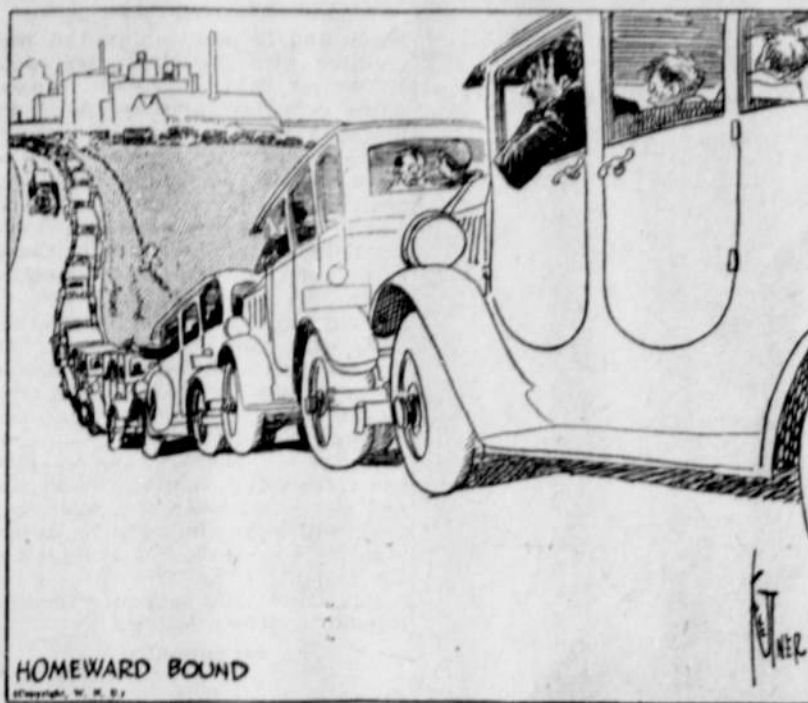

Miners Go After Gold Hill's Baseball Scalp

A determination to give the Gold Hill baseball nine just what it needs most—a large dose of humility—was voiced in Jacksonville this week. "If the Gold Hill team, which has gotten entirely too cocky because it won a few games this season, will come here Jubilee day, August 19, we'll show 'em the ins and outs of the great American game," said Manager Beach yesterday.

Although the Hillites have won all their games so far this year, their strongest rival in any one game was Jacksonville and with the full team ready to go to war with them those in the know predict the neighboring city's long string of luck is going to play out on them—that is, if they are sportsmen enough to come over to this city for another game. It was on the local diamond the Gold Hillers remember their scantest victory.

"Of course," commented Coach Punk Dunnington when speaking of the proposed game, "Gold Hill probably would rather bask in the warmth of their present record than come here Saturday, during the celebration, and take their chances with the Jacksonville team—the same team that set down the Brush Marines last Sunday so hard. I don't think they will have the courage to do it."

Gold Hill, it will be remembered, has been very noisy about her winning streak, but the local nine is grooming itself to make a little noise too and is confident it can do the very thing no other southern Oregon team has been able to accomplish this year. "I can hear 'em squawkin' now when we lick 'em—if they'll play us again," said one of the Miner players. If the Gold Hill team can be persuaded—or tricked—into coming here a week from Saturday one of the best ball games of the year should result. But then again, scouts from the neighboring town may have witnessed how the Miners are working lately.

Rodeo Will Be Held on Saturday, Sunday

Thunderous pound of horses' hoofs on the ground, yippee-ing shrieks of cowboys and frenzied cheers of hundreds of thrilled on-

lookers will echo for two days from the surrounding hills of Jacksonville, for the rodeo committee of the jubilee has decided to stage its feature both Saturday, August 19, and again the next day, Sunday.

Bringing here dozens of hard-riding, bowlegged cowhands and a drove of outlaw horses, the rodeo will bring back to the old town one of her former chief means of entertainment back in the days when regular schedules were maintained by stage coaches plying between San Francisco and Portland through this old mining camp. The Oregon wilderness was wrested from the savage and hostile Indian with the aid of the faithful horse and its wiles and temperamentalities will be on display as the rodeo snaps into action.

Fencing, chutes and corral are almost completed and a huge grandstand will be ready for rodeo fans within a few days. Ten stands, each seating more than 100 persons, will be built for Jubilee day and, following the baseball game and rodeo, will be dragged into a large circle to form the outdoor wrestling arena at night. Much construction and preparation has been necessary for the rodeo, and this feature should be one of the greatest drawing cards the old town will have. The rodeo will be held on the high school ball field.

First Can Kitchen on Applegate Tuesday

One of the several canning kitchens of the county as a relief measure, and the first to be held on the Applegate, will be conducted in the Ruch district Tuesday, August 15, at the home of the chairman, Mrs. E. H. Taylor. All needy families of Ruch, Big Applegate and Little Applegate are asked to be represented at the meeting.

Beans will be the product canned at this time and women from these districts will bring their lunch, prepared to do their own canning of the green beans from their gardens. Tin cans and a sealer will be furnished by the county, according to arrangements made by Mrs. Mabel Mack, demonstration agent.

A canning kitchen also will be conducted at the Applegate school house and it is hoped that one may be maintained at Copper for the neighboring districts.

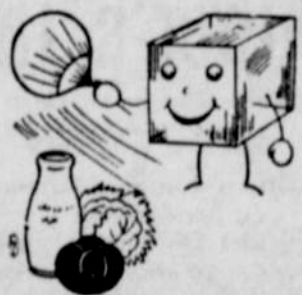
