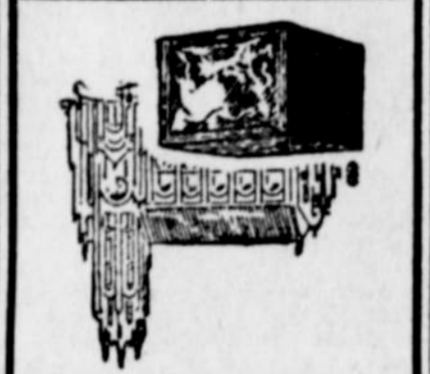
